jointly developed by the Government of Alberta and Alberta Health Services (AHS). With the ASI funding, the hospital has been able to increase the number of operating room nurses and operating room hours.



- Pay attention to your billing cycles.

- 3) Guard your mail. Deposit outgoing mail in post office collections boxes or at your local post office. Promptly remove mail from your mailbox after delivery. Ensure mail is forwarded or re-routed if you move or change your mailing address.
- 4) Utilize passwords on your credit card, bank and phone accounts. Avoid using easily available information like your mother's maiden name, your birth date, the last four digits of your SIN or your phone number.
- Minimize the identification information and number of cards you carry.
- 6) Do not give out personal information on the phone, through the mail or over the internet unless you have initiated the contract or know whom you're dealing with.
- 7) Keep items with personal information in a safe place. An identity thief will pick through your garbage or recycling bins. Be sure to tear or shed receipts, copies of credit applications, insurance forms, physician statements and credit offers you get in the mail.
- 8) Give your SIN only when absolutely necessary; ask you use other types of identifiers when possible.
- Don't carry your SIN card; leave it in a secure place.

Rocky Mountain House RCMP Advise Residents To Shelter In Place Update



A release with charge information may be completed once charges are sworn.






CENTRAL ALBERTA DISTRICT CRIME REDUCTION UNIT (CAD CRU) MAKE SIGNIFICANT SEIZURE AND LAY CHARGES

On April 11, 2024, CAD CRU were asked to assist Thorsby/Breton RCMP with a break and enter investigation. RCMP received information that a civilian was following a suspect vehicle believed to be involved in a break and enter when it slowed and then shot at the civilian

As a result of the investigation, CAD CRU identified a suspect and requested assistance from Edmonton Police Service in conducting surveillance. As a result of their assistance, RCMP were able to obtain two search warrants, one for a property in Breton Detachment area and one for a residence in Parkland Detachment area.

On the morning of April 12, 2024, a break and enter was reported in Rimbey Detachment area, where numerous items including a truck and trailer were reported stolen. This truck and trailer, along with another truck, were observed returning to the Breton residence, at which time RCMP Emergency Response Team executed the search warrant. During this, one of the suspects used the vehicle he was driving and rammed police vehi-

cles in an attempt to escape. This vehicle was later was determined to be a stolen vehicle which had been re-vinned. Both drivers were arrested, which a search incidental to arrest resulted in the seizure of the following:

- a loaded 9mm Beretta
- 682 grams of suspected methamphetamine
- 70 grams of suspected cocaine

Also inside the vehicle were numerous items that had been stolen from the Rimbey break and enter. It is believed that all items taken from this break and enter were recovered, including a truck and trailer, a gun safe containing 8 hunting rifles/shotguns, jewellery, passports, and food.

The search of the Breton property identified numerous stolen items, including the following:

- Vehicles
- Side by sides
- Snowmobiles
- Tools
- Flat deck trailers
- A hot tub

The approximate value of the recovered items at this scene is \$120, 000

The Parkland residence search warrant was also executed on the

same day. As a result of this search warrant, the following was seized:

- Vehicles
- Holiday trailers
- A side by side
- Enclosed trailers
- Flat deck trailers
- A boat
- 2 firearms

The approximate value of the recovered items at this scene is \$320, 000

As a result of this investigation, Justin Handbury (38), a resident of Alder Flats, has been charged with 64 offences, some of which include:

- Break and Enter (x2)Possession of stolen
- property over \$5000 (x15)
- Possession of stolen property under \$5000 (x7)
- Possession of a restricted / prohibited firearm
- Possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking (x2)
- Possess/Transfer/Sell and Identity Document (x5)

After a Judicial Interim Release Hearing, Handbury was remanded into custody and will be appearing in Alberta Court of Justice in Drayton Valley on April 16.

Marlace Monds (37), a resident of

Alder Flats, has been charged with multiple offences including:

- Possession of stolen property over \$5000 (x14)
- Possession of stolen property under \$5000 (x7)

Monds was released for court in Alberta Court of Justice on April 24 in Breton.

Jesse Jeffcott (41), a resident of Alder Flats, has been charged with the following:

- Break and enter and theft of firearm
- Theft of motor vehicle
- Theft of property over \$5000 (x2)

After a Judicial Interim Release Hearing, Jeffcott was remanded into custody and will be appearing in Alberta Court of Justice on April 19, 2024, in Ponoka.

The investigation continues. RCMP would like to recognize the support units who assisted in this successful investigation, including CAD CRU, Breton/Thorsby RCMP, Parkland RCMP, Drayton Valley RCMP, Critical Incident Program, Police Dog Services, Auto Theft Unit and RPAS.

STUDENTS APPLY FOR NEW BSCN PROGRAM IN DRAYTON VALLEY

Drayton Valley's new Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BScN) program is starting strong as 46 potential students applied by deadline for one of nine spaces this fall.

The University of Calgary (UCalgary) and Alberta Health Services (AHS) have partnered with the Town of Drayton Valley to offer the 3.5-year registered nursing degree, starting in September.

UCalgary delivers the program, AHS provides the hands-on clinical space, and the Town offers up classrooms at the Clean Energy Technology Centre.

"We were very pleased with the number of applications received by the March 1 deadline," says Dr. Heather Bensler, Assistant Dean - Academic Partnerships with UCalgary Faculty of Nursing.

"There are a number of moving parts in getting a program like this up and running, but one of the critical pieces is the quality of candidates. As we go through the applications, we are encouraged to see many strong applicants from the rural area."

Students have applied from several communities in addition to Drayton Valley, including Rocky Mountain House, Tomahawk, Millet, Stony Plain and Buck Lake – all within the required catchment area in which applicants must reside as part of their eligibility criteria.

Students will hear by the end of May as to whether they are accepted to start this fall.

"We are excited to see these

promising students get down to work to learn the ins and outs of rural nursing," says Carolyn Trumper, AHS Executive Director of Integrated Quality Management, Professional Practice & Education, Planning & Performance and Clinical Information Systems.

"We are confident they can take on the challenge of learning these valuable skills – and we are hopeful they will then consider a health-care career here."

Recruiting nursing staff, especially to rural sites, has been challenging across Alberta.

First established in Wainwright, the rural nursing degree program has been developed to reduce barriers to learning, recruit students to healthcare careers, and encourage graduates to stay in their home communities.

The Drayton Valley program will run for two cohorts of students, with intakes this year and next, with the goal of preparing 18 nursing graduates.

"I am delighted that our community has received an overwhelming response with over 40 applications for the University of Calgary's rural routes nursing program," said Drayton Valley Mayor Nancy Dodds.

"This level of interest demonstrates our commitment to addressing the nursing shortage in our region. We are proud to be part of the solution and look forward to the positive impact this program will have on our community's health and well-being."

Motorists should expect delays and follow the posted speeds and detours.


The beam installation is one step in the bridge configuration work and will be followed by construction of the bridge deck.



Yesterday, Leduc County Council approved the \$101.2-million operating and \$24.4-million capital budgets to support program and service delivery for 2024. This also includes \$28.9 million collected on

Between 2023/24, Leduc County experienced notable growth in its overall assessment values from \$9.24 to \$9.86 billion. Given the additional tax dollars from this increase in assessment, Leduc County Coun-

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


