

OUR WESTERN CULTURE

I'm off again, heading down to the USA, Madison Wisconsin, this time to take some training from the Bowhay Institute for Legislative Leadership Development. Quite the honor actually, as thee is typically only one legislator selected from the member states and provinces each year. With the Covid Craziness, we were all unable to travel and the courses were postponed. was selected by the Council of State Governments as a candidate, and it was carried over, so I'm able to go. I look forward to every opportunity to learn more, and to make connections with my American Collogues.

I was asked yesterday to give an update at the 18th Annual Federation of Gas Co-Ops golf tournament on what we as a government have been doing when it comes to economic corridors. As many of you know I've been working on this file since I was first elected, and the model is gaining some serious traction. The concept is evolving into the solution for the need of a "Fortress North America" by which we are self-sufficient, and that we tighten up our supply chains, and trading partners to ensure we have food, energy, logistics security. Although the concept is not new, it sure has become relevant in today's state of global affairs. How critical are our supply chains? The rail strike is once again going to show all of us, how little redundancy, or capacity we have in the system, simply put, we need to ensure we have pathways to build linier infrastructure of all types. We need to ensure that we have redundancy, and moreover capacity in the system.

Strangely enough, it's not necessarily the idea that brings attention to the model, or the logical extension of Alberta being a logistical hub, or the natural choice of supply for energy. When it comes to getting the idea across to my fellow policy makers, and legislatures its our attitude. It comes back to basics, it comes down to personalities, and good old fashioned human interaction. I believe right now we as Albertans have a secret recipe that is setting us apart from many others out there. It's our authenticity, our western culture. You can't fake Authenticity, and those who are not afraid to speak with folks about where they come from, what we've accomplished, and what we have our sites set on, strikes a chord with many. It's genuine, its honest, and it resonates.

When I'm on the road, and folks who are not aware of what Alberta is like, I start off with saying its "Texas North", people get that. Immediately they get the ideas of cowboys and oil. They get the idea of honest hard-working people who stand up for themselves and others, they also get the idea of the economy, diversified and strong. As the old saying goes, you don't mess with Texas, and the same can be said about Alberta within Canada. Many don't realize that as Albertans we are sitting on the 4th largest known oil reserve on the planet. That we also have over 223 trillion cubic feet of natural gas. The USA gets 99 percent of their gas imports from Alberta and well north of 50% of their imported oil comes from Alberta. We are not only integral to their current energy needs, but as they transition to Hydrogen, heck, we are experts in that field as well. If they don't want to take fresh water away from keeping people hydrated, crops watered and animals alive, then they are going to be requiring as much natural gas as we can provide them.

About that culture thing again, so why is it that if strangers from not only the USA, but from Europe, Central America, and East Asia like who we are, how we carry ourselves, and are energized when we have conversations with them, why is it that our own culture is being targeted from our PM of the present? I know I'm not the only one wondering that. We indeed have a western culture, we are unique in our own way, Afterall, we are the Strong and Free Province. The late Rex Murphy said something along these lines, if you don't know that Alberta is different then you have never been there or had the fortune of meeting someone from Alberta. We work hard, play hard, and love hard. We care not only about ourselves, but others, especially when they have an emergency. Rex pointed out the very real connection between Newfoundland and Alberta, it was not superficial, it was through the very real human connections that we have, from helping real people when they needed it the most.

As I've said a few times now, our fellow Canadians are moving to Alberta at record rates, one gent and his wife I'd recently met sold their farm in Ontario, and struck out west, in his words, "He had finally found his kind of people". He felt free again, felt like there was still a piece of Canada that he could call home.

