



PARKLAND RCMP DRUG UNIT'S 8-MONTH LONG DRUG INVESTIGATION RESULTS IN THE SEIZURE OF FIREARMS AND DRUGS

On August 2, 2024, the Parkland RCMP Drug Unit. with assistance from members of Parkland RCMP. St. Albert RCMP, Leduc RCMP, Red Deer RCMP and Air Services executed a total of 6 Search Warrants: two in Stony Plain, three in Edmonton and one in Red Deer. This operation marks the successful completion of an 8-month long investigation targeting illegal drug activity within Parkland County.

As a result of the investigation, eight individuals have been arrested and are facing a variety charges including possession for the purpose of trafficking and firearms offences.

Following the execution of the search warrants, police have seized the following items:

- 513.7 grams of Cocaine
- 109.8 grams of Hash

PREPARING YOUR FIREPLACE OR STOVE FOR THE SEASON

Fireplaces and wood-burning stoves not only can be beautiful focal points within a home, but they also provide an additional source of heat and can be used to keep rooms or entire homes comfortable without the need for additional and potentially costly heating sources.

Just like more modern home heating systems, stoves and fireplaces need to be maintained, and that maintenance includes readying them before winter when they are used more heavily. Ensuring a fireplace or stove is in good working order helps to guarantee efficiency of use and safety during the winter months.

Open-flame heating sources carry with them certain risks. The National Fire Protection Association states that, between 2009-2013, American fire departments responded to 56,000 home structure fires that involved heating equipment. The NFPA notes that the leading factor contributing to home-heating fires is a failure to keep things clean, principally from solid-fueled heating

equipment. The following are a handful of ways to stay safe as you get ready for another cozy season around the fire.

· Start with the chimney. Begin by having your chimney thoroughly cleaned and inspected. Creosote can build up inside of the chimney. Creosote is highly flammable and becomes more difficult and expensive to clean the longer it builds up inside your flue lining. In addition, animals may have created nest inside of the chimney since the last time the fireplace was

used. A professional chimney sweep should be hired in this situation. He or she will be able to effectively clean the chimney in a manner that is the least messy and disruptive to residents.

· Install or check smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Operational alarms are essential to preventing injury or death resulting from smoke or carbon monoxide inhalation. Such detectors are inexpensive safeguards that should be installed on every floor of the house.

Batteries should be replaced every six months, and the alarms themselves should be changed every five to 10 years.

Inspect the chimney from outdoors as well. Inspect the mortar around any bricks in the chimney and surrounding areas for cracks. If left unaddressed, these can cause dangerous fires. If there are serious cracks, a professional may need to make repairs or the chimney may need to be replaced. You also can have the chimney capped with a screen to keep animals and debris from entering.

- · Inspect the damper. A damper is a valve or plate that stops or regulates the flow of air inside a chimney. It should be checked prior to the first use of a stove or fireplace so homeowners can be certain it opens and closes smoothly.
- · Clear out flammable items. Move flammable items away from the front of a fireplace or stove. Be sure curtains or other home furnishings are far enough away that they will not catch fire

from any errant sparks or flames.

· Order wood now. Be sure there is plenty of wood for the season. Ask a wood supplier to estimate just how much will be needed, and double-check that the wood will arrive in time for the start of the season.


By preparing for fireplace and wood stove use now, homeowners can ensure their winters are comfortable and safe.











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REDUCE COLD-WEATHER FIRE RISK

Plenty of things heat up when the temperature drops, including the risk for fire hazards. Fireplaces, stoves, heating systems, candles, and even electric lights are used more often during the winter than any other time of year, so it makes sense that the risk of home fires increases when the mercury drops

The U.S. Fire Administration says 905 people die

in winter home fires each year. Cooking is the leading cause of all home fires and contributes to around \$2 billion in property loss each year. Understanding potential risks and

exercising caution can help homeowners protect themselves, their families and their homes from fire.

Cooking

Home heating fires peak between the hours of 6 p.m. and 8 p.m., when many people are home preparing dinner. The following steps, courtesy of the American Red Cross, can improve safety in the kitchen and reduce the likelihood of a home fire.


