

YEARS OF FIRE SERVICE

One man has been with Parkland County Fire Services since the very beginning. This year, Fire Services celebrates its 60th anniversary and with this, Bill Purdy celebrates 60 years of service.

Purdy has been a dedicated member of the County's Fire Services since its infancy and has witnessed its growth over the years.

In 1962, Purdy and other apprentice engineers working at TransAita's Wabamun Plant came to the Municipal District of Stony Plain's Wabamun council to highlight the need for fire services to protect the area.

Two years later, the Fire Services department was created with Purdy acting as a volunteer firefighter along with 21 others. Purdy witnessed the early stages of Fire Services, which had a limited number of resources and various other challenges. Fire Services did not have sirens, the call system was limited to a party-line system and the firetruck only sat two people.

Throughout the decades, Fire Services developed and evolved with the former village, shifting to accommodate increasing needs for fire protection and emergency services. The fire department was provided with essential equipment that allowed firefighters to begin undertaking water and ice rescue operations.

In recent years, Purdy has adopted a more advisory role. By relying on his experience, he helps inform decisions that bolster Fire Services and provides recommendations on resources and training required to respond to the County's needs. "As far as I'm concerned, our training is number one in Alberta," he says. "Each year, we have a recruit class of up to 30 people that are trained up and then designated to Wabamun, Tomahawk, Acheson or Parkland Village."

"We are incredibly grateful to Bill for his many years of dedicated service," says Parkland County Fire Chief Brian Comforth. "He has done amazing things for our Fire Services and will continue to be someone we lean on for wisdom and advice."

Purdy expresses appreciation for his involvement and looks forwards to what the future holds for Parkland's Fire Services.

and if we receive the call."

The City of Spruce Grove continues to be in contact with the Alberta Emergency Management Agency (AEMA) and stands ready to provide mutual support for the Jasper wildfires when and if it is requested.

All requests for assistance will come directly from the AEMA, and at this time, the City of Spruce Grove has not been asked to provide assistance. Emergency management is most effective when coordinated, and if the City receives formal requests for assistance, we will coordinate the required staff and resources. Assistance may be provided in several ways, including:

Back-up coverage directly related to the emergency by deploying firefighter and emergency resources to the scene.

Support for evacuees if requested by the respective emergency management operations. The primary care of evacuees is typically handled and coordinated by their respective jurisdictions and/or the AEMA.

Coordination with commu-

nity organizations in Spruce Grove to provide assistance if requested by the respective emergency management operations.







The airlines had their online, third-party provider go down errors right across the board, so no advance check in, delays at the airport for construction, and a few other items put me 3 min behind the time the "system" would allow for a self-serve boarding pass to be printed. The person...flesh and blood, may have as well been a robot. Old days ... Print a boarding pass, get you through customs, and sort it out at the boarding gate for seat assignment. With 57 min to spare....

After the agent walked away without saying another word, I waited, along with three other families on hold with the elusive customer service "hot Line" for over 2 hours, two and a half hours for the ticket agent to return to no avail...great customer service. I missed my flight, and with all the "System Errors" there were no alternate flights available. Heaven forbid, something called life happens and knocks your programed machines out of balance. The tools we made to help us are now in control of a number of the younger generation.

Landing in Vancouver, grabbing an Uber, heading to a location that was copied from a real address, into the "App" confirming the place with the driver and still being driven to an incorrect address. Right name, right address.... wrong location. Well, the App says I need to drop you off in a back alley with tons of gang tags, obvious drug paraphernalia, and street crime. "Yeah, well, I don't care what your app says brother, I'm not getting out, so unless you want to let me drive, I suggest you take me to the right location I should have cancelled the trip at the onset, as the driver could not describe where his "Designated" pickup area was at the airport.... on the "App" it does not show elevated platforms vs street level platforms....communication is difficult....they are not able to describe real life land marks, they just look at the app.

