CYANOBACTERIA (BLUE-GREEN ALGAE) ADVISORY ISSUED FÖR PADDLE RIVER DÅM

Submitted by Alberta Health Services

Cyanobacteria (bluegreen algae) has been identified in the waters of Paddle River Dam at the Paddle River Dam Provincial Recreation Area. Residents living near the shores of this lake, as well as visitors to this lake, are advised to take the following precautions:

Avoid all contact with cyanobacterial blooms. If contact occurs, wash with tap water as soon as possible.

Do not swim or wade or allow your pets to swim or wade in any areas where cyanobacteria is visible.

Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake to your pets.

Consider limiting human consumption of whole fish and fish trimmings from this lake, as it is known that fish may store toxins in their liver. (People can safely consume fish fillets from this lake).

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body

of water, including Paddle River Dam, at any time. Boiling of this water will not remove the toxins produced by cyanobacteria. An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock, while this advisory is active.

Cyanobacteria is naturally occurring, and often becomes visible when

weather conditions are calm. Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz, or globs on the surface of water, cyanobacteria can be blue-green, greenish-brown, brown, and/ or pinkish-red, and often smell musty or grassy.

People who come in contact with visible cyanobacteria or who ingest water containing cyanobacteria may experience skin irritation, rash, sore throat, sore red eyes, swollen lips, fever, nausea and vomiting and/or diarrhea. Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced; however, all humans are at risk of these symptoms. Exposure

to the bacteria may be fatal to pets.

Weather and wind conditions can cause algae blooms to move from one location in the lake to another. As such, this advisory will remain in effect for Paddle River Dam, until further notice.

Please note that waters of Paddle River Dam in which the cyanobacterial bloom is NOT visible can still be used for recreational purposes, even while this Health Advisory is in place.

After an extensive review process, and numerous public consultation initiatives, Whitecourt has adopted a new:

• Municipal Development Plan Bylaw – which sets the long-term vision for the community;

• Land Use Bylaw – which is the tool that we use to implement the Town's vision and broader goals; and,

• North Flats Area Structure Plan Bylaw – which outlines the specifi c vision for the lands that lie north of Flats Road and south of the Athabasca River.

Thank you to the Committee members for their hard work and dedication, and to the many residents, stakeholders and agencies that provided input into the creation of these bylaws.

Whitecourt will be proceeding with three energy projects with funding support from the Municipal Climate Change Action Centre's Community Energy Conservation (CEC) Program. CEC has approved 50% funding (\$345,214) to go towards the following projects to help reduce energy consumption, save utility costs, and reduce greenhouse gas emissions:

• McLeod Arena roof replacement at JDA Place.

• REALice, a high-precision water treatment system for ice rinks, will be installed at JDA Place. The system eliminates the need for hot water when building and resurfacing the ice.

• Replacement of two boilers at the Allan & Jean Mil-

lar Centre.

BLUE-GREEN ALGAE ADVISORY IN PLACE FOR LOCAL LAKES

Isle Lake, Paddle River Dam Reservoir, and Lac Ste. Anne

Alberta Health Services (AHS) has issued a BLUE-GREEN ALGAE ADVISORY for Isle Lake and the Paddle River Dam: signs are posted at the affected lakes.

This common algae naturally occurs during the summer months when the days are sunny and hot. Further advisories are anticipated in the region.

To protect yourself and your pets, AHS advises to avoid contact with blue-green algae blooms, don't swim in water where blue-green algae is visible, and do not drink or cook with water from this lake.

If you suspect a problem related to bluegreen algae or if you require further information on health concerns and blue-green algae, please call Health Link at 811. Additional information is also available online at ahs.ca/eph.

Please note that areas of the lake in which the blue-green algae bloom is not visible can still be used for recreational purposes, even while this Blue-Green Algae Health Advisory is in place.

LAC STE. ANNE COUNT

The first time I heard this I believe was back in 2010 from a retired USA Airforce Colonel when he was discussing how the military regarded Alberta when it came to energy security. I've taken that concept, expanded upon it as the way to present the concept of Economic Corridors not only to folks who call the Great White North home, but to our friends, family, and neighbors in the land of the free. Given the current global state of affairs, we have gone from a just in time delivery model, to more of a just in case model. Further, the discussion on resilience, adaptability and "Radical Collaboration" has never been more relevant. In simple terms, build things that last, work together like there is a real need to do so, and make sure we use the stuff we have at hand rather than being dependent on others for our survival. Rural logic, applied in large scale.

