SUPPORTING COMMUNITY JUSTICE INITIATIVES

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government is investing \$961,000 to support community justice initiatives that serve the unique needs of Alberta communities.

Resolving legal matters outside the traditional court system is faster, cheaper and less stressful for everyone involved. The Alberta Community Justice Grant reflects the Alberta government's commitment to making the justice system more accessible, inclusive and responsive to the needs of the province's diverse communities. It will give more options for resolving criminal, family and civil justice matters through a process that is culturally sensitive and aligns with people's values.

For the 2023-24 fiscal year, 39 grant recipients from across the province were selected to receive grant funding, including nine in Calgary, nine in Edmonton, five in southern Alberta, 11 in central Alberta and five

Alberta's new Drought and Flood Protection Program is now accepting applications for projects to help protect homes, businesses and lives.

Many parts of Alberta have experienced flooding in recent years, while others have seen water shortages and may face severe drought this year. Many communities need assistance in developing the expensive local infrastructure needed to protect residents from extreme weather events.

To help, Alberta's government is launching the new \$125-million Drought and Flood Protection Program. Municipalities and Indigenous communities across the province can now apply for funding to improve their drought and flood resilience and adapt to severe weather.

"We are helping communities build the infrastructure they need to help protect people's homes and keep businesses going during droughts or floods. These emergencies can devastate public infrastructure and private property, damage the environment, disrupt our economy and put lives at risk. That's why I encourage any and all communities to apply."

The Drought and Flood Protection Program builds on the work of the Alberta Community Resilience Program. This year, \$25 million is being made available for projects to benefit communities across the province that are facing drought and flood. Another \$100 million will be available for funding over the next four years, with applications accepted each year.

The Drought and Flood Protection Program will help communities design and construct projects that protect critical infrastructure from drought and flooding and help ensure public safety is protected. This could include important drought-related projects to improve water storage, upgrading open-ditch irrigation canals to reduce water loss through evaporation, or relocating water intakes to help communities access water during dry periods. It could also include flood-related projects, such as berms, flood walls and other infrastructure.

Applications for shovel-ready projects are strongly encouraged, but all projects that meet the eligibility criteria will be considered for funding. All municipalities, Improvement Districts, Special Areas, Metis Settlements and First Nations are eligible to apply by June 6, 2024.

Families of wildland firefighters are now eligible for Alberta's Heroes' Fund.

Alberta's first responders put their lives on the line each day to protect their communities. The Alberta Heroes' Fund for First Responders (Heroes' Fund) was established in 2020 to recognize those risks and sacrifices. Alberta is the only province with a fund of this kind. It provides a one-time, tax-free payment of \$100,000 to eligible families of first responders who have lost their lives performing their duties, such as police officers, paramedics and firefighters.

Alberta's government is now expanding the fund's eligibili-

ty, through an order-in-council, to include the families of fallen wildland firefighters.

"There is no higher form of public service than to risk one's life to maintain public safety, and Alberta's government is honouring that. Being eligible for the Heroes' Fund recognizes the great risks our wildland firefighters take to protect our lives and com-

munities. While I know the payment cannot bring back their loved ones, it will help ease the burdens for families of fallen wildland firefighters."

Eligibility for Heroes' Fund payments now extend to workers who fight, suppress or extinguish a wildfire, such as firefighters on the ground and helicopter and water bomber crews. The Workers' Compensation Board (WCB) is responsible for determining eligibility on a case-by-case basis.

"These fallen wildland firefighters and their families have made the ultimate sacrifice while protecting the people and communities of Alberta and their sacrifice will not be forgotten. This monetary support will never be enough, but it is hoped that it will ease some of the financial burden facing families who must deal with the loss of a loved one."

In addition to wildland firefighters, those eligible for Heroes' Fund payments include the families of structural firefighters employed by a municipality or Metis Settlement, police officers, sheriffs, provincial correctional officers and paramedics.

"I'm proud that we're expanding the province's Heroes' Fund to include our wildland firefighters. They go to work every day, knowing the sacrifice they and their families may be faced with. Albertans owe a debt of gratitude to the brave men and women who work tirelessly throughout the wildfire season to protect our communities and forests."

PARKLAND RCMP REQUESTS ASSISTANCE FROM THE PUBLIC

On April 29, 2024 at about 4:30 pm, Parkland RCMP began an investigation into a complaint of objects being launched at vehicles, where in this case, a school bus was struck. Parkland RCMP are requesting assistance from the public who may have private dashcam footage while travelling along Golf Course Road, between Fairway Drive and Highway 628 on April 29, 2024 between 3:30 pm – 4:30 pm.

Police are also interest-

ed if the public has noticed any suspicious activity on or near Golf Course Road during the weekdays between the same time frame. Throwing or launching anything toward the highway at oncoming vehicles is extremely dangerous and it can cause serious harm to vehicle drivers, passengers and/or pedestrians. Police would like to speak with anyone who may have information about this event or dashcam footage, as this is a serious public safety concern.

