WHITECOURT TOWN COUNCIL UPDATE

Submitted by Town of Whitecourt

An application for tree removal at 4420 52 Avenue (vacant property north of No Frills) was issued by Council. The property will be developed with a new commercial retail unit under

a separate application. Work on the property is expected to begin shortly.

Council awarded contracts for Biosolids Disposal to Lambourne Environmental Ltd. for a 3-year term, with an option to extend for a further 2-year period.

The Street Improvement Program contract for 2024 was awarded to E-Construction. The majority of roadwork will be in residential areas this year.

and capital projects completed or in progress for 2023. A Project List for 2024 will be presented once the 2024 Budget is adopted.


The 2024 Strategic Plan was adopted by Council and is available on the Town website. Top four priorities for the Plan include the Intermunicipal Collaboration Framework agreement with Woodlands County, tendering for the Culture & Events Centre, interim documents for the Town's Planning Documents (Municipal Development Plan and Land Use Bylaw) and updating cost estimates for Down-

town Vitalization.

The Town will be making a submission to the Minister of Municipal Affairs Awards for Municipal Excellence under the category of "Enhancing Community Safety" to recognize the Family Violence Initiative for its work in providing services and supports to prevent family violence/sexual violence and to promote and foster safe, healthy, equitable relationships. Supports include assisting with court preparations and the New Hope program.

Council also entered into agreements for the provision of fire services with the Alexis Nakota

Sioux Nation and Alexis Land Management Corp. and with the Alexis Hotel Corporation and Alexis Tourism RV Park Corp. The Animal Pound Services contract was awarded to Whitecourt Veterinary Clinic.

ALBERTA'S WILDFIRE SEASON: INSURANCE EXPERTS SHARE TIPS TO STAY SAFE AND PROTECT YOUR PROPERTY

With experts warning that 2024 could pose significant wildfire risk, Insurance Bureau of Canada (IBC) is reminding Albertans to be prepared for some potentially difficult months ahead.

“As reported by Alberta Wildfire, firefighters are already battling numerous fires across the province,” said Rob de Pruis, National Director, Consumer and Industry Relations, IBC. “During the record-breaking 2023 wildfire season, fires started very early, spread extremely quickly and

kept emergency responders busy throughout the year. In many cases, residents in affected areas had only a short time to evacuate. And 2024 promises to be another intense wildfire year. Wildfires are a real and present danger, especially if you live in a heavily forested area. However,

there are steps you can take to help protect your family, your home or your business.”

Information about the current forest fire danger, forest fire activity and fire restrictions across the province can be found on the Government of Alberta's Wildfire webpage. Residents can also access the Government of Alberta's Wildfire Status Dashboard for real-time information on active fires, current fire danger across the province, and restricted fire zones in effect.

“IBC is urging Albertans to stay alert and follow the advice of local authorities when it comes to fire bans,” added de Pruis. “In the event that you are evacuated, make sure you plan as you could be out of your home for more than one or two days. Last year, many individuals and families were displaced for several days or longer.”

All standard homeowner's and tenant's insurance policies cover damage caused by wildfire. Most policies also cover additional living expenses, such as for hotels or other accommodation, if you are evacuated. During major weather events or wildfires, insurance companies may initiate temporary limitations on the sale of new policies in areas under imminent threat. Therefore, ensure you have the right coverage well in advance of a potential severe weather event or wildfire.



OK, so what all this fancy language means is that County owned lands have been identified for redistricting to commercial recreation in preparation for expanding the Sangudo Riverside Campground.

In order to amend the Land Use Bylaw for redistricting, a bylaw must be drafted and a public hearing held first under the provisions of Part 17 of the *Municipal Government Act* (Sections 216.4, 606, 632, 640 and 692).

The above is to let folks know about when and where the Public Hearing will take place.

Alberta's Wildfire Season: Insurance Experts Share Tips To Stay Safe And Protect Your Property

1. Install and regularly maintain smoke and CO alarms in your home. Remove dust from your alarms, replace batteries when the clocks change in spring and fall, test alarms regularly and replace them at least every 10 years.

2. Create an emergency preparedness plan and a disaster safety kit for your family. Develop a fire evacuation plan, practise it and stick to it in an emergency. Also, prepare a basic kit of food, water and other necessities in case of evacuation

3. Keep your insurance policy number and insurance company claims department phone number with you. If your home is damaged or you are evacuated, you will be able to contact your insurer more easily to start the claims process. Review and understand what coverage you have, and how your policy will respond if a wildfire affects you.

Actions you can take now, particularly if you live near a forest or wooded area:

4. Prepare your home. Check that your home's roof and exterior walls and the undersides of balconies are treated with flame-resistant materials.

5. Properly store flammable materials. Store gasoline, solvents or other materials that may ignite, at least 10 metres away from your home.

6. Remove dry leaves and debris. Keep leaves, other dry materials and potentially flammable garbage away from the exterior of the house, especially if you have wood or vinyl siding.

7. Manage space around your home. Remove combustible material such as shrubs, trees and woodpiles within 10 metres of your home.

