during the wildfires:

Perimeter Control: By maintaining tight access control into an evacuated community, the Alberta RCMP can easily ascertain who's authorized to work in a specific area and who might be unlawfully in the community.

Roving Patrols: With the perimeter secured, marked police car patrols will regularly move through your community actively looking for signs of criminal activities, as well as individuals who are not authorized to be in the evacuated area. To enhance patrolling ability throughout the night, advanced optical and night vision technology mounted on our Remotely Piloted Aircraft Systems (drones) are being utilized to identify and accurately pinpoint any suspicious activity in your evacuated community.

Quick Response Teams: Special Tactical Operations and Emergency Response Teams are in place to rapidly react to any incidents in your community. These members are specially trained officers equipped to deal with the most sensitive and dangerous situations.

Investigative Teams: Experienced investigators will analyze and examine reports of suspicious activity and individuals. Our investigators will conduct targeted investigations of prolific offenders, criminal hot spots and utilize both overt and covert techniques to actively suppress crime and arrest those looking to take advantage of the evacuation.

Crime Reduction Techniques: Various Crime Reduction equipment and strategies are being implemented within and around the evacuated areas. "Bait" vehicles and equipment for the most opportunistic offenders are being utilized to catch criminals in the act. Specialized Crime Reduction teams utilize covert crime detection and overt crime suppression strategies focusing on the most prolific offenders who are causing the most harm to our communities.

Until you are able to return to your community, your local RCMP officers are committed to keeping communities that have been evacuated safe and secure. Please help us to keep everyone safe by listening to the advice from local authorities and staying away from evacuated areas until you have been cleared to return. Your patience is greatly appreciated.

been given to the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) to provide:

• personnel and resources to assist and enable fire fighting;

• airlift resources for mobility and logistical tasks, including the evacuation of isolated communities; and

• engineering support, including heavy equipment resources, as capacity allows.

CAF resources will be provided for an initial period of two weeks, with a one-week extension possible following a joint evaluation of the situation to determine if support is still required.

In addition to the CAF deployment, the federal government is also providing the following supports:

• Public Services and Procurement Canada will provide contracting support to the province for supplies or logistics.

The Royal Canadian

Mounted Police will continue to support with response efforts and, as the contracted police of jurisdiction, support matters of law enforcement.

• Employment and Social Development Canada will support impacted Canadians with enhanced Service Canada hours, outreach to evacuees, and deployment of mobile units to evacuation centres to support applications for services, such as employment insurance.

· Indigenous Service Canada's Emergency Management Assistance Program (EMAP) will support the response and recovery efforts for Alberta's on-reserve First Nations communities currently experiencing the effects of the wildland fires. Affected communities require prompt coordination of actions to protect the health, safety or welfare of all, and limit damages to property, infrastructure,

and the environment. EMAP supports impacted communities through agency response via the wildland fire and the emergency management service agreements with the Province of Alberta, resource coordination, organizational structure and evacuee supports. Once the response phase is over, the Program will provide recovery support for repairs to on-reserve community infrastructure to restore to pre-event conditions, mitigation measures to infrastructure to minimize future impacts and personal losses.

• Public Health Agency of Canada's National Emergency Strategic Stockpile is engaged and has already shipped requested supplies and is standing by to provide more if required.

• Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada is working with the province of Alberta and telecommunications service providers to keep people connected.

• Parks Canada is sending an 18-member Incident Command Team to support the Province of Alberta. These wildland fire management specialists are trained to manage complex fires and other incidents. This deployment is being coordinated through the Canadian Interagency Forest Fire Centre.

HOW TO KEEP ANIMALS OUT OF YOUR GARDEN

Many gardeners understand the frustration that stems from seeing a garden destroyed by wildlife. While protecting wildlife is a cause that's near and dear to many gardening enthusiasts, even the most ardent wildlife supporter does not want to see his or her garden trampled, eaten or adversely affected by animals.

Safeguarding gardens from local wildlife can require some trial and error. Animals may find ways to circumvent gardeners' initial efforts to protect their gardens, but the following methods might just do the trick the first time around.

• Erect physical barriers around gardens. Barriers may not be gardeners' first choices, as some people feel barriers such as wire cages or mesh coverings make it more difficult to tend to gardens and rob gardens of some of their aesthetic appeal. But coverings and wire cages can effectively prevent wildlife from trampling or eating plants while still allowing the gardens to get adequate sunlight. Make sure barriers extend to the ground so animals cannot access gardens by entering beneath the barricades.

