## HELPING ALBERTA COMMUNITIES LOWER ENERGY COSTS

New funding will help municipalities access technology to lower electricity bills and reduce emissions.

Many Alberta municipalities are looking for ways to improve energy efficiency and save taxpayer money by reducing energy costs. However, upgrades and improvements are often expensive or otherwise challenging for communities to put in place.

In response, Alberta is offering a new \$3-million Municipal

Electricity Generation Program to help municipalities lower the costs of powering and heating recreation centres, town halls, libraries and other community buildings. Communities can now apply for rebates to help improve their electricity systems, reduce operational costs and lower emissions.

Leduc RCMP would like to thank the member of the public who observed a crime in progress at a rural property and reported it to police immediately. This person was instrumental in this duo being caught by police.

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



## NEW SCHOOL YEAR, NEW MENTAL HEALTH CLASSROOMS

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government is making progress on its promise to open 60 mental health classrooms across the province, bringing nine more online this September.

Alberta's government is building a full continuum of care for those facing mental health and addiction challenges. With services including prevention, intervention, treatment and recovery, Albertans are getting access to world-class mental health care that is helping rebuild and strengthen lives across the province. A primary focus is building the Alberta Recovery Model, which is based on the belief that recovery and wellness is possible, no matter what mental

health or addiction challenge someone may face.

As part of the Alberta Recovery Model, the province has partnered with CASA Mental Health to make record-breaking expansions to services for children and youth. Through this partnership, Alberta is investing \$70 million over three years to bring online a total of up to 60 CASA Mental Health Classrooms across the province. This September marks another step towards that goal with the opening of nine classrooms in seven communities throughout Alberta.

"Services like this are important to the long-term success and well-being of children and youth who are right now facing some very difficult challenges with their mental health. Every kid de-

serves to know that help is available, and that they can recover and live fulfilling lives. Our government is going to continue with investments like this that change the lives of children, youth and their families."


CASA Mental Health Classrooms provide a unique setting in which students facing complex mental health challenges can receive professional care without disrupting their education. Students are also able to maintain their social lives and stay connected to their peers. Each classroom is staffed with a fulltime teacher, mental health therapist, mental health aide and other staff who support students in their recovery. Caregivers are also provided with resources to support the child or youth during and after the program.

"This partnership with the Government of Alberta is bringing services closer to Alberta's children and families. The goal is to provide mental health services earlier to more children and youth to prevent treatment in hospitals and

### **Fire Prevention Patrol**

Always keep looking for ways to prevent and protect yourself against fires, especially during

### Fire Prevention Week is October 8-14 Try these helpful tips to get you started with fire safety:

- Replace smoke alarm batteries at least once a year.
- Teach children that fire is a tool, not a toy.
- Replace old, worn or damaged appliance cords.
- Keep matches and lighters in a locked drawer or cabinet, away from small children
- Test smoke alarms once a month.
- Plan two exits out of every room.
- Always make sure candles, matches and cigarettes are properly extinguished.
- If you believe fire may be outside the room, check the door and doorknob for heat before opening it.
- Practice fire drills at home and at school.
   Find the fastest, safest exit route.
- In the event of a fire, leave the house quickly and don't go back inside! Call for help from a neighbor's house.

## Follow these 9 tips to help protect yourself, your family and your property against fire hazards.

- Install a fire alarm in every sleeping area and on every level of your home, and be sure to test alarms every month. Working smoke alarms reduce the risk of death in a home fire in half.
- 2. Check the manufacture date on the back of your home's smoke alarms. Smoke alarms should be replaced at least every 10 years! Batteries should be replaced every year.
- 3. Never leave burning candles unattended, and always keep matches and lighters out of reach from children.
- 4. Make a fire action plan, so every member of your household knows how to escape and where to meet outdoors.
- 5. Over half of home heating fire deaths are caused by equipment being placed too close to things that can burn. Make sure furniture, clothing, mattresses and bedding are at least three feet from heating sources.
- 6. Always turn off space heaters when you leave the room or go to sleep. Space heaters are the cause of about 79 percent of fatal home heating fires.
- 7. Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. Turn off the stove whenever you leave the kitchen, and never leave home while food is cooking.
- 8. Inspect electrical cords regularly, and replace cords that are cracked or damaged or have broken plugs or loose connections.
- In the event of a fire, crawl to safety. Use the back of your hand to see if a door is hot before opening it. If it feels hot, try to use another exit.

