BRETON RCMP INVESTIGATE FATAL COLLISION

On May 29, 2023, at approximately 11:06 p.m., Breton RCMP received a report of a serious collision involving a semi truck and a passenger vehicle on Highway 22 near Township Road

454 in Wetaskiwin County, Alta.

Breton RCMP attended and Emergency Medical Services and Fire Services were already on scene. The 30-year-old male passenger of the vehicle was pronounced deceased at the scene. The name of the deceased will not be released.

The 46-year-old male driver of the vehicle was in serious condition and originally transported to hospital by ground ambulance, and later transported to another facility by STARS air ambulance.

WATCH FOR SEWER LINE MAINTENANCE THIS SUMMER

City crews will be completing sewer line flushing on the east side of Leduc throughout the summer as part of the regular maintenance of our sewer (wastewater) collection system. This process utilizes high-pressure water to clear pipes and break up any material that may interrupt regular flow of waste through the system.

Crews will also be conducting smoke and dye testing in South Park and Linsford Park areas in the later part of the summer for an estimated period of two weeks. This process is completed to identify any inflow or infiltration occurring in the sewer system, which may be the result of cracks in the sewer line, defective sewer connections, illicit cross-connections with storm drains, or building

connections that have improper traps or plumbing.

ALBERTA ENDS PROVINCIAL STATE OF EMERGENCY

With the wildfire situation continuing to improve, Alberta's provincial state of emergency is expiring but all resourcing and support remains in place.

Although the wildfire situation remains serious in the northern areas of the province, the extraordinary powers of the Emergency Management Act are no longer required to ensure emergency responders and wildfire firefighters continue keeping Albertans and their properties safe. These efforts will especially con-

tinue in the Fort Chipewyan area and other communities where residents remain evacuated.

"Wildfires are still burning in many parts of northern Alberta, and hundreds of people are still away from their homes. Although the provincial state of emergency is expiring, we will continue to use all of our resources to fight these fires and protect communities. No community will be left behind, and all the resources of the provincial government will continue to be available to those who need it."

Alberta is working closely with local authorities and other agencies to ensure the province has the fire-fighting resources needed for the rest of the wildfire season.



DO WE REALLY WANT BILL 1?

Premier Smith has promised that no tax rate – neither personal nor corporate – would be raised under the UCP. Bill 1 of a new UCP government would enshrine that promise in law by prohibiting any tax hike without public approval in a referendum.

At first thought that would seem to be a taxpayer's dream, but a second and a third thought show it would be disastrous. Such an act would cripple new measures and new directions. Most likely it would make reaction to an emergency almost impossible. It would even cripple what we have

The elected government has the responsibility to pay

its way. The government, not the electorate who chose them to do so, has to balance what goes out with what comes in. The tax effects of 'bracket creep' are too low to help much, and imposition of greater royalties or fees does not seem to be considered, either. How can the provincial government continue to balance the books?

Referenda are often used by governments to 'pass the buck' onto the populace when they do not wish to face uncomfortable obligations. After all, it is impossible to share all the multitude of possible effects of the referendum prior to the vote on it; the average person has no access to the necessary information available to the MLA's. A

public vote on such an issue could only be invalid.

One obvious question is: who would vote to raise taxes? Could Alberta ever again expect corporate or personal taxes to match other provinces? What is the intention here, and what would result after such a referendum?


A frozen tax base would leave a government unable to adjust programs even when needed. It would curtail improvements. It would prevent compensation for population growth or inflation or

downturn in oil revenues. It would hobble government services such as health, education, social services and infrastructure. It would prevent our government from offering in-

centives for sustainable energy programs and the like. It would be a tourniquet on the arteries of Alberta. In other words, it would stifle our economy.

On the other hand, it would ensure that Albertans would have to turn more and more to private services, since the government could not meet its obligations. Perhaps that is the intention.

And when the problems become dire, who is to blame? Not the government, surely! The government response: "We gave them the choice and the citizens chose for themselves"...

