#### PARKLAND RCMP CHARGE SEMI-TRUCK DRIVER AFTER MULTIPLE DRIVING COMPLAINTS

On Nov. 3, 2023, at 9:29 p.m., Parkland RCMP responded to a report of an impaired driver operating a semi tractor-trailer unit on highway 60 and Highway 627 in Parkland County. The last complaint received indicated the truck was attempting to reverse on highway 60.

Police arrived at the lo-

cation and found the semitruck. The driver was noted to display signs of impairment consistent with the consumption of alcohol. The driver, Darian Lavallee of Broadview, Sask. was arrested as a result of the roadside investigation.

Darian has been charged with Impaired operation and Operation while over 80 mg%. His next Court appearance is Dec. 20, 2023, at the Alberta Court of Justice

in Stony Plain.





## COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Submitted by Yellowhead County

Public Hearing Bylaw 6.23 – A Public Hearing was held for proposed Bylaw 6.23 to dispose of a Municipal Reserve on a portion of Plan 8122322 Block 5 Lot 7MR. There were no concerns or comments from members of the public during the hearing. The proposed bylaw will be brought back to an upcoming council meeting for the second and third readings.

Cemetery Bylaw – Council gave the third and final reading of Cemetery Bylaw 4.23. The bylaw outlines the regulations, fees and guidelines for the use, improvement, maintenance, management, and restrictions for the Evansburg Cemetery.

Ravine Community Hall – Council approved a request for funding from the Ravine Community Association for \$27,000 to upgrade kitchen facilities to bring them to CSA standards so they can resume commercial use. The Ravine Community Association is contributing \$21,000 along with donated labour and materials



to match the Community Hall Capital Assistance Grant.

Provincial Ag Tax Recovery – A letter from Council will be sent to the Ministry of Agricultural and Irrigation requesting that Yellowhead County be includ-

ed in the provincial 2023 Drought Livestock Assistance and the AgriRecovery Tax Deferral programs. This year's extreme weather significantly impacted local farmers and cattle producers; however, the data for Yellowhead County was not included in the provincial assessment, resulting in lo-

cal farmers and producers being left out of the program.

Recreation Board – Council appointed Stephen Parker to the Yellowhead County Recreation Board for the term ending October 31, 2026. This board provides advice to Council and administration on pol-

icy development, strategic planning, development and maintenance of recreation facilities and services, and grant funding to community groups that provide recreation and arts services to residents.

Last week, Alberta celebrated a court's confirmation that the federal Liberals' climate policies are unreasonable and unconstitutional. Over a year ago, Alberta contested the federal government's decision to label plastic as a 'toxic substance,' arguing it's an unconstitutional intrusion into provincial jurisdiction. In a recent ruling, Justice Angela Furlanetto deemed it "unreasonable and unconstitutional" to classify all plastic products as toxic, emphasizing that the federal government acted beyond its authority. The court clarified the principles of cooperative federalism, stressing the provinces are not subordinate to the federal government.

Premier Danielle Smith and Minister Rebecca Schulz pointed out that Ottawa's policies jeopardize thousands of jobs and billions of investments. Alberta's petrochemical sector, with over \$18 billion in projects, faces unnecessary risks due to federal overreach. This marks the second instance in two months that the Liberals' climate policies were rejected by the highest courts.

The United Conservative government continues to oppose damaging federal policies, contrasting with the Notley NDP, whose attempt to rebrand after the recent court decision reflects their denial of responsibility for economic and environmental policies. Despite their efforts, the NDP's history and policies remain clear to Albertans, reinforcing why they can't be trusted to lead the province.

Premier Smith and the United Conservative team

are attentive to Albertans' needs, working to maintain the province's leadership in economic prosperity, freedom, and opportunity. Alberta is back, and efforts will persist to uphold this status.

Last week was also Constituency week and it was busy! I attended many stakeholder meetings and community events. On November 15th, I attended the Metis Flag Raising Ceremony in Drayton Valley hosted by the Metis Local #888. It was an honor to be invited to attend such an important event. On November 16th, I also was honored to attend the Louis Riel Commemorative Day at the Legislature. There was an amazing turnout for the Louis Riel Commemorative ceremony and listening to the speeches was such a unique experience.