With my role as the "Parliamentary Secretary for Economic Corridor Development", I am the Premiers Parliamentary Secretary. Along with being the Premier, she is also the Minister of "inter-governmental affairs", so I have an opportunity as it were to assist in that role, and she has given me a ton of rope to work with. Additionally, I've been assigned to a number of US / Canadian organizations. Organizations I would suggest that we have not fully taken advantage of in the past and have not had the representation by MLA's that we should have. We are changing that.

As a member of the "Energy Council" Alberta and Saskatchewan are the only Canadian Members, the rest are the energy producing states. I was appointed early this year and attended my first meeting in North Dakota this June. I can tell you full well, we have friends, allies, and "Radical Collaborators"(Red Tape Cutters, CAN-adians and Ameri CANs) south of the border that not only want to be extremely environmentally conscientious but want to ensure that we don't loose our competitive advantage when it comes to energy. We also discussed the issues of how we allowed foreign nations to surpass us in the rare earth elements and critical minerals space. It wasn't because they outsmarted us, we let them get past us due to our own policies. The folks there were very happy to see Alberta at the table, engaging fully, and in a very meaningful way!

We had had several small US legislators visit us in May of this year, groups from the Council of State Governments, the Mid-West and West chapters. These groups came independent of each other, but left with similar impressions, and had invited me to come to their executive meetings to present at their Annual General Meetings on the topic of Economic Corridors. I recently returned from Portland Oregon where I presented the concept, and the practical applications of the how. I am leaving this weekend for Columbus Ohio to present at the Midwest meeting. My colleagues across the border, regardless of the party they belong, are very keen to hear more, and to see how they can work with us.

Our Minister of Transportation and Economic Corridors not only re-signed an MOU with the prairie provinces, we just added the Northwest Territories right before the Calgary Stampede. The significance of this is huge, it clearly demonstrates the willingness of the provinces and territories to work together, in building the Northwest part of our country, not only trade relationships but real pathways so that linier infrastructure can be built again in a timely manner. During the Calgary Stampede the Minister hosted an event where the Ambassador of the USA and our Premier spoke, both extolling the importance of the economic corridors that have been in use for years, new

ones to come, and the vital importance Alberta not only plays in Canada, but most specifically, to the US itself. These were not hollow words from the USA Ambassador, but from the heart, and with a clear understanding of the need to ensure that "Fortress North America" comes to fruition. I was quite pleased when the ambassador came over to me to introduce himself, he gave me his challenge coin, shook my hand, and thanked me for the work on the Economic Corridor file.

The following day as it turned out, we were at the same table for breakfast and continued our conversation. I gave him one of my lapel pins, and explained the symbolism that I had chosen. Black and Gold in color for our energy, our provincial shield depicting the prairie, foothills, and mountains. The rams head, as it's our provincial mammal, and after all, they like us, sometimes butt heads to resolve our differences. Two crossed swords, one to protect our province, but just as important, one to protect our country and our allies. He was openly appreciative and began speaking on how many things Alberta has to offer, and that we need to be better at letting others know about it, don't be afraid to say it often. He then gave me his trade mission lapel pin and some more advice on items I should address and discuss on my upcoming conference in Oregon.

When folks ask me what is gong on with the Northern Corridor, or the one out to Hudson Bay, or the west coast they are always happy to hear the progress being made, but they are also surprised that there isn't anything about it in the media. I have no good explanation about that, other than they don't get it, or don't want to get it. So I thought I'd take advantage of our local papers, to share some of the more recent wins. I'll keep spreading the good word of what we have going on here in Alberta, how we want it work with others in the most collaborative way, how we not only want to lay

the foundations for a strong future for ourselves, but for our trading partners. How our experiences, and our resources, are literally the solution to several problems and challenges. I have noted that if we don't tell our story ourselves, our own federal consulates will not, and our trading partners won't hear it. Perhaps that is what the US ambassador was eluding too as well.

