PARKLAND RCMP INVESTIGATE HOME INVASION

On Sept. 9, 2024, Parkland RCMP received a report of a Break and Enter and a potential extortion with a firearm at a residence in Parkland County. Upon arrival, police located the homeowner and removed her from the residence to ensure her safety. Police immediately searched the home and located two suspects as well as a loaded 9 mm handgun in the home. During the break in, one of the suspects was attacked by a large dog in the home causing fairly significant injury. This suspect was transported to hospital where after receiving treatment was taken back to the detachment.

- •Extortion with a firearm;
- •Possession of a restricted firearm;

- •Possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose;
- •Sing a firearm in the commission of an offence;
- Pointing a firearm;
- •Fail to comply with a release order:
- •Possession of a weapon contrary to order:
 - •Careless use of a firearm.

Kuzniarski was take before a justice of the peace and remanded into custody with his next court date set for Sept 10, 2024, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Stony Plain.

KNOW WARNING SIGNS OF POTENTIAL SUICIDAL THOUGHTS, PLANS

World Suicide Prevention Day, and Alberta Health Services (AHS) reminds Albertans that recognizing the risk factors and potential signs of suicidal thoughts is important and can be helpful in preventing death by suicide.

In adults, warning signs of potential suicidal thoughts or plans include:

- Talking or writing about wanting to die or to hurt or kill themselves or someone else.
 - Saying they feel

hopeless, trapped, without purpose, in pain, or like they're a burden to others.

- Looking for ways to harm themselves. For example, they might buy a gun or stockpile medicines.
- Increasing their use of alcohol or drugs.
- Withdrawing from

family, friends and activities.

- Seeming angry, grumpy, anxious or depressed.
- Eating or sleeping less or more than usual.
- Doing risky things, such as driving too fast.

- Fire Rescue International is a useful tool for EMS before they arrive on scene as they provide basic life support to patients
- Most of FRI firefighters are Licenced Pre-Hospital Care Practitioners Emergency Medical Responder (EMR) Level or Higher
- FRI has been part of the Medical First Response program since it rolled out in 2017 This program is run and operated through AHS-This program offers medically based programs and supports to fire departments all over Alberta. In the end this helps the end user
- We provide critical life-saving interventions as a bridge in care between time of the 911 call and the arrival of a betterequipped ambulance
- Once EMS arrives on scene FRI falls under their command. They are the higher trained agency
- FRI job is to make the service and transition from their care to AHS as seamless as possible

FACT

- Often the fire department is there ahead of EMS due to many different reasons. This is no fault to the
 paramedics out there doing their best! One main issue is lack of resources in our health system. For instance:
 If there's a call at 10:15 am and another one at 10:30am, the ambulance in our area is likely tied up at the
 hospital with the first patient. There will be a delay for the ambulance in this case.
- Luckily we have an ambulance bay in Alberta Beach where they bring in another ambulance once they get a
 call. There can be a bit of a lag time in between those times. Best efforts are made and ambulances are called
 from other areas to fill in those gaps where they can.
- Having the FD there helps a lot as we can do some life saving interventions if needed as well as vitals etc.











DIY PROJECTS THAT CAN CONSERVE ENERGY AROUND THE HOUSE

Home renovation projects can pay numerous dividends. Renovations can have a positive effect on resale value, make homes more livable for residents and, in some ways, make homes more affordable.

Renovation projects that aim to conserve energy can save homeowners substantial amounts of money. Such projects don't often require considerable effort or even sizable financial investments, which can make homeowners skeptical

as to just how much they can save after completing the project. But the scale of a project may have little to do with how much homeowners will save. For example, the U.S. Department of Energy notes that a relatively effortless task like turning back a thermostat between 7° and 10° F for eight hours per day can save homeowners as much as \$83 per year. A more labor-intensive task like planting shade trees saves homeowners an average of between

\$35 and \$119 per year.

When looking for ways conserve energy around the house and save money, homeowners need not necessarily commit to expensive projects. The DOE notes that the following are some energy-saving projects and details what homeowners can expect to save after completing them. While each individual project may not result in jaw-dropping savings, homeowners who follow many of these recommendations may end up saving more than \$1,000 per year.

Project: Install exterior low-e storm windows.

What is it? Low-e windows reflect infrared heat back into a home. Such windows are coated with an ultra-thin layer of metal that improves the window's insulation ability.

How much can I save? Homeowners who install low-e windows can save between 12 and 33 percent on their

annual heating and cooling costs.

