# SHERIFFS SHUT DOWN ALLEGED DRUG HOUSE IN SPRUCE GROVE

The Alberta Sheriffs have shut down a property in Spruce Grove where complaints of drug activity prompted frequent visits from po-

lice. The Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods (SCAN) unit of the Alberta Sheriffs obtained a court order against the owner of 31 Heatherlands Way that gives investigators the authority to close

the property for 90 days, starting at noon on May 29. Any tenancy agreement or lease of any tenant of the property is terminated effective that date.

obtained in Court of King's Bench, bars people from the property until the closure period ends on Aug. 27. The property will be boarded up, fenced and all the locks will be changed. SCAN unit members will continue to monitor the property for any activity while their investigation remains ongo-

ing. "All Albertans deserve to feel safe

at home and in their communities, and the closure of yet another problem property by Alberta's SCAN team will help ensure that remains the case. I commend all involved in shutting down this known hotspot of illegal activity so Albertans can feel safe in their communities."

The Alberta Sheriffs work with other law enforcement agencies to shut down properties being used for illegal activities. The SCAN unit operates under the Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods Act, which uses legal sanctions and court orders to hold owners accountable for illegal activity happening on their property.

Since its inception in 2008, Alberta's SCAN unit has investigated more than 9,000 properties and issued 120 community safety orders. Most complaints are resolved by working with owners to stop the illegal activity on their property.



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

When someone dies it is a comfort to be able to say they were surrounded by the love of family and friends.

Now families who have a loved one choosing MAID (medical assistance in dying) have another choice on how to share their last memories together. Colleen Sekura and her team at Drayton Memorial have created the Butterfly Room, a space where people can gather to say their goodbyes.

Located in a separate and quiet area of Drayton Memorial (the former United Church), the Butterfly Room is an alternative for those who don't wish to have MAID in their homes, or a clinical setting. In fact, there is nothing clinical about the Butterfly Room at all. A collection of couches and chairs provide plenty of space for friends and family to spend time with their loved ones, and each other, in a setting that resembles a comfortable living room. It's a cozy atmosphere for people to share their final memories and moments.

That was the whole premise behind the creation of the room, said Sekura. A place where friends and families can feel at home and spend the time leading up to the loved one's death, however they choose.

"The important thing is to put people's wishes first, "It is a very personal act that should be respected and done proper-



ly," said Sekura

"Do you want to watch the hockey game or a movie? Do you want a glass of wine? Some people want to be in groups of four or five, and we can accommodate groups up to 30."

Providing comfortable, neutral spaces for MAID is a service that's starting to grow in demand, noted Sekura, and one Dravton Memorial had the room and desire to be able to offer. She is not aware of any other similar service being offered in the local area and it is one she believes is needed. Those choosing MAID may not wish to have it done at home, or in a medical facility, or those options may not be open to them. MAID can take place in any location so long as it is administered or facilitated by a physician or nurse practitioner. Spaces like the Butterfly Room provide another choice for individuals and families.

The individual having MAID can be comfortable in the main part of the room in a spacious recliner, or behind a decorative room divider they can rest in a bed, still with lots of room for people to visit with them. The decision to furnish the room without items usually associated with a clinical setting, such as a hospital bed, was deliberate and made with the individual and their loved ones in mind.

"The Butterfly Room offers refreshments and lunch for attending guests and included in the room rental, Drayton Memorial also provides the services of a death doula to assist in navigating grief and the death process. The Butterly Room is now ready for use and families can rent the space for the day. Family and friends can come and go throughout that time to visit. This may seem like a strange title, but please consider for a moment. What would you be willing to Give up, to move forward? It is a tough lesson to learn, and at some point, a person may reach a level where they have all they want, they are comfortable in their skin, they know what matters most, and they have reached their destination. Then...someone comes in, or something, and upsets your world, your plans as good as they were are no longer relevant, you need to adapt. You may need to move on. So... what are you willing to give up to move forward?