- An evacuation order remains in effect for the hamlet of Fort Chipewyan, Mikisew Cree First Nation (Allison Bay, Dog Head and Devils Gate), Fort Chipewyan Metis Nation and Athabasca Chipewyan First Nation. Parts of Sturgeon Lake Cree Nation remain under evacuation order.

LEDUC RCMP IS WARNING THE PUBLIC ABOUT SEXTORTION TACTICS BEING USED TO TARGET THE PUBLIC

Leduc RCMP have recently received several reports of financial sextortion involving adults and are encouraging everyone to learn what financial sextortion is and how to protect yourself and those around you from this crime.

Financial sextortion is a type of online blackmail that is, sadly, on the rise. It involves someone asking you to send them sexual images or videos of yourself and then threatening to share them with others unless you pay them. Offenders often pose as someone of a similar age and use fake accounts to target victims, deceiving them into sending explicit photos or videos. The offender then threatens to release the sexual materials unless the victim sends them money. These offenders know what they are doing, are organized, and are very good at what they do. They will rely on threats and aggressive behaviour to get you to send them what they want - it is important to remember that there is help available.

What to do if you are being financially sextorted:

- Stop all communication with the offender.
- Deactivate, but do not delete your social media account or images.
- Save a copy of any images you sent, and take screenshots of the messages and the person's profile including username.
- Do not comply with any threats, do not send money or more images.
- Trust your instincts, practice caution when communicating online.
- Reach out to a trusted person, and report what happened to your local police.

It is important to know that you will not be in trouble with law enforcement and that you are not the one to blame in this situation. By reporting, you can help to keep others safer as well.

Trust that there is life

after images.

Even though financial sextortion is committed virtually, it can have serious impacts offline. After the threats and aggression, victims can feel alone, ashamed, scared, and sometimes desperate – to the



MP GERALD SOROKA INTRODUCES NOAH'S LAW IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

MP Gerald Soroka, Conservative Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, moved for leave to introduce Bill C-336, Strengthening Reporting Requirements for Sex Offenders Act (Noah's Law). He said:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to present my first Private Member's Bill, entitled Strengthening Reporting Obligations for Sex Offenders Act, (Noah's Law), which is seconded by the Member for Battle River—Crowfoot.

This bill will empower vulnerable people, such as women and children, by legislating highly-likely repeat sex offenders' compliance with conditions outlined under the Sex Of-

fender Information Registration Act, (SOIRA), under court orders.

For most people, September 16, 2021, was an uneventful day, but for Cody McConnell, his life was destroyed by a tragic event when his 24-year-old fiancé, Mchale Busch, and his 16-month-old son, Noah McConnell, were murdered by a 53-year-old registered sex offender who was deemed highly likely to reoffend. Because of this horrible and devastating event, Cody McConnell does not want anyone else to experience what he went through and still endures every day.

Noah's law would allow a court to order highly-likely-to-repeat offenders to comply with SOIRA for 30 years to protect the public, complete a sexual behaviour rehabilitation/
treatment program before
the termination of the order, increase the frequency
of reporting to a registration centre before moving
to a new address and make
it an offence if offenders fail
to report to a registration
centre in accordance with
SOIRA.

I would like to acknowledge Laura MacRae, the lawyer and family friend of Cody McConnell who drafted Noah's law. I am also extremely pleased to have Senator Boisvenu introduce Noah's Law into the Senate tomorrow afternoon.

I would like to acknowledge the Member for Red Deer–Lacombe for supporting Noah's law by sponsoring petition e-4460.

The petition has only been online for just over a week and already has over 1,100 signatures.

My heart goes out to Cody McConnell and his family and friends. Mchale Busch and Noah McConnell have not been forgotten. Their deaths should lead to meaningful change within Canada's criminal justice system so that no other family will have to go through a tragedy like this again, and this bill will do just that. MPs and senators should quickly pass this bill.

I would also like to thank Cody McConnell and his family and friends who came from Alberta to join us today."