- Never leave cooking food unattended, as it can take just seconds for fires to ignite.
- Keep anything that can catch fire away from the stove or other appliances that generate heat.
- Clean regularly to prevent grease buildup.
- Make sure appliances are turned off before leaving the room or going to bed.

Heating

The National Fire Protection Association warns that heating is the second leading cause of home fires, deaths and injuries in the United States. The NFPA offers these safety quidelines.

- Install heating appliances according to manufacturers' instructions or have a professional do the installation.
- Fuel-burning equipment needs to vent to the outside.
- Never use an oven to heat a home.
- Keep anything that can burn

from heating away equipment, including portable space heaters.

- Clean and inspect heating appliances regularly.
- Turn off portable heaters when leaving the room or going to bed.

Electric


The National Safety Council estimates that between 600 and 1,000 people die each year from electrocution. Electricity also can contribute to home fires. The Energy Education Council offers these safety suggestions.

- Never force plugs into outlets.
- Check that cords are not frayed or cracked. Do not run cords under carpets or place them in high-traffic areas.
- Use extension cords only on a temporary basis.
- Make sure light bulbs are the proper wattage for fixtures.
- Install ground fault circuit interrupters in kitchens, baths, laundry rooms, and elsewhere, making sure to test them regularly.
 - Check periodically

for loose wall receptacles and loose wires. Listen for popping or sizzling sounds behind walls.

Home fires are no joke and can be prevented with simple safety checks.









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Below are tips to help your child start the school year well rested and back on their regular schedule.

- 1. Start early. Begin the transition to a regular sleep schedule a couple of weeks before school starts.
- Shift times in small increments.

Janet Jackson had a hot song with this title, and I hate to say it when I read some of the accusatory quips or demands on social media, that song runs through my head. Never fails to amaze me how folks who would not say boo in person are fearless and many times downright rude, disrespectful keyboard warriors. I can repost a picture of a beautiful sunset from Wabamun, Isle Lake, Lac Ste. Anne or Sandy Beach wishing everyone a happy Sunday, and some person exhibiting troll like characteristics "Demands" a full account of what I have done as an MLA for them. Telling me I must drop everything else, take their abusive nature because "I work for them!" What that tells me is that these folks in all likelihood have never run a business, had people work for them in the first place, or if they did, could never keep them on the payroll for very long, because no one gets away with that kind of behavior for very long.

Over the last few weeks however, I've had some great conversations with folks that needed clarity or were looking for updates on what I've been up too, and how some of the projects we've had in the hopper are progressing. That I believe is worthwhile conversation, and I thought giving an update here in the little local paper where I'm uncensored may be of help for many, I'll break it down by "Theme" so if something is not to your interest, you can skip to a heading that is, time is precious to us all.

Education / Careers / Skilled

I was able to be part last term of the skills for Jobs Task force (Skills for Jobs Task Force | Alberta.ca), and led a task force myself on Career Education (Career Education Task Force | Alberta.ca). The findings of these two separate task force reports have helped form policy directly and indirectly. The mandate letters given to the current ministers of Education, and Advanced Education have items that are taken directly from the reports. Overall, between the two efforts it allows for a change in thinking when it comes to students being able to choose their career paths, provide support to them though our education system, as well as to tap into private industry, and better align post-secondary. It puts the student back at the center again, and helps people get onto, and into their careers more expeditiously. In short, kids didn't know what they wanted to be when they grew up, because they didn't know what they could be when they grew up. There has been an inadvertent disconnect between the skills needed for industries, and addressing transferable skill sets within the industries.

Firearms / Property Rights / Personal Freedoms

As many know, I am all for freedom, accountability, and responsibility of individuals. So, when the federal government started messing further with what are some of the most restrictive firearms laws I asserted myself into the team that was going to make recommendations on policy, and re-patriate the responsibilities as delegated to the province. I was one of the three MLA's that were part of the firearms advisory committee(Alberta Firearms Advisory Committee | Alberta. ca. For what it's worth, had also made several speeches, attended town halls, was special guest on several firearms related pod casts, and literally helped educate several of my fellow MLAs as members of parliament from other provinces.

