HISTORIC SETTLEMENT REACHED IN CLASS ACTION LAWSUIT AGAINST THE CITY OF LEDUC

The City of Leduc and Plaintiffs Mindy Smith and Christa Steele, through their counsel, Robert Martz, Richard Steele, Sydney Black, and Alanna Wiercinski at Burnet, Duckworth and Palmer LLP (BD&P) have released a Joint Statement announcing a historic settlement agreement in the class action lawsuit filed against the City of Leduc for workplace misconduct in February, 2022.

Highest per person monetary settlement for workplace misconduct in Canadian history will be awarded to female City of Leduc employees

This is the first settlement of a class action involving sexual misconduct and sexual assault in a fire department or municipality in Canada. The individual compensation in this settlement exceeds that provided by Canada's most notable workplace harassment class action settlements to date, which involved systemic sexual abuse and harassment within the

Eligible Alberta drivers aged 18 and over will now automatically exit from the Graduated Driver Licence (GDL) program.

Alberta's government is following through on a promise from April to save new drivers the \$154 cost to exit the GDL program. GDL drivers who have completed their 24-month driving period and have no suspensions or demerits within their last 12 months of probation, including zero tolerance for any alcohol and/or drug consumption, will receive a letter informing them of the change in their driver's licence status

RCMP and the Department of National Defense.

The terms of this settlement include:

•The highest per-person monetary compensation in a Canadian class-action settlement for workplace misconduct. Each member of the class is eligible for financial compensation between \$10,000 and \$285,000.

•A lengthy claimant eligibility time period: any woman who worked at the City of Leduc over the past 20 years is eligible to participate in the class action.

•A confidential, non-adversarial, and non-confrontational claims process meant to facilitate claimant participation and provide a safe way for women to come forward.

•Significant non-monetary remedies including a public apology from the Mayor of Leduc and a requirement that Leduc take whatever steps are necessary to ensure that no retaliation occurs against women who participate in the class action or who make a claim.

The per-person settlement amounts combined with the non-adversarial claims non-monetary process, remedies, and the lengthy claimant eligibility time period, arguably makes this settlement the most progressive workplace class action settlement in Canadian history. This settlement will have a significant impact on Canadian case law moving forward and sets a precedent for victim

advocacy in workplace harassment settlements.

Former Leduc firefighter and plaintiff Christa Steele said "When we set out to bring to light the discrimination, sexual harassment and sexual assault happening at Leduc, it was so it would stop and those who are responsible for the years of abuse we faced would be held accountable. There remains a lot of work to do, but I am relieved that Leduc has finally acknowledged the harm that women suffered in a workplace where they were preyed upon and sexual assault was acceptable and without consequence."

BD&P's lead lawyer in this case, Robert Martz, spoke to these challenges,

saying: "When this case came to us we knew that we had a responsibility to do whatever we could to help these women. We took on this case despite its legal challenges because what we saw at Leduc cannot be tolerated and those who discriminate, sexually harass, and sexually assault women need to be held accountable. We also believe that the legal system needs to evolve to hold employers accountable who tolerate this type of systemic sexual misconduct, and to encourage women who suffer this type of workplace abuse to

come forward."

A hearing for the Court of King's Bench to approve the settlement is scheduled for July 4, 2023 in Edmonton, AB.

clean driving records who would need to pay \$154 and waste their time to take another driving test. Alberta's government will continue to make common-sense rules and make life more affordable for Albertans."

Drivers are not legally re-


quired to obtain a new licence card when their GDL period ends. They may do so if they prefer, but they will be required to pay registry fees after June 25. Drivers who don't obtain a new licence card will have their physical licence upgraded the next time they renew their driver's licence.

Drivers who do not exhibit safe driving behaviours and

incur demerits, suspensions or are ticketed for other unsafe driving offences during the last year of their probation will have their probationary period extended for an additional year.

If the driver is stopped by law enforcement in Alberta, the officer will know they have a full licence through information in the Canadian Police Information Centre.

If drivers are travelling outside of Alberta, they need to keep their letter with them in their vehicle or visit a registry and update their physical licence, as law enforcement agencies outside Alberta may not have access to Alberta's data.

CITY INTRODUCES SMART TECHNOLOGY TO DETECT WASTE CONTAMINANTS

The green cart inspection program in the City of Leduc will soon use artificial intelligence (AI) technology to improve contamination detection in your green cart. Beginning June 26, a collection truck will be outfitted with AI cameras that will scan green carts for contaminants (e.g., plastic bags) till the end of the year.

The use of smart technology will allow the City to streamline and enhance services as carts will be inspected during each collection instead of periodically. Ninety per cent of households sort correctly according to the 2021 Environmental Progress Report, and to maintain this standard, the City will target education for households that are not sorting correctly.

"Most of our residents are doing a great job sorting waste correctly," says City of Leduc Deputy Mayor and Councillor Glen Finstad. "We can now focus on helping certain households by giving them customized information that suits their needs."