We currently have a number of bills that are going to allow us to use the lessons learned over the last few years, to adapt, to be resilient, and to change what is necessary to move our province forward. We have a bill that will allow us to better respond in collaboration with our municipalities to emergencies, modernizing the prairie fires act. We will move an election period, out of flood and fire season, and into what could be late harvest season. We have another bill that will ensure that when federal dollars come shaking out west that we are at the table with those that may have strings attached. We want to ensure we get our share of our tax dollars, and Albertans should not be dealt a bad hand because we are not wired the same as the province west of us, or way down east. Our universities and municipalities are second to none, so why do we get less?

When I was on the campaign trail last year, I asked folks a real simple couple of questions, do you think our healthcare is broken. The second question was then if so, will you let us fix it? You see, its not a matter of being under funded, it's a matter of needing a reformation of organization, and I would argue of culture. Too big isn't working too good, and having the patient play "ring around the Rosie" with the big cumbersome system does nothing for the best patient outcomes in regards to service levels. We are at present in the house trying to get a bill passed to allow us to fix what folks told us that needed to be corrected.

The cost of living just keeps getting higher and higher! If you don't think that the carbon levy isn't having an effect on everything just compare your grocery, heating, and fuel costs to anyone in the northern state in the USA. They don't have a personal carbon pricing scheme. Fuel is \$0.80 per liter cheaper, heating costs are a 1/3 less expensive, as is the power. We are the only ones that figure taking money out of your pocket to just live will change the weather, to add insult to injurie the feds don't even measure the results of their scheme. They should, but not in tons saved, but lives ruined. It breaks my heart and makes me mad as a hornet.

I know that our team cant boil the ocean, and we can only work on the things within our control, but collaboration to deal with the bigger problems is needed if we can keep the whole deck of cards from collapsing. We have friends at the provincial level and many are sharing their legislation with us on how they manage many of the same federal challenges, and using what we are doing as well. We are signing not only economic corridor Memorandums of Understanding (MOU), but MOU's for nuclear power development. We can deal with adaptability and resilience in our systems, and our infrastructure. We can change the electricity file policies to allow for a grid that not only is reliable but cost effective.

To reach our goals to manage the challenges and ensure our province and people have the best chance for success, we have to make changes, we have to leave some things behind. We have to all realize that due to the circumstances we find ourselves in, we need to adapt and overcome. The good news is, we are seeing our efforts bear fruit. Investments are up, people are moving in, and we are being heard at the federal table, but more importantly on the world stage. When Leaders of foreign countries seek us out specifically, we are doing the right things.

I will continue to work on the "Economic Corridor Development" file as it is gaining some huge traction not only within the provincial government (11 ministries have it written right into their mandate letters) but with our largest trading partner. I've been asked to present the model not only at one Canada USA organization but three this summer alone. I want to be able to have the concept of Fortress North America, by which we are self-sufficient. The Economic corridors are then the pathways to ensure we have responsible and sustainable growth for several generations to come. That translates into investment, jobs, and economic diversity in our own back yards.

Some folks recently have asked what I have been willing to give up to achieve this goal, well it has been a great deal of time and sacrifice of my personal life. The Trolls have been running rampant again, so seeing how this is a local paper, I thought I'd address a few thigs front and center. The love of my life, my best friend and wife along with two of my children have headed south. A professional and personal opportunity came up that was too good not to accept, so they are now in South Dakota for at least a couple of years. I, and my

two oldest children who are now university age, are still planted here in God's country. There was quite frankly a different option, that presented itself to keep our family together, but that would have ended in me having to give up the position as your MLA. I gave my oath, my word to serve, and I still have 3 years left in that commitment. I still have to ensure that the economic corridor model takes hold so it can benefit not only our region, our province, but western Canada for years to come.

I gave my word to help those that needed it, to be their advocate, to be that voice at the table, to represent our area withing the province. So. when folks are taking shots at others, when they are laying it all on the line, when they are willing sometimes to leave things that are so very dear to them to help make things better for not only their family, their community, their province, know full well it is never easy. I strongly believe that all the folks in front line service, first responders, and those that are "elected representatives" are truly trying to do there best, that they are leaving things that they hold dear behind to help move things forward.