The outcome was that we hired our own Chief Firearms Officer, rather than having one appointed by the federal government, and we re-patriated the department to be in Alberta rather than in Eastern Canada. The culture and mission of the department changed to act not only as the group that "enforced the law" but rather used good judgment of the law and became an advocate / educator / supporter of responsible firearm ownership. Alberta in many ways is leading the country on this file, and if the chips fall in the right direction we will probably help form policy with the new federal government.

Alberta's moto is Strong and Free, and I believe for good reason. We take our freedoms, and the rights of others very seriously out here. We modernized the adverse possession laws so other folks who are squatting on your property can't take it from you. We made sure folks have an enhanced and modernized trespass laws, so that protesters (as an example) can't role up onto your farm, steal your turkeys, and disrupt your operations without consequence.

Speaking of turkeys, we passed a law called the Sovereignty within a United Canada Act to ensure that the charter of rights and freedoms, are upheld in our province, and that in the case where a federal government is not respecting those laws, we will stand up for them. It will basically put the onus back on the federal government to challenge us in court, rather than putting in policy, that clearly contradicts the foundational and defining laws of our country. We've already had to use it, believe it or not, when it came to the federal government straying into our jurisdiction on energy and electricity, which would have cost us billions upon billions of dollars as taxpayers.

Freedoms in choice of education, to allow parents to choose what method of delivery of education is right for their family. We believe strongly in family and parental rights, while still protecting minors. There was a point not so long ago where the freedoms of choice that our parents and kids have now were on the chopping block.

These freedoms that we have here in our province are not necessarily available in other parts of the country. I can't tell you how many people I've met over the last few years that have picked up stakes, moved from other provinces to experience firsthand what it is to be an Albertan. Freedom sells, and Alberta is calling for likeminded Canadians, and those abroad that want to be part of what we are building out here.

Intergovernmental and Transboundary Relations

In my role as the Parliamentary Secretary for Economic Corridor Development, I report to the Minister of Intergovernmental Affairs, better known as the Premier. I am the lead MLA when it comes to our representation in several transboundary organizations. The organizations that we are members of are, the Pacific Northwest Economic Region (of which Alberta was a founding Member) The Council of State Governments, National Council of State Legislators, and The Energy Council. These organizations allow Alberta to help influence policy not only within our country, but in the USA as well. Simply put, if we want to change the tune that we have to dance too, you have to be able to help pick the playlist.

Some of these organizations also do work across the pond and

has allowed me to head over to Germany last year on the dime of the German Government and to see what they are doing over there on their energy policy. Due to that trip, we had a visit by German officials over here to Alberta as a follow up, another will be coming this fall, and I'll be heading over there again in October. The world is very connected, and when policy is made across the pond, it directly affects us here. I also have learned firsthand that "Our Story" is not being told by the federal representatives, and when we tell it ourselves, people want to hear it. In fact, we are literally the solution to a number of real-world needs.

Mental health and Addictions

We literally have a new program in place that is opening conversations right across north America. The model loosely puts focus on recovery, and getting folks out of their addictive cycle so they can be productive members of our society again. We will not allow folks to languish any longer in that addictive quagmire. Closer to home, we will be opening the newest recovery center located in Gunn. I can tell you full well that I have received compliments and words of encourage from senators in Washington, and Oregon who told us full well they got the policy wrong, and are changing course, paying close attention to what we are doing here.

So, when folks ask me online, what have I done for them, and for Alberta, there are a number of areas that I've had the privilege to be part of, or lead initiatives that will have not only short-term results, but long-term gains. I want to thank all the folks that have taken the time to say hello when I'm out and about in the constituency, to give me a pat in the back when I need it, and a kick in the pants when I deserve it as well. As I've told you, I don't know what I don't know, so I'm all ears. You will also know that if we are engaging in conversation, I may challenge you as well, offering counterpoints and testing logic at times. It's to ensure that if I'm going to take things forward that they are sound, and that it will have the best bang for the buck for as many people in our area as possible. So, lets keep having the conversations, and making sure I know full well, what matters to you.

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