A friend of mine that I had know since grade 1 invited me out to his "Stomping Grounds" which is an open-air riding arena on his farm. He was hosting a Western Mounted Shooting event. In its simplest terms, you ride as fast as you should through an obstacle course on a horse, and pop balloons at each one of the obstacle stations as you ride by. Revolvers, Lever action Rifles, and Break action Shotguns are used to shoot blank cartridges with black powder, that pops the balloons when the hot grains make contact. It's a thing of beauty. Not only seeing the cowboy or cowgirl with their horses in action, but the comradery that they all have, and that the next three generations of Albertan's that were there helping out or getting involved. We share this sport with the USA, and when

folks compete on this side of the 49th their timed scores are recorded, so that they too can head down south and compete as well.

This sport literally is on the chopping block with what the Liberal government has done regarding gun laws. Kids can't get into it, adults can't get into it, and these that already are, can't buy new revolvers in case they want to upgrade, or need to replace. It is not as if they didn't plead their case down east, its not like the gun rights actions groups didn't make fantastic arguments, nor even our own Chief Firearms Officer. They simply fell on deaf ears...our culture, our heritage, does not matter to them, or as much as others. It is a crying shame and is not right.

I'd ask each and everyone of you that read this to remember who we are, warts and all, mistakes, and accomplishments and what it is that makes us "Western Canadians". I'd ask you to remember what it is, how special it is to be in this province, to be free spirited, risk takers, gritty, caring, kind, honest and hard working. Where a handshake still means something. Where having a little mud on your boots is ok because it's the person wearing them, is what's important. Hold your head high, don't let others knock you down or make you feel less because we don't have or deserve our own ability to cherish and express our culture and our heritage. Its quite the opposite, in this current world the state we find ourselves in, a little more Alberta is just what our country, and our trading partners need, not less. I am proud to be heading down to Madison Wisconsin, to represent our province, to make new friends, to tell our story, and to leave a little piece of Alberta there when I leave. Stay strong, Stay Free.

Cyanobacteria (blue-green algae) has been identified in the waters of Lessard Lake. Residents living near the shores of this lake, as well as visitors to this lake, are advised to take the following precautions:

• Avoid all contact with cyanobacterial blooms. If contact occurs, wash with tap water as soon as possible.

• Do not swim or wade or allow your pets to swim or wade in any areas where cyanobacteria is visible.

• Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake to your pets.

• Consider limiting human consumption of whole fish and fish trimmings from this lake, as it is known that fish may store toxins in their liver. (People can safely consume fish fillets from this lake).

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body of water, including Lessard Lake, at any time. Boiling of this water will not remove the toxins produced by cyanobacteria. An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock, while this advisory is active.


Cyanobacteria is naturally occurring, and often becomes visible when weather conditions are calm. Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz, or globs on the surface of water, cyanobacteria can be bluegreen, greenish-brown, brown, and/or pinkish-red, and often smell musty or grassy.

People who come in contact with visible cyanobacteria or who ingest water containing cyanobacteria may experience skin irritation, rash, sore throat, sore red eyes, swollen lips, fever, nausea and vomiting and/ or diarrhea. Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced; however, all humans are at risk of these symptoms. Exposure to the bacteria may be fatal to pets.

Weather and wind conditions can cause algae blooms to move from one location in the lake to another. As such, this advisory will remain in effect for Lessard Lake, until further notice.

Please note that waters of Lessard Lake in which the cyanobacterial bloom is NOT visible can still be used for recreational purposes, even while this Health Advisory is in place. lated to cyanobacteria or if you require further information on health concerns and cyanobacteria, please call Health Link at 811. HOW TO IMPROVE INDOOR AIR QUALITY IN WINTER

Plants can improve indoor air quality by helping to remove harmful irritants from the air. Homes tend to be stuffier in autumn and winter. As temperatures outside dip, windows are closed and air quality inside homes can suffer



Poor indoor air quality can not only be uncomfortable, causing residents to experience headaches, dry eyes and nasal congestion, but also can be unhealthy. According to the American Lung Association, poor indoor air quality can cause or contribute to the development of infections, lung cancer and chronic lung diseases, such as asthma.

Though it's not feasible or healthy to open windows when temperatures outside dip to near or below freezing, there are steps everyone can take to improve the indoor air quality in their homes.

