The body was taken to the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner where an autopsy was performed and the death was deemed as a homicide.

Explore Nature Sanctuary in Lac Ste. Anne County

George Pegg Botanic Garden is partnering with Edmonton and Area Land Trust (EALT) to host a family event on Saturday, June 1st. The Birding Bonanza includes a guided tour of the Lu Carbyn Nature Sanctuary (north of Darwell) plus lots of birding activities at Pegg Garden (north of Glenevis).

The EALT works to protect natural areas to benefit wildlife and people, and to conserve biodiversity and all nature's values, for everyone forever. There are 17 EALT natural areas and we are fortunate to have 2 of them in Lac Ste. Anne County! The land was donated by Lu Carbyn, a renowned wildlife biologist. The network of trails allows hikers to explore this beautiful quarter section of undisturbed Boreal forest and wetlands.

Starting the day at 10:00AM, knowledgeable EALT staff will meet you at the Carbyn site. This is a very special opportunity to walk the trails with Lu Carbyn. Bring your binoculars!

Meanwhile, just 20 minutes east, from noon to 4:00PM at Pegg Garden visitors can walk to the pond for more bird watching, explore the Garden on



ALBERTA RCMP MAJOR CRIMES UNIT INVESTIGATE HOMICIDE IN PARKLAND COUNTY

THE LIBERAL GOVERNMENT'S ATTACK ON AGRICULTURE

The latest report from the Office of the Auditor General offers a damning critique of Canada's approach to climate change within the agricultural sector. It reveals a startling truth: Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada still has no real strategy to curb greenhouse gas emissions, underscoring the NDP-Liberal government's failure to meet its out-of-touch 2030 emissions reduction goals. Their environmental policies have done nothing to help the environment and have been destructive to the agriculture industry.

The report acknowledges that the agricultural sector plays a significant role in helping with environmental challenges through the adoption of certain management practices, such as zero tillage. Yet, the socalled beneficial practices promoted by the Liberals amount to nothing more than burdensome restrictions placed on farmers. These policies, disguised as environmental safeguards, effectively serve to destroy agricultural productivity in the name of combating climate change.

These Liberal measures do nothing to improve the environment but instead, punishes hard-working farmers and Canadians. Since 2020, the Liberal government has aggressively imposed fertilizer and methane emission restrictions, mandating a 30% reduction in usage. The most significant burden, however, comes from the NDP-Liberal carbon tax, which levies heavy fees on various energy sources critical to farming operations. Despite efforts by Conservatives, including the introduction of Bill C-234 to exempt essential farming activities like grain drying and barn heating from the carbon tax, the coalition government has continuously blocked these sensible exemptions.

These punitive environmental regulations have yet to demonstrate any measurable success in reducing greenhouse gas emissions or improving climate conditions. These regulations have been increasingly harmful for farmers to produce and sell goods, which costs YOU the consumer, more at the grocery store.

As Common-Sense Conservatives, we stand as the sole defenders of farmers' lives and livelihoods. We recognize the critical importance of agriculture to our nation's health and economy.

I pledge to continue fighting this carbon tax and the ineffective Liberal environmental policies that harm our agricultural sector in Yellowhead.



3 TIPS TO PREPARE TO SELL YOUR HOME

According to Realtor. com, spring is the busiest and best season to sell a home. While a good home can find a buyer any time of year, homeowners might find the buyers' pool is strongest in spring and into summer. If it's in the budget, hire professional landscapers to fix any problematic landscaping or address any issues that arose during the winter. Homeowners with green

thumbs can tackle such projects on their own, but hiring professionals is akin to staging inside the home.

2. Conquer interior clutter.

Clutter has a way of accumulating over the winter, when people tend to spend more time indoors than they do throughout the rest of the year. Homeowners who want to put their homes on the market in spring won't have the luxury of waiting

until spring to do their "spring" cleaning, so start clearing any clutter out in winter, even resolving to make an effort to prevent its accumulation throughout winter. Just like buyers are impressed by curb appeal, they are turned off by clutter. The Appraisal Institute suggests homeowners clear clutter out of their homes before appraisers visit, and the same approach can be applied to open houses. Buyers, like appraisers, see

cluttered homes as less valuable. In addition, a home full of clutter might give buyers the impression, true or not, that the home was not well maintained.

