Whitecourt Town Council has approved the construction of the Culture & Events Centre, with construction to start this summer. By a unanimous vote of Council, the Town has entered into a \$44,175,000 contract with Clark Builders to construct the facility. With a two-year construction schedule, the Culture & Events Centre is scheduled to open at the end of 2026.

"The Culture & Events Centre represents a significant investment in our community. It will vitalize the downtown, and put Whitecourt on the map as a cultural hub in north central Alberta," said Whitecourt Mayor Tom Pickard.

"Facilities such as these are key to enhancing not just the community's quality of life, but also driving economic development and investment attraction for years to come."

The Culture & Events Centre project has been in development for several years, and has received significant funding support from both the federal and provincial governments of over \$32 million. It will be a landmark for the community, and will include three components:

• Arts, Culture and Convention Centre – A venue designed to host a variety

of concerts, trade shows, festivals, events, conventions, and celebrations.

• Library – The new library will provide increased floor area and space to better serve the region. It will provide a safe and accessible place for the community to learn and gather, and increase operating efficiency.

• Town Administration Office – The new office space will enhance customer service and accessibility, and provide an administrative facility that can grow with the community.

After a competitive bid process, which involved the tendering of 32 scopes and receipt of 94 bids, the project came in at just over \$44 million.


The Culture & Events

Centre will be located in downtown Whitecourt, and during construction will inject over \$7.9 million into the tourism and materials/ equipment supply sectors. Additionally, it is estimated that 25% of the project trade labour will be provided locally, which equates to approximately 100,000 worker hours (\$5 million).

"We are devastated by the images that are coming out of the Town of Jasper and Jasper National Park and are keeping everyone impacted by the wildfires in our thoughts," said Mayor Jeff Acker. "The City of Spruce Grove will continue to monitor the situation and keep in contact with emergency management operations, and we stand ready to step in and help when and if we receive the call."

The City of Spruce Grove continues to be in contact with the Alberta Emergency Management Agency (AEMA) and stands ready to provide mutual support for the Jasper wildfires when and if it is requested.

All requests for assistance will come directly from the AEMA, and at this time, the City of Spruce Grove has not been asked provide assistance. to Emergency management is most effective when coordinated, and if the City receives formal requests for assistance, we will coordinate the required staff and resources. Assistance may be provided in several ways, including:

Back-up coverage directly related to the emergency by deploying firefighter and emergency resources to the scene.

Support for evacuees if requested by the respective emergency management operations. The primary care of evacuees is typically handled and coordinated by their respective jurisdictions and/or the AEMA.

Coordination with community organizations in Spruce Grove to provide assistance if requested by the respective emergency management operations.

Alberta's government is seeking the rightful owners of a combined \$154 million in unclaimed money and property.

Alberta's unclaimed property registry holds money that is lost, abandoned or forgotten. The registry currently contains millions in cash, cheques, money orders and other unclaimed items belonging to people who may be entitled to an unexpected payout.

Alberta's unclaimed property registry returned \$1.4 million to 650 people in 2023 alone. Almost 350,000 individual items remain unclaimed in the registry, including one valued at more than \$850,000. If claimed, it will be the largest single balance the province has ever paid out, surpassing the current record of \$368,124, which was returned to its rightful owner in 2019.

"Who doesn't like free money? Alberta's unclaimed property registry is free and easy to check, and a quick search of the registry could help reunite someone with money that they may not even know they were entitled to."

Since its inception in 2008, Alberta's unclaimed property registry has returned \$13.8 million to more than 8,500 owners. Sources of the unclaimed funds include unclaimed deposits, uncashed wages, loan overpayments and unclaimed funds from inactive investment accounts.

Alberta's unclaimed property program is governed and managed by the province through the Unclaimed Personal Property and Vested Property Act. The act provides 10 years for owners to stake and reclaim their lost money, after which the money is transferred to the government's general revenue fund to help pay for programs and services

for Albertans.