PARKLAND RCMP INVESTIGATE CHILD LURING SEEKING TO IDENTIFY ADDITIONAL VICTIMS

On April 22, 2024, Parkland RCMP began investigating a complaint of child luring and sexual assault of a youth. The fast-evolving investigation included two judicial authorizations to search an Edmonton residence and a motor vehicle. With the assistance of the ZE-BRA Centre and the Parkland RCMP General Investigation Section, on April 24, 2024, Parkland RCMP arrested and charged a 29-year-old male. Resources have been provided to support the family and the victim.

Edmonton resident, Kendrik Bozman (29) has been charged with:

- Sexual Interference;
- Sexual Assault;
- Luring a Child.

•

Bozman was brought before a Justice of the Peace and he was released on a release order with conditions on April 25, 2024. His next court appearance is on May 8, 2024, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Stony Plain.

Police are investigating the

possibility that there could be additional victims in Alberta. In this case the victim and suspect were not known to each other and that Snapchat was utilized to lure the youth. Bozman utilizes the Snapchat profile name "Dagshelgr" and police advise that it is not uncommon for perpetrators to utilize alternative social media platforms and different user names. Police encourage parents to talk to their children about this incident and immediately report to the police if there has been any contact

with Bozman.

Police also encourage parents to talk to their children about internet safety. Parkland RCMP encourages the public, including parents, families and youth to visit the Canadian Centre for Child Protection website for additional resources.

To protect the identity of the youth, there is a publication ban, and the victim cannot be named.

PARKLAND RCMP SEIZE DRUGS, MONEY AND LOADED GUNS

On March 11, 2024 at approximately 3:30 pm a traffic stop was initiated by the Alberta Sheriffs for a traffic violation on Highway 16 near Highway 60. During the traffic stop the Sheriff observed a several weapons, including a firearm, and drug paraphernalia. The suspect was arrested and the Parkland RCMP was contacted to assist with the investigation. Parkland RCMP seized the vehicle and obtained a Judicial Authorization to search the vehicle. Parkland RCMP located and seized a number of items from the vehicle, including but not limited to, a loaded shotgun, two unloaded shotguns, one loaded hand gun, prohibited over capacity magazine, ammunition, hard body armour, multiple knives and a machetes, brass knuckles, 165g of methamphetamine, 92g of cocaine, 3.6g of fentanyl, a quantity of prescription and illicit tablets and \$700 in cash. The suspect

was currently on a 10-year firearms/ammunition prohibition.

Edmonton resident, Markus Busch (45) has been charged with:

• Possession of a controlled substance (x3)

Proceeds of crime
 Unauthorized possession of a restricted firearm

• Unauthorized possession of a prohibited overcapacity magazine

• Possession of a loaded firearm with readily accessible ammunition

• Unauthorized possession of a firearm in a motor vehicle

• Possession of a weapon dangerous to public peace

• Careless use of a firearm

• Possession of a firearm while prohibited

Busch was brought before a Justice of the Peace and he was released on a cash bail with conditions on March 13, 2024. His next court appearance is on May 8, 2024 at the Alberta Court of Justice in Stony Plain, AB.

ANTIMICROBIAL TILES HELP CREATE SANITARY SPACES

Tile can be a worthy addition to rooms with potential moisture issues or areas in a home that may routinely necessitate quick cleanup. Because they are not damaged by constant contact with water, tiled floors and walls are often found in bathrooms, kitchens, laundry rooms, and entryways.

Although tile is resilient, it is not impervious to the microorganisms that tend to proliferate in areas where moisture and humidity are commonplace. Microbes can grow rapidly in warm areas, especially if food is present. Mold or mildew issues also can become problematic seemingly overnight. But certain modifications can help homeowners alleviate the proliferation of microorganisms.

Various manufacturers have developed their own innovative tile that contributes to cleaner, and sometimes more eco-friendly, home environments. The application of certain treatments can make ceramic tiles even more impervious to water and moisture. Some tile may help reduce the spread of certain strains of bacteria, such as E. coli and staph, without requiring the application of potentially harsh chemical detergents. Others treatments may protect against yeast, molds and fungi

that can cause stains and odors and result in the degradation of tile.

Antimicrobial products inhibit the growth of microorganisms and suppress their reproduction. For example, tiles with Microban protection employ an antimicrobial agent built into the product during the manufacturing process. When microbes touch the product surface, the agent penetrates the *Continued on Page 17*

cell wall of the microorganism. Other tiles are treated with micrometric particles of titanium dioxide (TiO2), which is activated by sunlight or artificial light. This causes a photocatalysis process, which is responsible for the product's antipollution and bactericidal properties. Examples of TiO2-treated tiles include Active Clean Air & Antibacterial Ceramic.

Antimicrobial ceramic tile can be advantageous in rooms where sanitation and hygiene are an utmost priority. This includes not only public places, but private residences. Worktops and floors where microbes can be transferred are particularly beneficial areas to install antimicrobial tile.

A potential side effect of antimicrobial tile is a reduction in reliance on harsh cleaning products. Although regular washing is recommended, residents may not need to use odoriferous or strong chemical cleaners to sanitize their homes. This helps improve indoor air quality and reduce the potential contamination of the environment from chemical runoff.

Homeowners thinking of installing antimicrobial tile in their homes should discuss their options with a tile retailer or contractor during the planning stages.