Fight intruders with odor. Stray cats may mistake gardens for litter boxes and enter them to relieve themselves. Preventing such intrusions can be as simple as placing items around the garden to reduce the likelihood that gardens will be mistaken for litter boxes. Peels from oranges and lemons or coffee grounds can be placed in the garden and can emit odors strong enough to deter cats.


Install motion detecting lights around gardens. Motion detection technology might be enough to deter nocturnal wildlife from trampling or eating gardens. Animals might be spooked and run away when lights suddenly turn on. A similar approach can be taken using noise instead of lights. Gardeners who hope to avoid erecting barriers around their gardens can put up posts instead, attaching aluminum cans or wind chimes to the posts that will make noise when animals come near. Much like light, noise can be enough to deter animals.

Consider raised garden beds. When small critters, such as moles, are the main problem, then raised garden beds with wood or plastic bottoms and sides can be enough to safeguard gardens. Raised garden beds might not be accessible to small critters, though such beds likely won't deter larger animals from getting into gardens that are not barricaded.

• Erect fencing around the yard. Though fencing is expensive, fencing in a backyard or side yard where gardens are located can deter wildlife big and small from trampling or eating gardens.





Alberta Health Services (AHS) continues to closely monitor the provincial wildfire situation, and is reminding Albertans how to access care and support as needed.

Approximately 300 people have been evacuated from healthcare facilities in their home communities due to wildfires, and AHS is ensuring they are cared for and supported until they are able to return home.

AHS is providing healthcare support to reception centres in North, Edmonton, and Central Zones to ensure that those who have been evacuated are safe, comfortable, and cared for. This includes mental health, public health, nursing, home care, and pharmacy staff.

Patients who are expected for assessment or treatment for a cancer diagnosis in an evacuated area should call the Cancer Centre Transition Team toll-free at 1-888-432-8865. Our team will work with you to ensure your assessment or treatment remains as uninterrupted as possible.

All appointments with laboratory services, mental health and public health in evacuated communities are postponed at this time. Clients will be contacted directly by AHS to be rescheduled as soon as possible. Home care clients impacted by evacuations are being contacted to arrange for alternative home visits and support from nursing teams.

Four AHS acute care hospitals – Drayton Valley Hospital and Care Centre, Edson Healthcare Centre, Fox Creek Healthcare Centre, and High Prairie Health Complex – remain evacuated and closed due to the risk of nearby wildfires. No evacuations were required over the past 24 hours.

In addition, Evansburg Health Centre/Good Samaritan Pembina Village, East Prairie Community Health Services, and Rainbow Lake Community Health Centre were evacuated late last week and remain closed.

Evacuated patients and continuing care residents are being cared for in safe and appropriate settings. All zones are opening care spaces to accommodate those in need.

These relocations took place using EMS ground and air transport options and chartered buses as required. Whenever possible, patients and residents are being accompanied and supported by staff.

AHS continues to contact families of loved ones to share patient/resident location information, and all zones are actively working to ensure patients and residents are safely cared for in temporary locations.

AHS is also working with provincial and municipal leaders, as well as community partners, to be ready to return patients and residents to facilities as communities reopen. AHS is also prepared in the event that other sites are at risk from wildfire. We are extremely grateful to our frontline staff, physicians, EMS crews and supporting agencies, who have gone above and beyond to ensure impacted patients and residents continue to get the care they need.

We are also grateful for our partner organizations, including several continuing care organizations, that continue to support these efforts, and are appreciative of our community partners and volunteers who continue to answer when called upon for their support.

AHS has been working to identify additional staffing supports across all zones to ensure patients, residents and our care teams continue to be appropriately supported.

If you have an emergency, please call 911. EMS resources remain in evacuated areas to provide support to those who need.

AHS provides wildfire resources for Albertans at AHS.ca/wildfire, including mental health, air quality, and emergency planning links.

"Every minute is crucial in keeping yourself and your family safe during an emergency. It's important to prepare when the risk is low, so you are ready to

respond when the risk is high."

The City and the province have many resources available to residents to learn how they can prepare for a multitude of emergencies. The province has also created short videos for residents to learn how they can remain safe throughout the year.

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise that the interest-free limit of the Advance Payments Program has been increased from \$250,000 to \$350,000 for the 2023 program year, effective May 8, 2023. This is the portion of advances on which the Government of Canada pays the interest on behalf of producers.