Individuals can search Alberta's unclaimed property registry on the MissingMoney website, a portal used by Alberta and other North American jurisdictions that allows searches across multiple jurisdictions.



### Submitted

Dear colleagues:

I am pleased to announce an enhanced early years assessment framework for Kindergarten to Grade 6. The enhanced early years assessment framework is based on stakeholder input and expert advice and will support our youngest learners to succeed.

As you know, students develop critical foundational knowledge in literacy and numeracy in the early years of education. Assessing students in their early years provides essential information to teachers, schools, parents, and Alberta Education about potential student learning issues and needs and ensures that students requiring additional supports receive the help they need early in their education.

Beginning in the 2024/25 school year, the following changes to the mandatory literacy and numeracy screening requirement will take effect:

• Kindergarten: Starting in January 2025, screening will be required in literacy and numeracy for all students in January of each year.

• Grades 1 to 3: Mandatory screening assessments will continue in Grades 1 to 3; however, the timing and frequency of these assessments will change. Starting in September 2024, the literacy and numeracy screening for students in Grades 1 to 3 will now be completed in September and January, with an additional assessment in June for those students

identified in January as requiring additional supports. The administration window to complete all screening assessments in these grades will be extended to three weeks.

• Grade 3: Student Learning Assessments will be permanently discontinued and will no longer be available for use.

• Grades 4 and 5: Starting in September 2026, screening assessments in literacy and numeracy for students in Grades 4 and 5 will be introduced. Further information about this requirement will be shared at a future date.

• Grade 6: Provincial achievement tests for stu-

dents in Grade 6 will continue to occur in May and June.

This revised approach to early years assessment will ensure that the literacy and numeracy skills of all students in these grades are assessed, and that students receive the necessary intervention supports in the critical early years of their education.

Further details related to the early years assessment framework will be provided to school authorities in the near future.



She gathered experience and wisdom from the hundreds of overwhelmed people who looked to her for support, hope, and a non-judgmental listener in their time of grief. That is why she chose to share information from her heart and soul. She and her husband Frank raised a son and a daughter, which is her favorite and proudest career, and she now dotes on three grandsons. She said she wrote "I'M OK UNTIL I'M NOT OK – Grief From A-Z" as the book she needed but couldn't find when her husband was killed in a freak accident in 2019. "Yeah, well, I don't care what your app says brother, I'm not getting out, so unless you want to let me drive, I suggest you take me to the right location ..... I should have cancelled the trip at the onset, as the driver could not describe where his "Designated" pickup area was at the airport.... on the "App" it does not show elevated platforms vs street level platforms....communication is difficult....they are not able to describe real life land marks, they just look at the app.

The Georgian cab driver I met in Berlin said it perfectly, they are "Robota" they no longer think for themselves, they just do what the screen tells them. I've seen this far too often with folks I've ran into in the big cities. Small towns, and rural, different story, and hopefully it stays that way. Here is to hoping that the farm kids still know that the phone is nice to have, that knowing directions, where the sun is in the sky, and even what a unique looking combine, granary, boulder, or tree can be used as a reference. When some program that someone else built in a dark room in a different country tells you to jump off a cliff...that maybe, just maybe, common sense should kick in. These things are tools, guides, not the word

of God. It reminds me how bad it was when not so long ago, there were literally people walking into traffic chasing the "Pokemon" objects in their phones which were augmenting our reality. Wow.

I know that I was always taught to double check, always run your calculations at least twice, sometimes backwards, to ensure the solution you came up with was correct, that the equation balanced. That and I was told by a computer engineer more than 20 years ago that there is not a single piece of software that is flawless. It's a perfect dance of imperfect, and the bugs are fixed continually post launch. Reassuring, isn't it? "Dave, what are you doing Dave?" for those old enough to remember that movie.