· Add to your décor with plants. Plants provide both aesthetic and practical appeal to a home's interior. Houseplants can clean and purify the air in a home, helping to remove formaldehyde, benzene and other toxins that can make indoor air unhealthy to breathe. Benzene is an irritant that can cause dizziness, headache, nausea, and blurred vision, among other side effects. Formaldehyde, which is often found in homes thanks to its widespread use in a range of products, can cause watery eyes, nausea and wheezing.

· Watch what you are lighting up. Many homeowners know that smoking indoors drastically reduces indoor air quality, putting even nonsmokers at heightened risk of developing various respiratory ailments.

Homeowners concerned about the indoor air quality in their homes should ban smoking inside, no matter how low temperatures dip outside. In addition, homeowners with wood-burning stoves and fireplaces should be especially diligent maintaining these features, as they can release harmful soot and smoke if they are not taken care of. Some people may also be allergic to incense and scented candles, so keep a watchful eye on residents and guests whenever you light candles or sticks of incense. If any symptoms of allergies appear, avoid lighting any more candles or incense, waiting until you can open the windows if you want to

light any again.

• Purchase an air purifier. Air purifiers are beneficial yearround, helping to remove allergens and particles from a home. High-efficiency particulate air filters, known as HEPA filters, are extremely effective at removing airborne particulates from the air inside your home.

• Pay attention to pets. Like their owners, pets tend to spend more time indoors during the winter. That means more fur and pet dander, the skin flakes in an animal's fur or hair that can trigger allergic reactions, is likely in your home during the winter than in the summer. To combat this, bathe your pets regularly in the winter, making sure to wash the animal's bedding in hot water on a weekly basis as well.

• Open the windows when possible. Winter does not typically provide many opportunities to open the windows, but you might get a few chances to let some fresh air in through the windows during winter. Make the most of these opportunities, and when possible crack the windows when you're cleaning so dust and other particles that kick up have a path outside of your home.

Clean interior air should be a year-round priority, but homeowners may have to go the extra mile to keep their homes' interior air clean when winter arrives.

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HOW TO CLEAN AND MAINTAIN STAINLESS STEEL

No matter the style of a homeowner's kitchen, be it modern, traditional or farmhouse, stainless steel appliances can add a pop of shine and a touch of class. Proponents of stainless steel appliances note their easy maintenance, stylish look and durability. Plus, the neutral tone of stainless steel helps it blend in with just about any color palette.

Stainless steel is lauded for its strength and resistance to corrosion and rust. These attributes make it a popular choice in kitchens, where moisture is an issue. Although they are certainly durable choices, stainless steel appliances require maintenance to keep them looking and performing at their best. Considering that stainless steel also costs more than other finish options, taking the time to learn proper care can help protect homeowners' investments.

· Avoid chlorine bleach or other products containing chloride. Although stainless steel is highly resistant to corrosion, it is not completely impervious. Chlorine products can damage the surface of stainless steel appliances and stain them if the chlorine is left to sit.

· Do not use metal scourers or coarse abrasives on the stainless steel because such products may scratch the steel. Steel wool pads can leave behind a residue of small metal particles that may eventually rust.

· Baking soda mixed with a little dish soap can be used to remove some tough dirt and stains. Rinse well and towel dry to avoid streaking.

· Clean and wipe the steel in the direction of the "grain." Usually this means working from the top of the appliance and moving down toward the floor.

· Consult with the owner's manual before undertaking any maintenance or cleaning. The appliance may have a special coating over the stainless steel to help protect it, and it's best to know what you're dealing with before getting your hands dirty.

• If you will be trying a cleaning product or scouring method, always test it first in an inconspicuous spot to see if it is effective or harmful.

· Julien, a leader in commercial kitchen equipment, recommends applying cleansers with a soft cloth or sponge. Then wipe dry with a soft, clean cloth or allow to air dry.

Stainless steel remains a popular material in kitchens for sinks and appliances. With care, stainless steel can look like new for years to come.

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
