# REFLECTIONS ON THE FIRST WEEK OF THE 2023 FALL SESSION: A JOURNEY OF GRATITUDE AND RESPONSIBILITY

On Monday, October 30th, the 2023 Fall session opened with Her Honor, The Honorable Salma Lakhani, the Lieutenant Governor of Alberta, giving the traditional Speech from the Throne. It was both my honor and privilege to enter the Chamber as the representative for the unique and diverse constituency of Drayton Valley-Devon. It is a unique honor to note that I stood before the Chamber as the first Canadian MLA born in Ukraine. This milestone fills me with a profound sense of pride and responsibility.

During the Speech from the Throne, The Honorable Lieutenant Governor depicted the course that the UCP Government will take throughout the next six weeks while the house is sitting. There will be new legislation introduced regarding Taxes, Affordability, Indigenous Financial Backing, and Job Creation.

The Government will focus on standing up for Alberta and protecting us from an overreaching Federal Government. The UCP has already passed Motion 8, which is a motion to remove the Consumer Carbon Tax and stop the Federal Government from forcing their involvement in our provincial legislation. Although there

were opposition members who voted against the motion and therefore in support of the Federal Tax, the motion passed and will move on to the next stage of legislation. This motion states that the Alberta Government will take all necessary steps required to end the Federal Consumer Carbon Tax.

There have been numerous bills introduced in the first week of the session. I wanted to provide a brief description of the steps being taken by the UCP to make life better for Albertans. Bill 1, the Alberta Taxpayer Protection Amendment Act, which would, if passed, protect Albertans and Alberta businesses against future income tax rate increases. This bill keeps with our government's promise that we will protect Alberta's tax advantage. Bill 2, The Alberta Pension Protection Act would, if passed, guarantee the government won't launch an Alberta Pension Plan unless Albertans vote in favor of it in a referendum. Bill 3, the Opioid Damages and Health Care Costs Recovery Amendment Act. Through Bill 3, Alberta's government is planning to strengthen its case against those who have contributed to the creation of the opioid addiction crisis. The proposed legislation contains technical amendments for the Opioid Damages and Health Care

Costs Recovery Amendment Act, 2019. Bill 4, the Tax Statutes Amendment Act, is intended to ensure Alberta's tax laws remain clear and consistent. This bill proposes legislative amendments that would help formalize a key part of Alberta's commitment to affordability, provide clarity around the collection and remittance of Alberta's tourism levy, and update several technical and administrative aspects of Alberta's tax system. Under Bill 5, the proposed Public Sector Employer Amendment Act, the new model would streamline and harmonize the government's direction for non-union compensation across Alberta's public sector, ensuring unionized and out-of-scope employees receive comparable pay for comparable work. Finally, Alberta's government has introduced Bill 6, the Public Health Amendment Act, to ensure that decisions made during declared states of public health emergencies are made by the people Albertans voted for. If passed, Bill 6 would create clear lines of authority related to public health decisions and affirm that the people elected by Albertans should make the final decisions based on scientific and medical public health factors during public health situations.

What an honor, privilege, and learning experience this

last week has been. It has provided me with a renewed energy to continue to learn about, advocate for, and stand up for my Drayton Valley-Devon constituents both in the House and in the riding.

This coming week, we must acknowledge and honor our Veterans. On November 8th, I encourage my constituents to take a moment and remember our Indigenous Veterans and the sacrifices they made for our extraordinary country on National Indigenous Veterans' Day. My family, my staff, and I will be attending numerous Remembrance Day Ceremonies within the riding on November 11th to commemorate all the sacrifices made by our Veterans and their families.

In closing, I want to express my deepest gratitude to each and every one of you, my constituents, for the trust you've placed in me. Serving you in this capacity has been an immense privilege and responsibility, and I consider it an honor to represent your voices and concerns. As I continue to work on your behalf, please know that I do so with a sense of duty and humility, always mindful of the faith you've shown in me. May our shared journey be one of progress, unity, and prosperity. Together, we can accomplish great things. I am humbled by your trust, and I am blessed to have you as my constituents.

# MANDATORY HOLOCAUST EDUCATION FOR ALBERTA STUDENTS

As Alberta's government continues its work to develop a new social studies curriculum, Holocaust education will be a mandatory component.