3. Eliminate odors.

A home's inhabitants grow accustomed to odors that might be circulating throughout the house. Pet odor, for instance, might not be as strong to a home's residents as it is to guests and prospective buyers. Because windows tend to stay closed throughout the winter, interior odors can be even stronger come late-winter than they are during the rest of the year. A thorough cleaning of the house, including vacuuming and removal of any pet hair that accumulated over the winter, can help to remove odor. In the weeks leading up to the open house, bathe pets more frequently, using a shampoo that promotes healthy skin so pet dander is not as prevalent. Open windows when the weather allows so

more fresh air comes into the home.

Spring is a popular and potentially lucrative time to sell a home, and homeowners who spend winter preparing their homes for the market may reap even greater rewards.





CONTROL PROBLEMATIC TERMITES

Few things elicit fear in the minds of homeowners like termites. Termites are voracious and can turn wood to pulp wherever they take up residence. Termites have felled massive trees, but they also can bore through the wood in homes, wreaking havoc as they go.

Ants and termites can look similar, so homeowners who suspect they have a termite infestation should learn to distinguish one from the other. A close look at termites can make it easy to identify them. Unlike ants, termites have no "waist," their bodies are more rectangular. A termite also has straight, beaded antenna, while an ant's antennae are bent or elbowed. Termite wings are equal in size, uniform in shape and much longer than their bodies. Ants have a reddish hue, while termites are creamy white. Prevention is always

preferable to having to treat termites after they are established. Termite Web, a site devoted to termite information, states that treating home foundations and surrounding soil with termite spray is often the best course of action to stop subterranean termites from taking hold. If termites are already present, drilling into the floor surrounding the building and using a termiticide may be necessary. Baiting termites outside with wood that is tainted with slow-acting insecticide can eliminate an entire colony in one to four months.

Termite control methods may need to be repeated. A multi-pronged approach using different chemicals may be necessary to kill existing insects and repel further infestations. Trial and error can help homeowners rid their spaces of termites so that they can repair damaged wood and ensure structures are sound.



New funding for student spaces in two post-secondary education programs will help recruit and train rural, remote and Indigenous teachers across Alberta.

Alberta communities are growing as more people choose the province as the place they want to live, work and raise a family. Alberta's government is strengthening the education system and supporting this growth by recruiting and training more teachers across the province to ensure every student has the support they need to succeed in the classroom.

A one-time investment of more than \$1.7 million to community-based Bachelor of Education programs at the University of Calgary and University of Alberta will support 59 students in pursuing their teaching careers within their home rural, remote and First Nations communities.

"Alberta is growing at record levels, and this means we need more teachers in every corner of our province. This new funding will get more teachers to our rural communities and help graduate more Indigenous teachers. I'm proud that Alberta is growing so rapidly, and our government will take real steps to get more teachers into our classrooms."

Rural, remote and Indigenous communities sometimes experience difficulties recruiting and retaining teachers for their classrooms. However, those who can study closer to home are more likely to remain in their home community after they finish their education. By enabling education students to complete most of their studies while living and working in rural, remote and Indigenous communities, Alberta's government is helping address the challenges of recruitment and retention.

The University of Calgary's Bachelor of Education Community-Based After-Degree Program within the Werklund School of Education provides opportunities for students to be a part of their rural and northern community school system for most of their degree.

"The expansion of Werklund's community-based program is responsive to the needs in rural school districts. We know the diversity of expertise in these communities is phenomenal. This funding will provide committed individuals living in rural areas of Alberta with the access they require to become excellent teachers."

The University of Alberta's Aboriginal Teacher Education Program (ATEP) provides opportunities for Indigenous adult learners to become certificated teachers, with a focus on Indigenous cultures and perspectives on teaching and learning. The program will allow working individuals to complete their certification online, part-time, and outside their working hours.

"ATEP has played a significant role in increasing the number of Indigenous certificated teachers in Alberta classrooms, while enabling them to maintain connections to their communities. Delivered through Indigenous worldviews and pedagogies, the program is transforming education in our province. This investment will expand and advance ATEP's mission of improving the educational experiences of Indigenous students, families, and their communities."