The Georgian cab driver I met in Berlin said it perfectly, they are "Robota" they no longer think for themselves, they just do what the screen tells them. I've seen this far too often with folks I've ran into in the big cities. Small towns, and rural, different story, and hopefully it stays that way. Here is to hoping that the farm kids still know that the phone is nice to have, that knowing directions, where the sun is in the sky, and even what a unique looking combine, granary, boulder, or tree can be used as a reference. When some program that someone else built in a dark room in a different country tells you to jump off a cliff...that maybe, just maybe, common sense should kick in. These things are tools, guides, not the word

of God. It reminds me how bad it was when not so long ago, there were literally people walking into traffic chasing the "Pokemon" objects in their phones which were augmenting our reality. Wow.

I know that I was always taught to double check, always run your calculations at least twice, sometimes backwards, to ensure the solution you came up with was correct, that the equation balanced. That and I was told by a computer engineer more than 20 years ago that there is not a single piece of software that is flawless. It's a perfect dance of imperfect, and the bugs are fixed continually post launch. Reassuring, isn't it? "Dave, what are you doing Dave?" for those old enough to remember that movie.

Now the next rant, wrinkle or insight, AI. Not artificial insemination for my farm families, the other AI, artificial intelligence. Now I had the heck scared out of me down in Oregon, one of the lunch sessions we were given an amazing update from the leader of a think tank, an analyst, a forecaster as it were. The lady ran us through an update of where we were, what we thought at that time of how far and how fast AI would become, and now where we are at today. and where we think it could be in 10 years from now. Basically, it was a smart as a toddler several years ago, we thought it would be as smart as a preschooler about now, when in fact it is as smart at least as a 17-vear-old. Now the thought is it will be Einstein level in 10.... or sooner?

Now, let's see what kind of Apps old Einstein could dream up in an AI form, bot perhaps, without a state of conscience. One of the limiting factors recognized that could slow AI growth is the literal power required to run it. RCMP FEDERAL POLICING, NORTHWEST REGION CHARGES TWO INDIVIDUALS FOR UTTERING THREATS AGAINST PUBLIC FIGURES

The RCMP Federal Policing Integrated National Security Enforcement Team (INSET), Northwest Region has arrested and charged two individuals for uttering threats against several public figures in two separate investigations. ¬ On May 10, 2024, INSET received information that a user of the social media platform "X", formerly known as Twitter, had allegedly posted threats to kill Prime Minister Justin Trudeau. On June 6, 2024, Mason John Baker, 23, a resident of Calgary, was charged with uttering threats against a person contrary to section 264.1(1)(a) of the Criminal Code.

On June 7, 2024, INSET received information that a YouTube account user had allegedly posted threats to kill Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, Deputy Prime Minister Chrystia Freeland and New Democrat Leader Jagmeet Singh. On June 13, 2024, Garry Belzevick, 67, a resident of Edmonton, was

charged with three counts of uttering threats against a person contrary to section 264.1(1)(a) of the Criminal Code.

Baker is scheduled to appear at the Alberta Court of Justice in Calgary on July 23, 2024. Belzevick is scheduled to appear at the Alberta Court of Justice in Edmonton on July 25, 2024.

The RCMP is mandated to investigate criminal offences arising from terrorism, espionage, cyber attacks, nuclear security risks, foreign influenced activities, incidents involving the security of an Internationally Protected Person (IPPs), the unlawful release of national security information and terrorist financing.

As part of its protective mandate, the RCMP is responsible for safeguarding designated Canadians and select foreign diplomatic personnel residing in Canada, as per Article 22 of the Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Relations, as well as visiting IPPs.

The security environment in which public figures operate continues to evolve both within Canada and abroad, and we recognize this is a time for increased vigilance.

"In the digital age, where so many interactions occur online and are perceived to be anonymous, there is a belief that virtual actions and words do not have consequences. When these virtual actions or words cross the boundaries of Charter-protected speech and constitute criminal activity, police will investigate thoroughly to hold those responsible accountable."


