
MLAs Shane Getson and Garth Rowswell will travel to Germany to learn about the country's energy transition plans and how Alberta can be a strong partner.



### Alberta Joins Binational Climate Study Trip To Germany

members of the Council of State Governments (CSG) Midwestern Legislative Conference to learn about Germany's energy and climate transition.

Like other countries, Germany is struggling with an energy crisis precipitated by the war in Ukraine and a pivot away from nuclear power. While still relying on fossil fuels, the country is planning a transition to renewables by 2050. The study trip will offer both MLAs the opportunity to gather first-hand information about Germany's energy sector and to meet with government officials and industry representatives who are implementing innovative energy policies and processes. The trip will also provide an opportunity to promote low-emitting western Canadian LNG and Alberta's energy capabilities, including hydrogen, carbon capture, utilization and storage, and technologies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

"It's an honour to represent Alberta as we work to strengthen our province's relationship with Germany. We are grateful for the invitation to learn about the successes and challenges they have had with their energy transition programs so that we can apply those lessons here at home."


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# POLICE SEEK PUBLIC'S ASSISTANCE LOCATING 29-YEAROLD MAN


Peterson is described as a

### UPGRADES ENSURE QUICKER ACCESS TO SAFE, SECURE HEALTHCARE

More than \$650,000 in redevelopment work at the Drayton Valley Hospital and Care Centre will improve patient flow and speed up the triage process for patients presenting to the emergency department.

Renovations to the hospital's triage space and admitting desk are now complete, providing staff with better sight lines to monitor patients in the waiting room. Patient privacy and security have also been enhanced with the installation of additional cameras and secure doors. Removal of the previous admitting desk and the laying of new floor throughout the space is expected to be complete by

early next month.

Funding for the project comes from the Alberta government's Rural Health Facilities Revitalization Program.

"These improvements to the emergency department will improve the quality of care for people in and around Drayton Valley," says Andrew Boitchenko, MLA for Drayton Valley-Devon. "The Alberta government's commitment to this important project will ensure those who need emergency services receive the best care possible in a modern space that keeps them healthy and safe."

A further \$2.2 million of government funding is currently supporting active facility upgrade projects at the Drayton Valley Hospital and Care Centre, including reconfiguration of the emergency department and elevator modernization. A government-funded roof upgrade project has been recently completed at \$875,000.

"It is critical that patients and staff feel welcome and safe when they come to an emergency department, so I'm pleased these renovations will help create an environment where people can be comfortable while being seen as quickly as possible," says Janice Stewart, Chief Zone Officer in the Central Zone of Alberta Health Services (AHS).

AHS, in partnership with Alberta Infrastructure and Alberta Health, is building and renewing facilities across the province to provide accessible, sustainable, quality healthcare to all Albertans. AHS currently has about 540 maintenance projects underway throughout the province.

Alberta Health Services is the provincial health authority responsible for planning and delivering health supports and services for more than four million adults and children living in Alberta. Our mission is to provide a patient-focused, quality health system that is accessible and sustainable for all Albertans. Our current focus is on reducing emergency department wait-times, improving EMS response times, increasing access to surgeries, and improving patient flow.

# RCMP MAJOR CRIMES UNIT INVESTIGATE A HOMICIDE ON ERMINESKIN FIRST NATION

Major Crimes Unit took carriage of the investigation, in partnership with Maskwacis RCMP General Investigation Section, Maskwacis RCMP, Red Deer Forensic Identification Unit and the Edmonton Medical Examiners office.

As a result of the investigation, Matyrus Minde (25), a resident of Wetaskiwin, was charged with second degree murder.

Minde was brought before

a Justice of the Peace where he was remanded into custody. His next court appearance is on Oct. 10, 2023, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Wetaskiwin.



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

### 3 WAYS TO CONSERVE FUEL DURING YOUR DAILY COMMUTE

Commuting is a part of daily life for many working professionals. According to the U.S. Census Bureau's 2011 Communi-American ty Survey, the average American spends minutes commuting to work each day. However, Citi's 2015 Thank You Premier Commuter Index says the average commute time in the United States is 45 minutes. The reasons for that disparity are unknown, though if one accepts the

latter statistic as more accurate than the yearsold Census Bureau data, it's fair to say Americans spend far more time getting to work than their neighbors to the north. But commutes in Canada also can be lengthy, Canada's National Household Survey found that, in 2011, commuters in Canada spent an average of roughly 25 minutes traveling to work each day.

While many people enjoy their daily commutes,

feeling it's a time to prepare for the day ahead and, if using public transportation, to relax and let someone else do the work, it's fair to say the majority of commuters would like to spend less time getting to and from work. Many would also like to spend less money getting to and from their offices, and finding ways to conserve fuel is an effective way to do just that.

