



### FIRST YEAR OF RURAL COMMUNITY **NURSING PROGRAM BEGINS**

Nine students from the Drayton Valley area are set to start their studies and gain hands-on training on their way to obtaining a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree - all without having to leave their home community.

Offered for the first time in Drayton Valley this year, the rural community nursing program builds on the successes Alberta Health Services (AHS) and University of Calgary (UCalgary) have experienced in Wainwright since jointly launching the program there in 2021.

"I am thrilled to see this program launch in Drayton Valley," says Andrew Boitchenko, MLA for Drav-

by Alberta ton Valley-Devon. "This is an excellent opportunity for students interested in a future in healthcare to be able to learn close to home, and a chance for them to experience first-hand all that rural healthcare has to offer."

Kelsey Letendre, a local licensed practical nurse (LPN) at the Drayton Valley Hospital and Care Centre, is among the first cohort of students. She embraces the opportunity to further her education without having to leave for the city.

"Having this program available in smaller, rural communities not only makes the degree much more accessible but gives students the supports of home," says Letendre. "I grew up here. I've been working here for 10 years.

Knowing I have the support of my family, coworkers and manager at the hospital all right here with me has made it easier to take this next step in my career. I'm looking forward to growing as a nurse and continuing to care for my community for years to come."

For AHS, the opportunity to collaborate with partners to grow local talent supports not only students but the future of rural healthcare, as well.

"We do face challenges in recruiting nursing staff to rural sites," says Janice Stewart, Chief Zone Officer with AHS Central Zone. "By creating opportunities to educate registered nurses in their home communities, we are building capacity for a local, more sustainable

workforce into the future.

"That is good news for our rural hospitals, and for patients and families in the community."

The program was developed as a way of reducing barriers to learning, recruiting students to healthcare careers, and encouraging graduates to stay in their home communities.

Students of the Drayton Valley program will take part in both in-person and virtual learning opportunities, gaining valuable skills and hands-on experience from instructors and seasoned nurses. New educational spaces have been established in collaboration with the Town of Drayton Valley, which has been a key partner in getting the







- · Safety glasses: Invest in a pair of safety glasses so no one working on a project deals with obstructed vision. Safety glasses also provide ample eye protection.

A sofa that opens up to a bed or a convertible sectional can be a comfortable place for guests to lay their heads. Side tables provide guests with places to store their belongings, and an empty storage chest can house bed linens or guests' clothing.

Den/playroom

Children tend to accumulate toys and games. And as kids grow from children to young adults, their list of must-have items - from video gaming systems to

other electronics - grows along with them. Storage can make a room functional for both adults and children. Devote an entire wall to a closet or drawer system where toys can be stored out of sight when necessary. Storage ottomans can be used for extra seating while also providing somewhere for homeowners to stash stuffed animals or games for easy access. When choosing furniture, look for fabrics that are resistant to stains and modular pieces that can be moved around as necessary to create room for plaving or entertaining.

Bedroom/home office In 2015, 24 percent of employed people in the United States did some or all of their work at home, says the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Bringing work home means men and women will need a space to work. In tight quarters, bedrooms may be the only available area. An armoire-style desk will blend in with the decor and can hide paperwork and electronics behind doors. Otherwise, a makeup vanity can serve the dual purpose of providing a place to get ready for a night out and a ready space to house a laptop during the day.

In smaller homes, homeowners may be forced to turn rooms into dual purpose areas.

### WATER QUALITY ADVISORY ISSUED FOR WABAMUN LAKE PROVINCIAL PARK BEACH

Due to elevated levels of fecal bacteria currently present in the water at Wabamun Lake Provincial Park Beach, located within the Edmonton Zone of Alberta Health Services (AHS), AHS is advising the public not to swim or wade at this beach area, effective immediately.

Elevated levels of fecal bacteria were detected via testing of the lake water at this beach location. At current levels, gastrointestinal illness may result from ingestion of the water at

Wabamun Lake Provincial Park Beach. As well, there is the possibility of skin, ear and eye infections with water contact.

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any lake or reservoir, at any time. Water-borne organisms, including fecal bacteria, can cause vomiting and diarrhea.

AHS Environmental Public Health officers will continue to monitor the water at Wabamun Lake Provincial Park Beach.

This advisory will remain in effect until further notice.

I'm off again, heading down to the USA, Madison Wisconsin, this time to take some training from the Bowhay Institute for Legislative Leadership Development. Quite the honor actually, as thee is typically only one legislator selected from the member states and provinces each year. When I'm on the road, and folks who are not aware of what Alberta is like, I start off with saying its "Texas North", people get that. Immediately they get the ideas of cowboys and oil. They get the idea of honest hard-working people who stand up for themselves and others, they also get the idea of the economy, diversified and strong. As the old saying goes, you don't mess with Texas, and the same can be said about Alberta within Canada. Many don't realize that as Albertans we are sitting on the 4th largest known oil reserve on the planet. That we also have over 223 trillion cubic feet of natural gas. The USA gets 99 percent of their gas imports from Alberta and well north of 50% of their imported oil comes from Alberta. We are not only integral to their current energy needs, but as they transition to Hydrogen, heck, we are experts in that field as well. If they don't want to take fresh water away from keeping people hydrated, crops watered and animals alive, then they are going to be requiring as much natural gas as we can provide them.

About that culture thing again, so why is it that if strangers from not only the USA, but from Europe, Central America, and East Asia like who we are, how we carry ourselves, and are energized when we have conversations with them, why

is it that our own culture is being targeted from our PM of the present? I know I'm not the only one wondering that. 



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