8. Read these valuable resources from FireSmart Canada for in-depth information about wildfire resilience and steps you can take to minimize wildfire risk

How to reduce your risk when wildfire season is in full swing:

9. Stay informed about the weather. Be sure to monitor local and provincial information sources for fire bans and warnings.

10. Pay attention to fire danger ratings. Take note of and obey fire bans and restrictions to know the likelihood of, and prevent, wildfire igniting in your region. Check your lo-

cal government's website for more information.

As reported by IBC earlier this year, severe weather in 2023 caused over \$3.1 billion in insured damage across Canada. Between 2020 to 2023, extreme weather in Alberta resulted in \$3.6 billion in insured losses. IBC is continuing to engage with the federal and provincial governments on ways to improve the climate resilience of commu-

nities across the country. Insured losses related to severe weather in Canada now routinely exceed \$2 billion annually. By comparison, between 2001 and 2010, Canadian insurers averaged \$675 million a year in losses related to severe weather.

MORE SPACES AT SAFE PLACES FOR VULNERABLE WOMEN

Alberta's government is keeping its promise to provide an additional \$10 million over four years to strengthen women's shelters and fund more beds.

Every year, thousands of women experiencing family violence and abuse seek help from women's shelters. These shelters help survivors overcome some of the darkest circumstances of their lives by providing a safe, supportive environment and critical supports, but have faced capacity challenges and increased demand for services.

Alberta's government is proud to support women's shelters and the valuable work they do to keep Al-

bertans safe. Right now, \$5 million is being distributed to women's shelters in 17 communities across the province to create additional spaces for those fleeing violence. If passed, Budget 2024 would see Alberta increase annual funding to women's shelters by \$5 million over the next three years.

"Vulnerable women and children should always have a safe place to turn. By delivering on our election promise to women's shelters, our government is helping keep more Alberta families safe, and empowering survivors' healing journeys."

is engaging extensively to create a made-in-Alberta action plan that supports survivors and addresses the root causes of gender-based violence. This funding would help women's shelters across the province continue to address the needs of women and girls escaping violence, building stronger communities."

Alberta's government is rolling out the full \$10 million over four years, \$5 million in 2023-24, \$1.5 million in 2024-25, an additional \$1.5 million in 2025-26, and \$2 million in 2026-27. This investment is funding an additional 104 beds at shelters across the province, including doubling the

number of beds available in Whitecourt and adding new beds at the Banff YWCA and Eileen's Place.

In addition, funding will support innovative programs to help meet high demand in rural areas. Solutions to enhance supports for rural shelters include \$350,000 for Rowan House Society's new, first-of-its-kind program in High River, which empowers women to have agency over their choices while experiencing domestic violence, as well as \$275,000 for Big Hill Haven in Cochrane, which has no physical shelter and rents units so those fleeing abuse have somewhere local to stay.

government is delivering on its funding commitment with a significant investment up front, as well as providing more flexibility for women's shelters to better address survivors' needs."

Hold The Phone: Alberta RCMP Warns The Public Against Mass Marketing And Phone Scams

This week's theme focuses on mass marketing and phone scams, which includes, but is not limited to:

- Phone scams;
- Fraudulent telemarketers;
- Mass mailouts and/or subscriptions;
- Emergency and/or grandparent scams;
- Work from home schemes;
- CRA scams;
- Foreign lottery or prize schemes;
- Overpayment schemes;
- Inheritance schemes; and,
- Credit card in-

terest rate reduction schemes.

How can you better protect yourself from these types of scams? Here are some helpful resources:

- Do not provide any personal information to an unknown caller;
- Learn the warning signs of caller ID, email and website spoofing; and,
- You have the right to say no to any questions and directly contact a business to speak to a designated representative.

"Phone scams are typically employed to gain information or money


from a potential victim. If you feel like something is off about an interaction, you have every right to say no and to end the call."



WHAT IS A SMART HOME?

and testing the waters may want to start with the following household items.

- **Smart bulbs:** Manufacturers offer various types of smart light bulbs. Some are color-changing, others react to doorbells or alarms, and others can simulate typical lighting patterns when homeowners are away. Integrated apps enable remote access to

STEPS TO A MORE ORGANIZED, FUNCTIONAL GARAGE

Organization can help homeowners transform their homes into less cramped, more spacious oases without forcing them to finance potentially expensive expansion projects.

another pile for old tools that are no longer useful.

- Host a garage sale. Homeowners who want to organize their garages and make a buck at the same time can host garage sales. Make only those items that are still functional available for purchase, and let neighbors and bargain hunters do the bulk of your organization work for you.

- Designate areas of the garage for certain items. Once the items that won't be going back into

the garage have been sold, donated or discarded, organize the garage by designating areas for certain items, making sure to separate items that can pose safety risks. For example, store kids' bicycles and outdoor toys in a corner of the garage that is opposite the corner where potentially dangerous items such as power tools and gas cans will be stored. Keep the center of the garage open for vehicles.