1. Maintain your vehicle.

Poorly maintained vehicles endure undue stress that can be prevented by adhering to routine maintenance schedules. Peruse your vehicle's owner's manuals to determine the recommended intervals to change the oil and replace the air filter and spark plugs. These simple maintenance tasks are easy and inexpensive, but they make it easier for engines to run smoothly and make

efficient use of fuel.

2. Keep tires properly inflated.

Properly inflated tires reduce drag on the engine. Engine drag makes the vehicle work hard to move, and that wastes fuel. But the type of tires a vehicle has also can affect how efficiently it uses fuel. According to the Transportation Research Board, tires that reduce rolling resistance by 10 percent can improve gas mileage by as

much as 2 percent. While that figure might seem insignificant, that 2 percent savings can add up to a substantial amount of money for commuters who spend 50 minutes every day getting to and from work.

3. Drive a vehicle with stop/start technology.

Stop/start systems, in which engines shut off automatically when drivers brake and restart automatically when the driver lifts his or her foot off the brake pedal,

can make more efficient use of fuel. Once exclusive to hybrid cars, stop/ start technology is now more widely available and can cut back on fuel consumption and vehicle emissions. That's especially attractive to eco-conscious muters who live in big cities where stop-andstart traffic is unavoidable. What's more, many modern air conditioning compressors operate off electricity and not via a car's engine, meaning vehicles with stop/ start technology will stay cool in the summer even when the engine shuts off.

Commuting to and from work may not seem like the most eco-friendly daily ritual. But there are ways to commute and conserve fuel at the same time.

on this path towards truth and reconciliation and creating an inclusive community for all."

Since October 2022, the City has taken the following steps to listen and learn:

- Presented a series of performances/sessions at the Maclab Centre for the Performing Arts, including Phyllis Sinclair, On The River and Donita Large | Indigenous Series.
- Hosted a Nation-to-Municipality pipe ceremony with Indigenous Indigenous leaders from the four Nations of Maskwacis and Maskekosihk (Enoch Cree Nation) in the Leduc Civic Centre to begin developing positive relationships with each Nation, while engaging in protocol.
- Coordinated a pipe

ceremony and community walk led by Indigenous leaders from Montana First Nation as part of the City's recognition of Aug. 23: Treaty 6 Day.

- Hosted Gathering Our Medicine, a two-day conference for the community focused on family and raising children through the lens of Indigenous knowledge and wisdom; Indigenous facilitators.
- Invited a consultant from Treaty Partner Advising and Consulting to make Treaty presentations to all the City-appointed boards.
- Attended various learning opportunities, including a land acknowledgment workshop, the Enoch Cree Nation Powwow and Treaty Partner Gathering, a

two-day session in Enoch Cree Nation for government administration to share knowledge about Treaty, culture, and the history of this land.

- Provided the community with reading material to help encourage learning through shared, free resources.
- Sponsored the Town of Devon's Treaty Six Celebrations.

Residents in the community are encouraged to make a personal recommitment to reconciliation and to show their support by downloading and posting a recommitment graphic to their social media channels.

# CITY WRAPS UP SUPPORT FOR WILDFIRE EVACUEES FROM NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

The City of Leduc concluded its support for wildfire evacuees from the Northwest Territories last week after establishing its Emergency Coordination Centre (ECC) in August to assist the Alberta Emergency Management Agency.

The City's ECC was open on Aug. 17 to welcome and register hundreds of people who had been displaced from their homes, many of whom were accommodated in local hotels. Personal services (e.g., hygiene kits, diapers, formula) were offered

to help meet urgent needs; AHS was on-site providing first aid, mental health and addiction support; and an Indigenous Advisor was available.

Although the ECC itself was open for one day, the City's efforts were maintained until Sept. 18 and included ongoing support related to public safety, meals, pets, transit, social services and re-entry flights.

Between Aug. 13 and Sept. 18, the City of Leduc:

- Booked 287 hotel rooms;
- Placed 651 people in hotels;

- Registered 949 people in the provincial system;
- Provided support to 128 pets related to people placed in hotels;
- Answered 110 phone calls on its evacuation line; spoke to 73 families and 37 individuals;
- Worked with 11 hotels and seven partner organizations to accommodate evacuees; and,
- Supported nine re-entry flights.

"While most of the evacuees who were staying in Leduc have now safely returned to the Northwest Territories and no longer require our services, we hope all felt welcomed, supported and safe while in our community," says City of Leduc Mayor Bob Young.

We know the Leduc community is generous and was eager to help our neighbours who were impacted by these wildfires. Thank you to all who offered support through the recommended organizations outlined by the province.