During the Second World War, Adolf Hitler and his Nazi government and military systematically targeted, arrested, abused and eliminated people they described as subhuman. At the top of their list were Jewish people. Between Jan. 30, 1933, and May 8, 1945, the Nazis killed about six million Jews in Europe. Every January, the world recognizes International Holocaust Remembrance Day.

and the Jewish community additionally recognizes Holocaust Remembrance Day, or Yom HaShoah, each spring, reiterating the phrase "Never Again."

Alberta's government is ensuring students learn about the Holocaust and its important historical and contemporary significance throughout their education. Alberta Education will work with partners in the education and Jewish communities to explore where and when this content should be covered.

"The Holocaust is currently a mandatory topic in the senior high social studies curriculum and teachers would fully expect it to be incorporated

in any forthcoming revision - we welcome consultations on how best to do this. The Holocaust is an event of singular importance in modern history that, sadly, embodies lessons that continue to resonate today. Coming to an understanding of the origins and horror of the Holocaust helps Alberta students to better understand the need to respect, affirm and defend the lives, dignity and rights of all persons and so prepares them to become active citizens participating in Canada's democratic society."

Alberta Education is in

the process of engaging with education partners, curriculum specialists and teachers on the development of new K-12 social studies curriculum. As part of this process, Alberta Education will engage with the Calgary Jewish Federation, Jewish Federation of Edmonton and other Jewish organizations. Feedback from these engagement activities will be used to solidify when and where students learn about the Holocaust in draft social studies curriculum before it is released for further engagement.

Last week, Alberta celebrated a court's confirmation that the federal Liberals' climate policies are unreasonable and unconstitutional. Over a year ago, Alberta contested the federal government's decision to label plastic as a 'toxic substance,' arguing it's an unconstitutional intrusion into provincial jurisdiction. In a recent ruling, Justice Angela Furlanetto deemed it "unreasonable and unconstitutional" to classify all plastic products as toxic, emphasizing that the federal government acted beyond its authority. The court clarified the principles of cooperative federalism, stressing the provinces are not subordinate to the federal government.

Premier Danielle Smith

Minister Rebecca and Schulz pointed out that Ottawa's policies jeopardize thousands of jobs and billions of investments. Alberta's petrochemical sector, with over \$18 billion in projects, faces unnecessary risks due to federal overreach. This marks the second instance in two months that the Liberals' climate policies were rejected by the highest courts.

The United Conservative government continues to oppose damaging federal policies, contrasting with the Notley NDP, whose attempt to rebrand after the recent court decision reflects their denial of responsibility for economic and environmental policies. Despite their efforts, the NDP's history and policies remain clear to Albertans, reinforcing why they can't be trusted to lead the province.

Premier Smith and the United Conservative team are attentive to Albertans' needs, working to maintain the province's leadership in economic prosperity, freedom, and opportunity. Alberta is back, and efforts will persist to uphold this status.

Last week was also Constituency week and it was busy! I attended many stakeholder meetings and community events. On November 15th, I attended the Metis Flag Raising Ceremony in Drayton Valley hosted by the Metis Local #888. It was an honor to be invited to attend such an important event. 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# THWART-OFF CYBER CRIME THIS HOLIDAY SEASON

The holiday season is just around the corner, which means more and more people will be shopping for presents. Online shopping has become an increasingly popular and convenient way to find deals and cross things off our lists. With both Black Friday and Cvber Monday taking place this month, many Albertans will be handing out their credit card details in exchange for deals this month.

In the Alberta RCMP's jurisdiction in 2022 there were a total of:

• 34 reports of unauthorized use of credit card data (4 in November and 2 in December); • 726 reports of Theft, Forgery, Misuse of Credit Card (53 in November and 47 in December);

- 1,796 reports of Fraud (money/proper-ty/security) greater than \$5,000 (183 in November and 150 in December); and
- 5,653 reports of Fraud (money/property/security) less than or equal to \$5,000 (445 in November and 401 in December).

The Alberta RCMP reminds all online shoppers to protect their personal and financial information making online purchases.

Here are some tips to protect yourself while shopping online:


• Don't reuse passwords; change them often, and be sure to use a combination of letters, numbers, and special characters to create a strong one!