So, I put to you, what are you willing to leave behind, to sacrifice, to do what you can to be part of a positive change, not for yourself, but for generations to come. # THE WAR AMPS COMMEMORATES THE 80TH ANNIVERSARY OF D-DAY AND THE BATTLE OF NORMANDY

The Lasting Legacy of War Amputees

On June 6, 1944, a pivotal moment unfolded as thousands of Canadian soldiers stormed Juno Beach in Normandy, in the heavily German-fortified coast of France. As the world prepares to commemorate the 80th anniversary of D-Day and the Battle of Normandy, The War Amps pays homage to the Canadians who made the ultimate sacrifice during the invasion, and the resilience of those who returned home severely wounded, many missing limbs.

These were young men from small towns and the inner cities embodying the true spirit of citizen soldiers during the Second World War. Driven by patriotism, adventure, or simply a sense of duty, they enlisted with the Canadian Army, unaware that they would become the vanguard of the allied invasion of Europe.

Among them were individuals like Ron Reid, Gavin Hickey, Bob Ross, Jim Parsons, Bill Neil and Dave Ingram.

Ron Reid, of Torbay, Newfoundland, suffered severe injuries upon landing on Juno Beach. Amidst relentless enemy machine gun and mortar fire, he lost his left leg above the knee.

Gavin Hickey, hailing from Durham Centre, New Brunswick, was a mere 19 years old when his regiment stormed Juno Beach. Wounded during the battle for Carpiquet, he lost his left leg below the knee and his left hand.

Bob Ross of Niagara Falls, Ontario, was injured during heavy enemy shelling at the Battle of Hill 195, resulting in the loss of his leg above the knee. Many years later, he reflected on his experience and shared, "It was an ordeal. I don't think I would do it again because maybe I couldn't come back the next time."

Jim Parsons, a local of Sherbrooke, Quebec, landed on Juno Beach on D-Day and fought his way inland. Later that year, he lost his left hand and forearm due to an injury. He received a Mention in Dispatches for his bravery in hauling his troop commander out of a burning tank despite having a badly shattered arm.

Bill Neil, from Winnipeg, and

Dave Ingram, of Edmonton, Alberta, were also severely injured during the invasion. Neil, wounded in the Battle of Falaise when his armoured car was hit, lost his left arm above the elbow. Ingram lost his left leg above the knee and part of his right heel after stepping on a landmine during a sniper patrol.

When they returned to Canada, these brave soldiers became members of The War Amps, which was started by amputee veterans returning from the First World War to help each other adapt to their new reality as amputees.

Rob Larman, a Senior Advisor at The War Amps and a leg amputee himself, said, "In the Battle of Normandy, many Canadians died or suffered wounds they had to carry for the rest of their lives. As we mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day, it's important that we never forget."

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# THE HEROES OF NORMANDY

Death struck deeply into those who waded ashore on June 6, 1944. Struggling to quickly move from their landing craft to the sand of Normandy beach. Burdened by the heavy weight of their equipment, and the sights and sounds around them. Before them lay a terrifying array of obstacles waiting to trap, maim, and destroy anyone who attempted to challenge the terrible might of the nazi occupation of France.

Service men and wom-

en came from all across Canada. Local militia units like the South Alberta Regiment, South Alberta Light Horse and the Calgary Highlanders were mobilized for active war service. These part-time "Saturday Night" soldiers were busy in their armouries and drill halls, recruiting and training its new members. Some would find themselves "storming Juno beach" on June 6th, while others arrived sometime later, joining the 3rd Canadian Division as they consolidated their foothold on the Normandy coast.

The liberation campaign slowly progressed



mile by bloody mile across France until Paris was freed on August 25, 1944. In its wake were left countless dead and injured, destroyed towns and cities. Names of places became etched into the memories of the soldiers who fought in battles like Bourguébus Ridge, Carpiquet Airport, Caen, the Falaise "Gap", Vaucelles, and Verrières Ridge. The campaign to liberate France from its occupiers would end up taking the lives of 5,021 Canadian soldiers.

The number of war veterans who fought in the liberation campaign have steadily declined as the years have passed. Fortunately, some of these remarkable old soldiers are still living. They are resilient people who followed a path of duty, endured hardship, faced danger and experienced things we could never imagine. Through the National Order of the Legion of Honour medal program, the Embassy of France in Canada continues to bestow their

nation's highest medal to our veterans who are proudly known as the liberators of France.