### CITY OF LEDUC THRIVES AS RESIDENTS APPLAUD QUALITY OF LIFE AND MUNICIPAL SERVICES

The City of Leduc unveiled the findings of its biannual citizen satisfaction survey today, demonstrating a resounding vote of confidence in the community's quality of life and city services. The results underscored Leduc's reputation as a place with an excellent quality of life.

For the fourth consecutive year, Leduc residents have affirmed their contentment with life in the city. A solid 73% of respondents, in a survey that has consistently yielded similar results since 2015, rated the overall quality of life as excellent or very good. Key contributors to this high quality of life include good municipal services, the parks and multi-way path system, and the fact that the city has

all the amenities needed.

Derek Prohar, City Manager, remarked, "It is encouraging to see the favourable assessment of quality and continued satisfaction of Leduc's residents with municipal services. I am immensely proud of the diligent efforts of our city employees in maintaining the quality of services we offer."

A significant majority of citizens, 72%, expressed satisfaction with city programs and services. Notably, residents identified recreation facilities, waste collection and diversion, fire response services, and outdoor recreational amenities as the top services provided by the City.

The survey also showed areas where improvements are desired. Respondents called for more frequent and bet-

ter-quality communication from the city. Satisfaction with recreation facilities and the Leduc Recreation Centre showed a decline from 32% in 2015 to 23% in 2023. Additionally, citizens voiced concerns about rising crime rates, limited support for individuals experiencing homelessness, and the rising cost of living.

Mayor Young stated, "These concerns are shared by Leduc City Council. Crime concerns are not uncommon in a growing city, and we are collaborating closely with the RCMP and our Peace Officers to develop effective crime reduction strategies. Regrettably, homelessness and the high cost of living are challenges faced by communities nationwide. Here in Leduc, we continue to partner with

the Province and the Federal Government to expedite affordable housing initiatives."

Regarding priorities, Leduc citizens identified maintaining infrastructure and roads and ensuring low taxes as their foremost civic concerns.

The survey, conducted from June 1 to June 24, 2023, encompassed interviews with 403 Leduc citizens aged 18 years and older. The sample selection and weighting ensured a statistically valid representation of the Leduc population, with a margin of error of +/- 4.9%, 19 times out of 20. This independent research study was conducted by Advanis Research. The final report and comprehensive results are available for viewing.

### **GAETZ LANDING II EXPANSION FUNDING ANNOUNCEMENT**

Leduc Regional Housing Foundation (LRHF) announced today that they will be breaking ground this summer on Gaetz Landing II, an expansion of the existing Gaetz Landing, Gaetz Landing, located a block off Main Street in the City of Leduc, currently hosts 14 units of affordable housing units as well as first-floor commercial retail space. The Gaetz Landing II expansion project will see an additional 24 one-bedroom units along with an elevator added to the existing building.

much-anticipated The expansion project came to realization today with announcement the Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) that Leduc Regional Housing Foundation was successful in

They will receive \$4.7 million towards the project as part of the Rapid Housing Initiative (RHI). The funding from CMHC provides the final funding necessary for the Gaetz Landing II expansion project to break ground.

The project is possible through collaboration and a commitment of funding from all levels of government - municipal, provincial and federal. In January of this year, the seven (7) municipalities that LRHF works with - Leduc County, City of Leduc, City of Beaumont, Town of Devon, Town of Calmar, Town of Thorsby, and Village of Warburg – came together to contribute \$500,000 towards the project.

In April of this year, the Government of Alberta announced that LRHF were the recipients of \$2 million in funding through the Affordable Housing Partnership Program (AHPP) to build affordable housing solutions in the City of Leduc. The Government of Alberta program is providing \$54 million to support seventeen (17) projects across nine (9) communities within the Province of Alberta.

"We are absolutely thrilled that our application was successful and that we can provide additional affordable housing solutions in the City of Leduc within the next year. Our success is a collaborative effort of so many," said Margot Hagarty, Executive Director. twenty-four (24) units will make a difference towards the 600 units of affordable housing that will be needed within the Leduc Region in the next 10 years. "

"As part of the Rapid Housing Initiative funding we received, we needed to be ready to break ground right away. We are ready and very excited to be breaking ground within the next month," said Margot Hagarty, Executive Director.

LRHF provides quality housing solutions and services to individuals and families in seven municipalities - Leduc County, City of Leduc, City of Beaumont, Town of Devon, Town of Calmar, Town of Thorsby, and Village of Warburg. A variety of housing solutions and services are available including supportive living (lodge), seniors self-contained, near market housing (affordable apartments), community housing (rent geared to income), and a rent assistance benefit program.