Student cohorts supported by this one-time funding will begin their respective programs starting September 2024 at the University of Calgary and September 2025 at the University of Alberta.

They didn't have the technical background, they didn't think about the ramifications, and they sure as heck didn't think about what would come next. They were all set to have some theoretical argument on the environment, the energy sector, heck even the colour of the sky, but never saw someone asking them to layout the plan, or to ask more questions on something as simple as next steps.

In this field I did have some experience, I did understand how the model worked, how if there was a simple silver bullet solution that it already would have been done. The person who was all ready for a fight, has the wind taken out of their sails, and to their credit, listened to what I had to say. They tried to use my questions back on me, and I had the answers to most, but not to all, because I know enough to know I don't know it all.

I've been fortunate enough to have some great mentors over the years that have taught me these lessons. When I was pitching something to them, or when they were checking up on me for a deliverable, or when I came up with a solution to a problem. How do you know, and then what. If a person takes the time to lay out the next steps, or sometimes, reverse plans from the desired outcome, normally they will be able to trouble shoot the plan themselves. They then will have a few options in case of the "What If's" that pop up along the way as well, so invariably, one plan becomes three, and the chance of meeting the desired outcome becomes vastly improved.

So, when we are looking at legislation, and the ministers or my fellow members are pitching the bill, or law, or regulation that they believe will solve a problem, often the simplest questions can reveal an amendment or change that potentially was not contemplated. By the time it makes it through the policy committee, cabinet, caucus, and then into the house for debate, there literally have been thousands of people that have had their chance to offer input and ask the questions.

We have several pieces of legislation on the floor of the house right now that are being scrutinized, and there will be amendments in all likely hood to address the concerns raised, or suggestions to make it better. It can be very frustrating at times to go through the process, and it is lengthy, but it is with the intent to make sure what we do is the right thing for the majority of Albertans.

Take the time to listen

to others, take the time yourself before shooting out an idea to think about the what if, be prepared to receive comment, and critical input, be humble enough to take it, even from a detractor, because if you can prove vour idea in a hostile environment, it is probably a great idea, and will survive on its own when you aren't there to defend it. So keep asking me, How do you know? and I'll keep asking "what matters to you".



HOW TO MAKE THE MOST OF YOUR DAY ON THE COURSE

Most great golf games are filled with sun, competition and camaraderie, but you can enhance the experience with a few tips that have less to do with your swing, and a lot to do with your 18-hole enjoyment:

Dress for success: The right golf apparel can be as important as the clubs you carry. Check the weather in advance to make sure you'll be as comfortable as possible during play. Determine if you're dressing to impress or to elevate your game. Light, non-restrictive clothing will allow you to swing freely and keep you comfortable and cool in the heat, or warm if the temperature drops. If you're a guest, always check out the dress code at the club you'll be visiting to ensure you comply with the rules.

Choose your company carefully: Your playing partners can have a lot to do with how you play and how you socialize on the golf course. If you're out with friends, you can relax and enjoy the day knowing what to expect. But if it's a game with your boss or clients, always make sure to test the waters. Will they play by the rules or is it just a relaxed day? Are your clients there to play golf or do business? Understanding the landscape on the first tee will alleviate any awkward

moments later on.

Create friendly competition: Sure, there's already a scorecard, but you can add more competitive fun to your game by creating a little friendly rivalry. For example, try a little Bingo Bango Bongo - a points based game that awards a total score based on three kinds of achievement: Bingo – first person on the green gets a point; Bango - the player whose ball is closest to the pin when all balls are on the green gets a point, Bongo -the player who is first to hole out gets a point. Add up the points and the person with the highest total for the round wins.

Walk it off : Make a small 'healthy' tweak to your game by walking vs. taking a cart. When you choose to walk rather than drive 18 holes, you'll cover approximately six kilometres and burn around 1,500 - 2,000 calories. Golfers that ride carts will burn only about 1,100 -1,300 calories.

Say cheers and enjoy: The 19th hole remains one of the best holes on the course. Cap off a great day by enjoying a light meal or a light beer such as Molson Canadian 67, which is brewed to 67 calories per 341ml bottle and 3% ABV. This crisp, refreshing beer can be paired nicely with a protein boost of chicken or fish.