The program is aimed at the remaining group and increasing their knowledge to sort smarter. Green cart waste is diverted from landfills, which helps to prolong the life of the landfill, decrease environmental pollution and reduce operation costs.

How it works:

• As waste is tipped into the collection truck, the AI system scans the items for contaminants.

• If the system detects a contaminant, a photo is taken of the item and associated with a specific household using GPS data.

• A postcard with the image will be sent to the household with information about what can go in the green cart.

• For privacy, everything except for the detected contaminant items will be blurred out in the image.

Residents can download the Recycle Coach app to receive personalized collection schedules, custom pick-up reminders and use the "What Goes Where" tool to sort better. Additional carts are available for rent if needed.


The pilot is supported by TELUS as an add-on service as part of the PureFibre build that was completed in fall 2022. Prairie Robotics is supporting the AI and personalized education components of the program.



Leduc RCMP are sharing crime prevention strategies in relation to the "Emergency Scams" or "Grandchild" scams being used to target the public.

These scams often involve a phone call being placed to the victim claiming a loved one is in trouble with the courts or law enforcement and a payment is needed to help them. The suspects will often pretend to be a police officer, judge, or family member. Suspects will usually ask for cash; however, they may also ask for payment in gift cards, bitcoin, or e-transfers. The scammers will then send an associate acting as a courier to pick up the money in person or ask the money be mailed.

Leduc RCMP want to remind citizens of the following:

Bail is always paid in person at a courthouse or correctional center;

• Never send money to anyone you don't know;

If a person claims to be a police officer or judge, call that police service or court house directly to confirm the situation – police and courts will never demand cash be picked up in person or mailed; and

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• Never give out personal information over the phone or online to someone you don't know-the police or courts will not ask for personal information over the phone.





FREE REPLACEMENT DOCUMENTS FOR **CANADIANS AND SPECIAL MEASURES** FOR PEOPLE AFFECTED BY SEVERE WILDFIRES

With the country experiencing an unprecedented wildfire season, the Government of Canada is urgently mobilizing to help support communities and the people who live in them. This includes help for Canadians and for people who are crucial to the rebuilding effort.

Today, the Honourable Sean Fraser, Minister of Immigration, Refugees and

announced Citizenship, special measures for people who have been impacted and need to replace vital documents or to extend or restore their status in Canada.

Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) will issue free replacement documents for Canadians, permanent residents and temporary residents directly affected by the wildfires. These include permanent resident cards, Canadian citizenship certificates, Canadian passports and other travel documents that are lost, damaged, destroyed or inaccessible due to wildfires.

International students, temporary foreign workers and other visitors who have been directly affected by the wildfires and whose status will expire by September 30, 2023, will also be eligible to apply, restore or extend their status in Canada free of charge. This means that temporary workers who are unable to work

because their workplace is closed due to the fires don't need to worry - they'll be able to extend their status and stay until their workplace reopens. In addition, international students can extend their study permits if their classes are delayed or cancelled and finish their studies without penalty.

These special measures will be in effect until September 30, 2023. They give Canadians, permanent residents and temporary residents time to sort out documents or temporary status issues, so they can focus on what matters most right now: their families, their homes and their communi-

ALBERTA RCMP EXPANDS NEW VIDEO CAMERA REGISTRY ACROSS THE PROVINCE

The Alberta RCMP are excited to announce our voluntary surveillance camera registry program, called CAPTURE (Community Assisted Policing Through the Use of Recorded Evidence) is now province wide.

Residents and businesses who have video surveillance, and are willing to share video camera footage when requested, can sign up. This initiative won't replace officers from knocking on doors, but it will help officers track down video evidence in ongoing criminal investigations in RCMP jurisdictions.

The program aims to reduce the time an officer needs to search for and gather video evidence when conducting an investigation. The CAPTURE program allows a person or business to upload a portion of the video requested. This allows the officer to evaluate the video footage before deciding to ask for a copy.

To get started, visit www. ruralalbertacapture.ca and create an account. From there you can enter your contact information and video cameras on the secure site. Your information is not available to the public. If an officer needs to contact you, they will do so by the information provided.

Things to know about the program:

•This is completely voluntary and consent can be withdrawn at any time;

•Registering a camera and contact information allows the RCMP to see a list of security cameras so they can contact the owners during an investigation;

•The video footage on your camera remains your property;

•The RCMP will not have live access to your camera feed. We will only ask for videos already recorded;

•You can share your video

footage through the website for an officer to view before they decide if the video will help in their investigation; and

•An officer can provide you with a USB thumb drive to copy your video. An officer can not download the video; they can only view it.

This strategy is another way the Alberta RCMP are working with our communities to help solve crime faster, together. By providing video footage to police during an investigation, communities increase the chance of a successful prosecution.


County.




