Rail Safety Week occurs every September by Operation Lifesaver (OL) Canada to raise

public awareness about rail safety and remind Canadians that taking risks near tracks and trains could cost them a limb, or their life. A significant part of OL's work includes community partnership initiatives, school presentations, and free resources such as Thomas the Tank storybooks for children aged 3-5.

Did you know?

Over the last five years, more than 100 Canadians (average) have been seriously hurt or killed each year in railway crossing and trespasser incidents.

In 2023 alone, 73 Canadians were hurt or killed because they were on tracks or rail property illegally. Another 32 were hurt or killed at crossings.

So far in 2024 (January-June), an average of 10 Canadians per month have been seriously hurt or killed at crossings, or by trespassing onto federally regulated railways. That's a 33% increase over the fiveyear historical average.

BRINGING MOBILE LUNG SCREENING TO RURAL ALBERTA

More Albertans living in remote communities will soon have better and more timely access to lung screening, leading to improved treatment and health outcomes.

Alberta's government is committed to providing high-quality health care services for all Albertans, no matter where they live in the province. To ensure Albertans can get the care they need close to home, Alberta's government and the Alberta Cancer Foundation are partnering with the not-

for-profit 19 to Zero to support mobile lung health units that will bring screening services to underserved communities across the province.

Investing in mobile services available in rural and remote communities will increase the likelihood of early detection and treatment, improving health outcomes and bridging gaps in the health care system. The mobile screening program will receive \$1.5 million from Alberta's government, which will be matched by the Alberta Cancer Foundation.

"We are committed to ensuring every Albertan has access

to the health care services they need when and where they need them. These mobile units will help bridge existing gaps in the health care system and improve outcomes for Albertans in rural and remote areas."

The mobile lung health units will travel to and service underserved, high-priority communities across the province. Patients in these communities often experience lengthy travel times to reach their closest diagnostic centres, which can lead to delayed diagnoses and the suboptimal management of lung conditions.

"19 to Zero is excited to be partnering to provide mobile health services for lung cancer and lung health testing. Many Albertans face health care access challenges, particularly in rural and remote areas, and this mobile unit will help improve equitable access across the province."

The mobile units include a converted medical sprinter van for pulmonary function testing (PFT) and a custom-built diagnostic imaging truck. The units will be designed and operated by Aceso Medical, and they will use mobile internet and Starlink to integrate with Connect Care, ensuring instant access to test results for radiologists and pulmonologists.

The mobile lung health units will provide PFT and computed technology (CT) scans, which are critical diagnostic tools for identifying and managing lung diseases like chronic obstructive pulmonary disease and lung cancer. Across Canada, these services are predominantly available in urban centres, leaving rural and remote communities without

access close to home.

Alberta's government will work with health care partners and local leadership to help determine areas of need for mobile visits. A website will be developed where the location and schedule of the units will be available.

The pulmonary function testing van is expected to be operational and on the road in spring 2025, with the CT truck following in late summer. Once operational, these mobile units will be able to complete more than 4,000 PFTs and up to 6,000 CT scans per year.

Alberta's government is committed to improving outcomes for Albertans diagnosed with cancer and will continue to engage in partnerships to leverage the growing life sciences sector.

NEW NEUROLOGY CLINIC OPENS AT WESTVIEW HEALTH CENTRE

A new neurology clinic at the WestView Health Centre is helping more patients living in rural areas get the care they need in their community.

The clinic, led by neurologist Dr. James Scozzafava, opened to patients in July and will run monthly at first before eventually moving to

a weekly schedule.

"We're focused on treating patients with acute neurological conditions, or new diagnoses," says Scozzafava. "If a patient has concerning symptoms such as sudden unexplained weakness in an arm, or facial numbness, their family doctor will likely provide a referral to a neurologist," he says.

"But if the patient has to wait 12 to 18 months or longer for an ap-

pointment, they've lost a lot of time in regard to the investigation," says Scozzafava.

Now, with the new clinic available, that wait time is drastically reduced to one to three months for patients in the area.

"We're all excited because local patients will be able to be seen quickly and can avoid those long waits and needing to drive long distances to be seen by a neurologist," says Scozzafava.

WestView is an ideal location for a neurology clinic because the site has space and clerical support already available, with no additional equipment or staff required. The neurology clinic operates out of an existing shared clinic space that also offers clinics for casts, geriatric assessment, pediatric asthma and general pediatric assessments.

"The addition of the neurology clinic to WestView Health Centre is fantastic news for our community," says Searle Turton, MLA for Spruce Grove-Stony Plain and Minister of Children and Family Services. "We want all Albertans to be able to receive the care they need where they need it and when they need it. This clinic is a great example of the dedication of health care professionals and the innovative work being done to improve access to healthcare to all, especially those in rural communities."

Patients who need to see a neurologist can ask their doctor to refer them to WestView Health Centre.

Alberta Health Services is the provincial health authority responsible for planning and delivering health supports and services for more than four million adults and children living in Alberta. Municipal and regional policing committees

Communities with municipal policing contracts and populations of more than 15,000 will be required to appoint municipal policing committees to oversee RCMP service delivery for their area. These committees will work with elected municipal officials to set policing priorities for the community, report on initiatives to support

those goals, and create safety plans with their local RCMP detachments, authorities and agencies.

RCMP-policed communities with populations between 5,000 and 15,000 will be represented by regional policing committees to which they will be required to recruit and appoint members. These civilian committees will represent the interests and concerns of the public to the RCMP leadership in their district, work with local

officials to identify and address public safety concerns for their region, and report on the implementation of programs and services to address them.

The Provincial Police Advisory Board

Small and rural communities policed by the RCMP with populations under 5,000 will be represented by a new advisory board. The Provincial Police Advisory Board will represent the interests and concerns of Albertans in these communities, sup-

port integrated safety planning and liaise with Alberta's government, the RCMP and municipalities to align policing priorities and resources to help address local concerns and challenges. The 15-person board will include dedicated seats for representatives from Alberta Municipalities, Rural Municipalities of Alberta, and First Nations and Métis communities, as well as community representation for each of the province's RCMP districts.

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LOWERING COSTS FOR MUNICIPALITIES

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta is lowering the cost of borrowing for municipalities, enabling them to invest more in services and infrastructure.

Municipalities play an important role in shaping Alberta's vibrant communities and contributing to a stronger province. The province will now lend money to local authorities, which include municipalities, airports, counties and irrigation districts, at a lower rate.

These entities will now pay the same interest rate as the province on money borrowed for infrastructure and other capital projects. The change is expected to save municipalities about \$7 million in 2025-26 and about \$12 million in 2026-27.

In a time of high interest rates, Alberta's government is reducing the budgetary pressures faced by local governments and frees up funds for purposes other than servicing

debt.

With Alberta's balancing of the budget, the province has been able to reduce outstanding debt by more than \$19 billion. With continued strong results, Alberta's borrowing costs are expected to remain low.


The Loans to Local Authorities program allows even the smallest municipalities in Alberta to benefit from the province's fiscal strength and well-established access to global capital markets. The province lends money to local authorities to help finance their capital projects, such as roads and upgrades to local water, sewer, gas and electric services.