When I spoke at the recent grade 12 graduations in Evansburg and Onoway, I wanted to impart some advice to the graduation classes. Nothing too fancy, lofty, or lengthy, something that they could remember. For good measure my staff this year printed some of the more sage items I've come up with over the years on the back of the certificates, and I truly hope that they may come in handy for them, as they have helped me over the years. The basic gist goes like this. Know who you are, where you came from, who those are that truly support you and want the best for you. Be proud of who you are, listen more than you talk, and be willing to come up with a better solution by working with others. Be yourself, because you can't fake authenticity, and people know it. Don't be afraid to speak up, and to do the right thing, it may not be easy, but it's the right thing to do. To keep in mind always, if it was easy, someone else would be doing it, and for less money, everyone gets bucked off, so suck it up buttercup, dust yourself off and get back at it. The most important one is that none of us have this thing called life all figured out vet, but many of us are more than willing to give you some of our time to help you along when you ask for it.

I wish you nothing but the best for the rest of your week, and I thank you for your feedback over the last few months in person, and through the emails. Please keep me apprised of what matters to you

July 24, 2024 Community**VOICE** Page 11 **TRUDEAU GOVERNMENT'S DISHONEST NATO & MILITARY SPENDING PLANS**

Justin Trudeau was the laughingstock at the 2024 NATO Summit for promoting his weak defence policies on the world stage. While announcing an official statement to an empty room in Washington, D.C., Trudeau said that Canada will reach the minimum 2-percent NATO defence spending target by 2032 presently at 1.37 percent.

This will certainly be another failed promise as he has not presented any plan to reach that objective. If the Trudeau Liberals were serious about this commitment, they would have disclosed new investments and funding plans in their 'Defence Policy Update' three months ago.

The real issue behind the lack of defence spending is that the Trudeau Liberals do not care about our military. Since Trudeau rose to power, our Canadian Armed Forces have been underfunded and ignored by this government. Recruitment is falling behind with the military being almost 16,000 members short, procurement of proper resources is absent, and our serving troops are neglected at home and abroad. The Liberal government recently cut \$1 billion in the defence budget for operational funding after eight years of providing \$10 billion dollars with no progress to show for our military.

Like millions of Canadians, our service members are also struggling in this affordability crisis caused by this Liberal government. They have been sent overseas and forced to pay for their own meals and buy their own equipment. Our forces are short over 6,700 housing units, and military families are using food banks to get by. Even

some serving members are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.

CYANOBACTERIA (BLUE-GREEN ALGAE) ADVISORY ISSUED FOR LAC STE. ANNE

Cyanobacteria (bluegreen algae) has been identified in the waters of Lac Ste. Anne, located in Lac Ste. Anne County. Residents living near the shores of this lake, as well as visitors to this lake, are advised to take the following precautions:

Avoid all con-

Alberta tact with cyanobacterial blooms. If contact occurs, wash with tap water as soon (blue- as possible.

> • Do not swim or wade or allow your pets to swim or wade in any areas where cyanobacteria is visible.

> • Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake to your pets.

Consider limiting

human consumption of whole fish and fish trimmings from this lake, as it is known that fish may store toxins in their liver. (People can safely consume fish fillets from this lake).

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body of water, including Lac Ste.

Anne, at any time. Boiling of this water will not remove the toxins produced by cyanobacteria. An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock, while this advisory is active.

Cyanobacteria is naturally occurring, and often becomes visible when weather conditions are calm. Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz, or globs on the surface of water, cyanobacteria can be blue-green, greenish-brown, brown, and/or pinkish-red, and often smell musty or grassy.

People who come in contact with visible cyanobacteria or who ingest water containing cyanobacteria may experience skin irritation, rash, sore throat, sore red eves, swollen lips, fever, nausea and vomiting and/or diarrhea. Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced; however, all humans are at risk of these symptoms. Exposure to the bacteria may be fatal to pets.

Weather and wind conditions can cause algae blooms to move from one location in the lake to another. As such, this advisory will remain in effect for Lac Ste. Anne, until further notice.

Please note that waters of Lac Ste. Anne in which the cyanobacterial bloom is NOT visible can still be used for recreational purposes, even while this Health Advisory is in place.