- Many websites, especially social media platforms, offer the option of multi-factor authentication. Multi-factor authentication makes it more difficult for criminals to access your accounts by needing more than one piece of identifying information.
- Review privacy settings regularly in order to control who can see what personal information is posted to your profile.
- Don't purchase anything using public Wi-Fi; shop using your own data connection or a trusted network.
- Buy from reputable sources and don't let unbeatable prices cloud your judgement. Research

retailers before purchasing.

- Install updates on your devices as soon as you're prompted. Updates fix security issues.
- Phishing is a commonly used tactic for cyber crime. Phishing messages ask you to validate information by clicking links and may threaten you with legal action. Verify legitimacy by calling the company directly.

### GAETZ LANDING II PROJECT FUNDING ANNOUNCEMENT

Leduc Regional Housing Foundation (LRHF) announced today that they have broken ground on their Gaetz Landing II project, an addition to the existing Gaetz Landing. The Gaetz Landing II project will see an additional 24 one-bedroom units along with an elevator added to the existing building. A minimum of 25 per cent of those units will be dedicated to women fleeing violence and 25 per cent of the units will be fully accessible.

The Gaetz Landing II project was made possible through the collaboration and commitment of funding from Leduc Regional Housing Foundation and all three levels of government - municipal, provincial and federal.

In December of 2022, Leduc Regional Housing Foundation

committed to contribute \$1.4 million \$650,000 in cash plus land.

In January of this year, the seven (7) municipalities within the Leduc Region – Leduc County, City of Leduc, City of Beaumont, Town of Devon, Town of Calmar, Town of Thorsby, and Village of Warburg – came together to contribute \$500,000 towards the project.

In April of this year, the Government of Alberta announced that Leduc Regional Housing Foundation were the recipients of \$2 million in joint funding through the Canada-Alberta Bilateral Agreement under the National Housing Strategy.

The much anticipated expansion project came to realization with today's announcement from the Government of Canada that Leduc Regional Housing Foundation will receive \$4.7 mil-

lion towards the project as part of the Rapid Housing Initiative (RHI).

"Leduc Regional Housing Foundation is very proud of the services that we offer throughout the seven municipalities of the Leduc Region. We are excited to announce the addition of 24 more units to our housing portfolio with the Gaetz Landing II project. The breakdown of funding for this project is as follows: • \$4.7 million under the Projects Stream of the third round of the Rapid Housing Initiative • \$2 million of joint funding through the Canada-Alberta Bilateral Agree-

ment under the National Housing Strategy (NHS) • \$500,000 from the Municipalities of the Leduc Region • \$650,000 in cash plus land = \$1.4 million from Leduc Regional Housing Foundation

We are grateful to receive the support from all three orders of government. ### LEDUC RCMP WARN PUBLIC OF 'EMERGENCY SCAM'

Leduc RCMP are advising the public that there has been a number of "Emergency Scams" reported to the detachment this month. These scams are referred to as Emergency Scams, or sometimes "Grandparent" scams.

These scams often involve a phone call being placed to the victim claiming a loved one is injured or in trouble with the courts or law enforcement and a payment is needed to help them. The suspects will often pretend to be a police officer, judge, or family member. Suspects will usually ask for cash; however, they may also ask for payment in gift cards, bitcoin, or e-transfers. The scammers may send an associate acting as a courier to pick up the money in person or ask the

money be mailed.

Leduc RCMP remind the public of the following tips to recognize scams and avoid becoming a victim:

- Scammers use high-pressure tactics like creating a sense of urgency or secrecy to cloud your judgement. Don't be afraid to say no.
- If a person claims to be a police officer or

judge or lawyer, call that police service or court house directly to confirm the situation – police and courts will never demand cash be picked up in person or mailed.

- If you receive a call from someone claiming to be a family member or grandchild in need of money confirm who they are. Seek assistance from someone you trust.
- Don't keep the situation a secret. Scammers will pressure you to lie to your bank, the police or family about what is happening. Talk to family, friends, or loved ones and reach out for help.
- Never give out personal information. Beware of calls where you are asked to provide your name, address, birthdate, Social Insurance Number, credit

card or banking information, and other personal family details.




