

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NEW CAMPAIGN PROMOTES ALBERTA'S SKILLED TRADES

Alberta's government is launching a new campaign to highlight the important role of apprenticeship education and skilled trades in the province to encourage more students to begin in-demand careers

From homes to highways, skilled tradespeople build Alberta's landscape and play a pivotal role in upholding and advancing industry standards. They are highly valued individuals that go on to become leaders, innovators, business owners and educators in various industries

Alberta's government is launching an advertising campaign and website to champion apprenticeship education and emphasize the value skilled tradespeople bring to our province. Apprenticeship education is post-secondary education and any effort an individual takes to build skills, whether through an apprenticeship or a university education will set them

up for economic success and career satisfaction.

"With the world around us consistently changing, Alberta's government is committed to helping our post-secondary students get the skills they need to succeed in the economy of tomorrow. By championing apprenticeship education and careers in the skilled trades, we can inspire future apprentices and attract more skilled tradespeople to our province."

In 2024-25, Alberta is investing more than \$117 million in apprenticeship programming. This includes \$78 million for seats in apprenticeship programs in 11 post-secondary institutions around the province, an increase of \$24 million over last year.

When considering apprenticeship education, students are considering a high-impact, low-cost investment in their future with a wide range of opportunities to contribute to Alberta's growing economy. From carpentry to hair styling, Alberta currently offers 47 different apprenticeship programs to choose from.

Alberta's government is committed to ensuring all underrepresented groups, such as women, newcomers and people with disabilities have the opportunity to pursue a career in the skilled trades.

Promoting skilled trades and apprenticeships

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

which prevents thermal bridging through the studs, providing better thermal performance. Finish with a moisture-resistant and dimensionally stable insulation between the studs, like R14 Comfortbatt, to protect against common basement issues such as mold. mildew and rot.

Choose a functional design. Draw out plans, carefully taking into consideration any low ceilings or small windows.

Try to incorporate structural features, such as attractive wood beams, into your design. Keep the space as open as possible. Select lighting that provides a bright, airy feel.


Don't forget to soundproof it. Soundproofing is the ultimate solution to maximize your basement's quiet and privacy. PREVENT STAIRWAY INJURIES

Stairs are a necessity in many homes. While stairs serve a practical purpose, they also have the potential to be dangerous.

According to the National Safety Council, more than one million injuries result each year from stairway falls. Staircase and stairway accidents constitute the second leading cause of accidental injury, second only to motor vehicle accidents. Each year, there

are 12,000 stairway accident deaths. The Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation states that a large portion of Canadians who visit hospitals after a fall on or from stairs or steps in their homes are seniors (men and women age 65 years or older).

However, many stairway falls can be prevented with some simple planning.

Install sturdy handrails. A common

contributor to stairway falls is a failure to use handrails. Sturdy handrails can decrease fall rates. Even if a person slips, he or she may be able to prevent the fall by grabbing on to the handrails and regaining some of his or her balance.

Rely on highfriction lighters or strips. According to a study titled "Safety on stairs: Influence of a tread edge highlighter and its position," by

Richard J. Foster, fall risk may be reduced by using a highlighter positioned flush with the tread edge. This helps make stairs more visible, particularly for those with impaired vision.

Improve lighting on staircases. Failure to see steps may contribute to falls as well. Staircases should be well lit so that residents and quests know where to step.

Subtle foot-level lighting can be installed to make it easier for people who frequently use steps at night.

Use slip-resistant materials. Slip-resistant surface material acceptable for normal floors should work on stair treads. Loose rugs should not be placed at the top or bottom of the landing. Outdoors, rough finishes are recommended, particularly on stairs that are subject to getting wet.

Improve step geometry. If slips and falls frequently occur on a particular staircase, consider the relationship between the rise and the run, advises the Canadian Centre for Occupational Health and Safety. The National Building Code of Canada says that, within a staircase, treads should have a uniform run and tread depth that does not vary more than 0.5 to

1 cm. Steep steps with high risers and/or short treads can increase the risk of falls.

Clear away clutter. One easy way to prevent falls is to keep stairs free of clutter. This means removing shoes, toys and other belongings that may be left on stairs or landings.

Many falls on stairs can be prevented by being mindful of certain risk factors.

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5 TIPS TO PREPARE FOR WINDOW REPLACEMENT

Winter is coming, and for millions of people who reside in areas of the country that see the mercury drop considerably between December and March, that means prioritizing staying warm. Inefficient or aging housing materials may compromise your ability to do just that.

- What is the protocol for installation during inclement weather?
- 2. Research permits. Most home renovation projects need to be approved by the local municipality. Go to the permit office and find out the requirements. Some window contractors will include securing permits in the cost of the project. After the project is completed, an inspector will come by and ensure the work was done

according to code.

- 3. Change up the appearance. Look at the type of hardware you have around the home other fixtures. and Choose windows that have locks or latches that can match those features for continuity of style. Think about choosing a different style or frame color of the window, or a different type of window to improve efficiency and function.
- 4. Research top window manufacturers. It's tempting to purchase

windows based on price alone, but replacement windows are often a decision that only has to be made once or twice for the life of the home. Invest in durable windows that will have staying power. Consumer Reports offers unbiased reviews on various window brands and can help homeowners make sound decisions.

5. Prepare for installation. Clear pathways, remove window treatments and disconnect window alarm systems.

Plan for one to two days of installation, advises Andersen Windows and Doors. Keep pets and children away from work areas.

Replacement windows can be a smart investment. New windows can improve the look of a home, reduce heating costs and can keep interior spaces comfortable.