SAFEGUARD YOUR HOME FROM INSECT INFESTATIONS

The dawn of spring marks the return of many things, including long hours of sunlight and warm temperatures in which to enjoy that sunshine. But homeowners know spring also marks the return of insects, unwelcome guests that can be difficult or expensive to control once they have entered a home.

As problematic as insect infestations can be, preventing such problems can be simple, especially

when homeowners are proactive. The following are a handful of ways to keep insects out this spring and summer.

- Consider potential food supplies and cut those supplies off. Insects often enter a home in search of food, so cutting off potential food supplies is a great way to prevent insects from coming inside. Give dining areas a thorough cleaning after meals, vacuuming or sweeping the floors beneath dining

- tables each night before going to bed. (Parents of young children may want to sweep floors after each meal.) In addition, clean pets' bowls each night to be sure there are no food scraps left that may entice insects, and make sure pet food containers are tightly sealed after each serving. Sinks are another potential food source, so empty food traps after using the sink and run the garbage disposal as well to remove any food that might be lin-

gering.

- Address potential shelters. Insects also seek shelter inside homes, and there are many areas in a home that can provide adequate shelter. Cracks around windows and doors and in the foundation provide both entry points and potential shelters for insects. Seal such cracks with caulk, testing the areas by feeling for any incoming air.

If you still feel air coming in, there is still some sealing to do. Cracks in cabinets or counters also may provide shelter to insects, so address these areas as well.

· Reconsider exterior lighting. Exterior lighting may be inviting insects into your home. Insects tend to congregate around lights at nighttime, so avoid placing lights right outside entryways. Once doors are opened, insects can then fly right into your home. Keep exterior lights as far away from entryways as possible. If you need lights right outside your doors, install motion-sensing lights that only turn on when you come within a few feet of the door. This reduces the volume of insects that congregate outside your entryways, and lowers the risk that insects will follow you in when you arrive home at night.

· React quickly upon seeing insects. Insect infestations happen gradually, so homeowners should react quickly when seeing a single insect or a handful of insects inside their homes. The slower your response, the more likely one or two intruders is likely to turn into a large infestation. Immediately clean any ar-

reas where you see insects, and take more substantial measures if your initial efforts were not enough to prevent more insects from

coming in.

The presence of insects inside a home can be a nuisance, but there are many ways to prevent

such infestations and keep unwelcome guests at bay.

A lot has gone on over the past few weeks – in particular as things relate to the Town of Onoway and it's decision to terminate the contract early. Until this week, we have not been able to say too much on the matter because we had not received official notice until March 11th. As to our official position regarding the termination, I can not comment as the matter is under review by our legal council.

What I can tell you is that this decision came without and consultation or warning. We are in receipt of the motion that was carried in September 2023 stating the Town of Onoway's intent to negotiate in good faith with Fire Rescue International (FRI) with the goal of entering another long-term contract. I can also confirm that we have been invited

to attend a round-table discussion on March 8th that was to be the pre-negotiation meeting for the next agreement. Unfortunately, as it turns out, on February 22nd, council passed a motion to terminate the agreement early. What precipitated this this change in the town's position is completely unknown to FRI. What we do know is that as per the Onoway's media release, the decision has nothing to do with the performance of FRI. Frankly, FRI's performance statistics speak for themselves. We have also heard that the decision was based on money, but can not confirm this much less understand such an argument. By our calculations, the Town of Onoway generates a gross profits of \$20,000.00 per year hosting a station and administering the contract.

From the view of your fire department, the matter of Onoway's termination is mostly an issue that needs to be worked out between the ratepayers of the town and their council. Although we do not believe termination if the fire ser-

vices agreement will save Onoway a penny and see no option that could possibly bring better service, this matter shouldn't create panic within the other areas we serve. The principals of FRI are people of their word... We are not going anywhere. When FRI entered this agreement, the contemplated end was December 31st, 2025. FRI has no plans to renege on the deal as originally contemplated.

Presuming the balance of our communities also intend to continue in the spirit of the original agreement I can confirm the following:

a) There will be no change to the service levels, response protocols, or pricing for the remaining 9-months prior to March 7th, 2025

b) B) After March 7th of next year, FRI has every intention on fulfilling the original contract term ending December 31st, 2025 with as little change to the service delivery model as possible.

c) C) FRI will undertake to provide a proposal that will allow for

continued operations with the little or no financial impact on the remaining 9-municipalities.

In other words: AS far as Fire Rescue International is concerned, things are business as usual for the next 12- months and for the final 9-months of 2025, we are confident we can work with our team of communities to continue the same fine service our ratepayers deserve at a cost the municipalities can afford. This leaves us ample time to continue our regular contract negotiations as originally planned without undue stress and pressure.

While Onoway residents, visitors, and businesses may have good reason to worry, rest assured; your residents do not. I look forward to your continued faith and support as well as our future agreement to provide long-term and affordable medical aid, firefighting, and rescue services.

The discount will be applied to a range of personal registry services at Alberta registry agent offices. Seniors purchasing personal registry services online through MyAlberta eServices will also be able to access the discount.