Project: Seal uncontrolled air leaks.

What is it? Air leaks let cool air in during winter and warm air in during summer. Caulking, sealing and weather stripping all cracks and large openings can cut back on air leaks that are costing you money. The DOE recommends hiring a contractor to seal any leaks on heating and cooling ducts.

How much can I save?

Homeowners who seal uncontrolled air leaks can save between 10 and 20 percent on their annual heating and cooling bills.

Project: Plant shade trees.

What is it? If you plant a deciduous tree between six and eight feel tall near your home, it will begin to shade your windows within a year of being planted. Depending on the species of the tree and the home, the shade tree will begin shading the roof within five to 10 years. The DOE notes that shading is the most cost-effective way to reduce air conditionina costs.

How much can I save? Properly planted shade trees can reduce air conditioning costs by anywhere from 15 to 50 per-

Project: Insulate the water heater tank

What is it? New water tanks are likely already insulated. But homeowners with older hot water tanks can insulate their tanks with a water

heater insulating blanket kit.

How much can I save? Insulating a water heater tank can save homeowners as much as 16 percent on their annual water heating bills.

HOME IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS FOR YOUR FALL TO-DO LIST

Homeowners know that maintaining a home can be a year-round job. No home is immune to wear and tear, and homeowners who want to protect their real estate investments should try to stay two steps ahead to ensure their homes do not succumb to the elements or become outdated and unappealing to prospective buyers.

Fall has become a season that's synonymous with home improvement, but homeowners need not wait until the leaves begin changing colors to start planning their next projects. The following are a few items homeowners can add to their fall home improvement to-do lists.

Roof inspection

Less precipitation tends to fall during the warmer months than during the late fall and winter. As a result, homeowners may not be aware of leaky roofs until autumn has come and gone. climb onto the roof to identify the location of the leak and fix it before winter rains and snowfall turn the problem into something much larger. Inspect your ceilings for signs of leaking after a strong rainfall, and then address any leaks immediately.

Gutter cleaning

While some homeowners prefer to delay their gutter cleaning projects until late fall, those whose homes are surrounded by trees may need to schedule two such projects. Gutters clogged with leaves and other debris can cause serious roof damage, and that damage

can extend all the way inside a home. In addition, clogged gutters make great nesting areas for insects or critters. Always stand on a ladder when cleaning gutters, wearing gloves to remove items by hand and dropping leaves and debris into a trash can below. Standing on the roof and leaning over gutters greatly increases your risk of injury. If the gutters are clear when you first examine them in early fall, you can wait until later in the season to give them a complete and thorough cleaning. Once you have finished clearing the

gutters, you can use a hose to run water through them and the downspouts to confirm everything is functioning properly.

Window and doorway inspection

Before temperatures start dropping once again, homeowners will want to inspect their windows and doorways for leaks. Over time, cracks can develop around windows and doorways, and while such cracks are rarely noticeable when the weather outside is warm, they can be quite obvious and very costly if they remain unsealed come the start of winter. Cold air can en-

ter a home through cracks around windows and doorways, and many homeowners who don't suspect leaks may respond by turning up the thermostats in their homes. That can prove quite expensive over a full winter. Choose a windy autumn day to place a hand by windows and external doorways in your home to see if you can feel drafts. If you can, seal these cracks as soon as possible.

Patio cleanup

Patios are popular hangouts during spring and summer, and that can result in a lot of wear and tear. Once you store patio furniture for the winter, inspect your entire patio to determine if it needs any refurbishing. While certain patio projects may be best left for spring, you can still clean any stained areas around the grill and look for cracks in the sidewalk that need to be addressed.

Preparing for fall home improvement projects ahead of time can help homeowners complete projects in a timely manner and ensures they won't be forced to brave the winter elements when refurbishing their homes.



Giving away their belongings.

People can also be more at risk of suicide when they experience barriers accessing social and health services, mental illness, traumatic life events, family violence, discrimination or have a diagnosis of a serious physical illness. Talking about suicide is one of the most effective means of reducing stigma and supporting those in need.

Albertans are encouraged to use the REACH Pathway to help remember what you can do to support someone who is struggling:

- · Recognize when someone is struggling.
- Engage in conversation and listen with empathy.
- · Ask directly about suicidal thoughts and feelings.
- · Connect to support and resources.
- · Heal yourself by taking care of your own mental health.

Together, we can help prevent suicide by showing understanding and compassion and by encouraging people experiencing mental health challenges to reach out for support.