Now the next rant, wrinkle or insight, AI. Not artificial insemination for my farm families, the other AI, artificial intelligence. Now I had the heck scared out of me down in Oregon, one of the lunch sessions we were given an amazing update from the leader of a think tank, an analyst, a forecaster as it were. The lady ran us through an update of where we were, what we thought at that time of how far and how fast AI would become, and now where we are at today. and where we think it could be in 10 years from now. Basically, it was a smart as a toddler several years ago, we thought it would be as smart as a preschooler about now, when in fact it is as smart at least as a 17-vear-old. Now the thought is it will be Einstein level in 10.... or sooner?

Now, let's see what kind of Apps old Einstein could dream up in an AI form, bot perhaps, without a state of conscience. One of the limiting factors recognized that could slow AI growth is the literal power required to run it. Electricity demands for all this computing is putting a strain, but since we are innovative, no worries, how about modifying the way we run computers. They wondered what the most efficient computer is, maybe we could look at that, and it would give us an inspiration of what the next generation of computing could be. If you were thinking quantum computing (like I did) you would be wrong. Our Human Brain was the inspiration. A virtual supercomputer that need hardly any energy to run compared to our current computers. So, what's the logical next step, of course, take brain cells put them in a petri dish and have them hooked into a circuit.

This is not future stuff, as I was shocked to find out, this is already happening, and for only \$500 per month, you can rent space on the human brain cell petri dish computer located in Switzerland to run your computational massive calculations for AI. Did no one watch terminator? No wonder why the likes of Elon Musk was warning as many as he could about needing guard rails, policy on the advancement of AI.

I honestly am a bit concerned with a number of advancements, especially if we become dependent on the software to make the decisions for us, too many people are becoming dependent on what the screen says. Take a second look, do some old-fashioned things, like read a paper map. Remember some phone numbers, and double check, override, break out a dictionary. Don't become one of the Robota, we are not going to stop the advancement, but we sure as heck should be using our conscience, our souls, our critical thinking to take a sober pause to think to ourselves "Is that Right?", and for the love of Pete, take the time to be human again. Long live common sense, mud, sweat, tears, skinned knees, banged knuckles, fresh air, and farm kids. It may just be what saves our corner of the world.

## MORE BOOTS ON THE GROUND TO FIGHT RURAL CRIME

Submitted by Government of Alberta

New surveillance teams led by the Alberta Sheriffs are now on the ground and working alongside local police to make rural communities in Alberta safer.

Rural crime contin-

ues to be a top concern among residents and businesses in rural Alberta, which is why Alberta's government remains committed to addressing it through enhanced surveillance and other crime reduction initiatives. Alberta's government invested \$4.3



million for the Alberta Sheriffs to put more boots on the ground. This investment supported the establishment of two plainclothes teams – one in northern Alberta and one in southern Alberta – to support police in carrying out surveillance on criminal targets in rural areas.

Both teams are now fully staffed and operational, ready to fight crime in rural areas across Alberta. These rural surveillance teams will work to prevent crime, monitor agricultural theft and work in collaboration with local law enforcement to share intelligence and resources to keep Albertans and their property safe and secure.

"Criminals and organized crime are not welcome in Alberta. Full stop. The addition of two new surveillance teams will further support our law enforcement partners in stamping out criminal activity in Alberta's rural areas. This is about supporting local investigations to address local crime in our smaller communities. Together, both teams will form another key component of Alberta's efforts to combat crime and ensure Albertans feel safe at home and in their communities, regardless of where they live."

The Alberta Sheriffs have an existing surveillance unit that is part of the Alberta Law Enforcement Response Teams (ALERT) and focused mainly on serious and organized crime investigations. The new surveillance teams will fill a gap by helping rural RCMP detachments with local investigations.

"Through their specialized knowledge, training and experience, Alberta's new surveillance teams are providing another important mechanism in the fight against crime in Alberta's rural communities. Working in close collaboration with the RCMP and other policing agencies, their efforts will play a key role in gathering