Under the Advance Payments Program, producers have easy access to favorable cash advances of up to \$1 million, based on the expected value of their agricultural product. The program can also provide some flexibility by allowing producers to sell their agricultural products based on market conditions rather than the need for cash.

Evacuees of the Alberta wildfires who lost or left behind their Alberta driver's licence, ID card or birth certificate between April 29 and June 29 will be able to replace these documents free of charge.

Evacuees must visit a registry agent office in person to replace their documents at no cost. Registry agents will follow procedures to confirm an applicant's identity and ensure they are from an area under evacuation before ordering replacement documents at no charge.

Replacement cards and certificates will be sent to an address specified by the applicant. Applicants can choose to send replacement identification to an alternate address that is not a post office box, including evacuation centres and registry agents. The replacements will arrive in about five business days.

Replacing a driver's licence or ID card

Registry agents

will validate an applicant's identity by looking up their image and signature to ensure both match what is on file.

• Registry agents will validate an applicant's evacuee status by comparing their address on their motor vehicle file, with a government list of affected areas that is updated daily.

• The agent will ask personal knowledge verification questions that only the applicant can answer.

Replacing a birth certificate

• Birth certificates can be replaced by applying in person at a registry agent office if an applicant has other ID; however, if that too is missing, an applicant will need to bring someone who can vouch for their identity, having known them for more than one year. The registry agent can assist with this process.

Alberta's Emergency Management Cabinet Committee continues to meet regularly to respond to the current wildfire situation across the province. Cabinet continues to have decision-making abilities and will make decisions as needed to deal with this emergency.

LEDUC RCMP DRUG UNIT EXECUTE SEARCH WARRANTS AND LAY CHARGES

In January 2023, Leduc RCMP Drug Unit entered into a Controlled Drugs and Substances Act (CDSA) investigation in the area of Leduc.

On April 14th, 2023, Leduc RCMP Drug Unit with the with the assistance of Leduc RCMP Crime Reduction Unit, General Investigation Section and Beaumont General Investigation Section, executed two search warrants in Sherwood Park, Alta. One person was arrested.

A search of the residence and vehicle resulted in the seizure of cocaine, cash, digital scales and drug packaging materials

Lloyd Grant Wedow (67), a resident of Sherwood, has

been charged with the following:


• Trafficking a controlled substance – Cocaine

• Possession for the purpose of trafficking in a controlled substance – Co-caine

• Possession of proceeds of crime

Wedow was taken before a Justice of the peace and has been released from custody.

He is scheduled to appear in Sherwood park provincial court on May 31, 2023.

On May 9, 2023, the RCMP Central Alberta District Crime Reduction Unit (CAD CRU) were on their way to support Western Alberta District Wildfire response to detect and deter crime in evacuated areas, when they observed a prolific property crime offender driving a pick up near Throsby. Officers contacted the registered owner to inquire if the male should be in possession of this pickup and it was determined that it had been stolen.

CAD CRU covertly followed the vehicle with the assistance of the RCMP helicopter. Officers were able to covertly disable the vehicle, at which point the suspect got into another vehicle, which was later confirmed to have been stolen in early April. The second stolen vehicle lost control on lose gravel and rolled west of Drayton Valley, and the two occupants fled on foot. One suspect was apprehended by CAD CRU and RCMP Police Dog Services at the scene. The second male is outstanding, however, his identity is known and a warrant is being sought for his arrest.

Logan Joseph Davis (27), a resident of Brazeau County, has been charged with the following offences:

• Possession of a prohibited weapon

• Possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose

• Possession of stolen property over \$5000 (x2)

• Driving while prohibited

Fail to comply

with release conditions (x7)

• Possession of break in instruments

• Operating a conveyance In a dangerous manner

After a Judicial Interim Release Hearing, Logan Davis has been remanded into custody and will be appearing in Alberta Court of Justice in Leduc on May 11, 2023.

As a result of this investigation, two stolen vehicles, a 2000 Ford SRW and a 2016 Chevy Silverado, have been recovered.

Alberta RCMP are always proactively targeting prolific offenders that would victimize others – especially during natural disasters. For those communities that have received evacuation notices from the Provincial Government, our officers remain on the ground to ensure order and to protect property. We have deployed a variety of uniformed officers and specialized units, and are employing both overt and covert strategies, to address and prevent criminal activity in affected areas. We are monitoring these areas and are ready to respond quickly.

Until those who have been evacuated can return home, your RCMP officers are committed to keeping your community safe and secure.


