



NAVIGATING AN INTERFAITH WEDDING

Celebrating family histories and traditions is a major component of weddings. During a wedding, two families come together and begin to merge their unique takes on life.

When couples tying the knot come from the same cultural or religious backgrounds, fitting the pieces together may be relatively easy. However, when a wedding must incorporate two different religions - each with its specific traditions and requirements - a couple may not know where to start. These tips may help the process along.

Communication

It is important to open a dialogue with all involved parties at the onset to be able to craft a ceremony and subsequent celebration that aligns with the faiths of

the couple and their families. This dialogue shares what everyone expects. Ask everyone to rank the rituals they would like to be included by order of importance, and then use this as a guide when planning the ceremony.

Discuss options

Certain houses of worship may be strict in regard to what they allow during interfaith ceremonies. Conservative congregations may even frown upon marrying outside of one's religion. That may spark an entirely new conversation about converting so couples can be married in the eyes of the church, temple or mosque. More reformed places may be open to blending certain traditions from both faiths. Couples often lean toward having one officiant from each faith at the ceremony to in-

corporate key rites into the wedding.

Neutral ground

Interfaith couples may opt to have the ceremony at a neutral location so they do not appear to be paying favor to one faith over another. Determine if religious officiants can oversee the ceremony outside of a place of worship and still have the marriage recognized by the tenets of that faith.

Secular officiant

In instances when it may seem like there are too many obstacles to having faith-guided ceremonies for interfaith weddings, wedding planners may suggest some creative solutions, including working with a secular officiant. Traditions such as lighting a unity candle or blending two different sands

together to signify the blending of two faiths and families can be part of the ceremony, suggests the lifestyle company Sheerluxe.

Give others tasks

Couples may be unfamiliar with each other's religious traditions. Sharing faith-specific wedding planning tasks can help couples and their families become more familiar with these customs.

- · Set a good example for your child by showing that you care about others






























INTERNATIONAL MENTORING DAY: MINISTER TURTON

PROPOSED WASTE BYLAW CHANGES AIM TO IMPROVE WASTE DIVERSION IN **LEDUC**

The City of Leduc is considering an updated waste bylaw that would require all multi-unit dwellings in the city to have organic and recycling services by Jan. 1, 2026. The proposed changes passed first reading at City Council on Feb. 5 and will align with the upcoming Extended Producer Responsibility regulation.

To prepare for these changes, the City developed a Multi-unit Sector Waste Diversion Program in 2023 to support property owners who may be required to expand waste collection services in their buildings.

Public engagement was conducted last year with property owners and erty managers would waste haulers to consider their perspective on the current state of waste diversion and anticipated challenges. Their feedback, which was generally positive and highlighted the need for transition support, was integrated into the new program.

"The proposed bylaw changes support our commitment to environmental preservation," says Shawn Olson, Director of Engineering and Environment in the City of Leduc. "With more of the community working together to sort organics and recycling out of their household waste, we will send less waste to the landfill overall and preserve it's lifespan."

If the amended Waste Bylaw is approved, prophave an opportunity to:

- Seek guidance from City staff to prepare their property for the changes
- Receive educational material from the City to share with building residents
- Have a two-year period to renegotiate waste hauling contracts

The proposed bylaw changes also recommend new fine amounts to support compliance:

- Multi-unit buildings that do not meet the Jan. 1, 2026, timeline (\$250); and,
- Households that improperly dispose of waste, such as containments in green carts (\$100).

In June 2023, the City began to use artificial intelligence (AI) technology to scan for contaminants in green organics carts and educate specific households about proper waste sorting before their next collection date. The program has successfully sent over 900 postcards to households between June 2023 and January 2024. We are seeing organic cart contamination rates have dropped from roughly 20 per cent to below 10 per cent. The City has extended the program to the end of 2024 and continues to focus on education with potential enforcement for repeating offences.

The second and third reading of the Waste Bylaw is scheduled to take place on March 4, 2024.

BRETON THORSBY RCMP RESPOND TO **FATAL MOTOR VEHICLE COLLISION ON HIGHWAY 39**



On Feb. 11, 2024, at 7:13 a.m., Breton Thorsby RCMP received a report of a serious motor vehicle collision on Highway 39 at Range Road 32 in Leduc County. Upon arrival, emergency crews located a deceased male in an SUV. The deceased has been identified as a 22-year-old Sherwood Park resident. The other vehicle, an HVAC truck, had two occupants. Both occupants suffered minor injuries and went to hospital as a precaution.

Police remained on scene for several hours investigating the collision. Police have now departed the scene and normal traffic flow has resumed.

Although early into the investigation, RCMP believe that the SUV was travelling on Range Road 32 and failed to stop before crossing Highway 39 where it was struck the passing HVAC truck.

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












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