It was a privilege to be in-

vited to Senator Elect, Pam Davidson's event with the Ambassadors for Moldova and Croatia, the High Commissioner from Zimbabwe and federal Conservative MPs. I also attended events at the Enoch Nation Reserve, NAIT for The Next in Trades event, and even got an informative and comprehensive tour of the Genesee Power Plant.



#### REFOCUSING HEALTHCARE

While I spent some time working outdoors one evening this week on my rural property, I noticed one of two things: it was either the cool November air I felt, finally ushering in the Christmas season, or it might have been the winds of change.

Change is healthy. Not all change is necessary (some definitely is). Change is always a bit scary. Often, we're better for it.

This week, the Alberta government announced big plans. We're moving forward on steps to refocus Alberta's health care system.

There has been some progress on this front via the government's Health Care Action Plan throughout the past year, but we're not quite there yet, folks. More work needs to be done to ensure better outcomes for Albertans on the healthcare front.

If you've spoken to a local nurse lately, for example, you'll know this is indeed the case. I can't remember the last time I talked to a healthcare worker who wasn't burnt out by the system. It's not their fault. They do what they can with what they have. I hear about this often in the Lac Ste. Anne - Parkland area.

The reality is I, and many of the folks in Alberta's government, have heard loud and clear from Albertans, time and time again, that the current system centered on AHS is just not working. Albertans are facing long wait times and delays to the care they desperately need, and AHS has moved far beyond its original acute care mandate, trying to shoulder a burden it was never intended to carry in the first place.

Health care outcomes haven't been good, even though Alberta's spending on healthcare per capita is in line with other provinces. This is especially challenging in rural and Indigenous communities like the ones in my area.

It's long over time to refocus AHS so Albertans can get the right healthcare services, whenever and wherever they need them.

Patients need to be put first in every health care decision, including this one, and the front-line workers need some breathing room to properly care for Albertans.

The goal of this refocusing effort is to provide a more modern, more responsive and effective health care system, fully integrated, that centers around four priority sectors: primary care, acute care, continuing care, and mental health + addiction.

It will be a made-in-Alberta system that keeps the best parts of a large, single provider while also emphasizing areas of importance, where regional advisory boards will have more input and control, and Albertans will have a system that works for them, prioritizing their needs to find a primary care provider, get urgent care without long waits, and have access to the best continuing care options and supports.

Health care workers will be consulted every step of the way throughout this process. Their experience and expertise will help shape Alberta's refocused system and ensure doctors, nurses and other health care workers have more input to help drive innovation at a local level. The government is also working to ensure patients have a voice at the table. More information about public engagements will be provided as it becomes available.

Change is often scary, but the fact is all Albertans will continue to have access to the health care services as they do now throughout this refocusing process. Folks can continue to go to their regular health care providers for checkups or general health concerns, and hospitals for urgent and emergency care. Mental health and addiction treatment and recovery services will continue to be available. Continuing care or home care will still be available to you or your loved ones.

The work ahead will take time, and I know frontline health care workers will continue to provide exceptional care to patients and families throughout this effort.

The government is inviting all Albertans to become involved in shaping the province's health care system. We want to hear from all of you (yes, you included). We need input from patients, family members, caregivers and seniors who interact with the system. We need to hear from frontline workers so we can partner together to learn and find new ways to support healthcare workers through the obstacles they face day to day.

There's a lot of work to be done. I know we need more doctors, nurses, paramedics and many more health care workers. Alberta's government will continue to grow the health care workforce. I can tell you that every frontline job will be protected during this transition.

Refocusing Alberta's healthcare system will mean Albertans having health care that works for them. Care that prioritizes their needs, without long wait times, and improves access to the best options for services Alberta has to offer.

I encourage all Albertans to participate in this effort. Input is vital for helping the government work toward a better health care system.