Alberta's government first supported the introduction of CASA Mental Health Classrooms in 2023 and continues to back their expansion to more schools. As of this September, 17 CASA Mental Health Classrooms are operating throughout the province, more than double what was available last school year. Classrooms will continue to open in a phased approach, with a total of up to 60 Classrooms, supporting about 140 Alberta communities by 2026. Once all are online, CASA Mental Health Classrooms will be helping about 1,500 students each year.

"When our daughter needed help, CASA Classrooms were a healthy space for her to learn and grow in. She gained a multitude of skills and tools to cope with emotional distress, while being academically successful. The CASA Classroom has been a great success for our daughter, and I am thrilled to see more Albertans be able to access this program."

CASA Mental Health is a valued partner and the second-largest provider of community-based mental health services for children and youth in Alberta. The non-profit organization focuses on supporting youth who have mental health challenges that are complex but do not require treatment in a hospital or other acute care setting. Provincial funding supports many of their programs, including a CASA House currently operating in the Edmonton region and three new CASA House facilities that will open elsewhere in Alberta over the next few years, along with other specialty services.

Alberta's government is making record investments in mental health services to support Albertans of all ages in their pursuit of wellness and recovery. This includes investing in digital supports like 211 Alberta and Kids Help Phone, supporting youth mental health hubs, increasing access to eating disorder treatment for young Albertans and investing in affordable virtual and in-person counselling.







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## BRINGING MOBILE LUNG SCREENING TO RURAL ALBERTA

More Albertans living in remote communities will soon have better and more timely access to lung screening, leading to improved treatment and health outcomes.

Alberta's government is committed to providing high-quality health care services for all Albertans, no matter where they live in the province. To ensure Albertans can get the care they need close to home, Alberta's government and the Alberta Cancer Foundation are partnering with the not-for-profit 19 to Zero to support mobile lung health units that will bring screening services to underserved communities across the province.

Investing in mobile services available in rural and remote communities will increase the likelihood of early detection and treatment, improving health outcomes and bridging gaps in the health care system. The mobile screening program will receive \$1.5 million from Alberta's government, which

will be matched by the Alberta Cancer Foundation.

"We are committed to ensuring every Albertan has access to the health care services they need when and where they need them. These mobile units will help bridge existing gaps in the health care system and improve outcomes for Albertans in rural and remote areas"

Early detection is key to successful cancer treatment, and these specialized mobile clinics will bring essential diagnostics to thousands of Albertans in rural, Indigenous and underserved communities each year."

The mobile lung health units will travel to and service underserved, high-priority communities across the province. Patients in these communities often experience lengthy travel times to reach their closest diagnostic centres, which can lead to delayed diagnoses and the suboptimal management of lung conditions.

"19 to Zero is excited to be partnering to provide mobile health services for lung cancer and lung health testing. Many Albertans face health care access challenges, particularly in rural and remote areas, and this mobile unit will help improve equitable access across the province."

The mobile units include a converted medical sprinter van for pulmonary function testing (PFT) and a custom-built diagnostic imaging truck. The units will be designed and operated by Aceso Medical, and they will use mobile internet and Starlink to integrate with Connect Care, ensuring instant access to test results for radiologists and pulmonologists.

The mobile lung health units will provide PFT and computed technology (CT) scans, which are critical diagnostic tools for identifying and managing lung diseases like chronic obstructive pulmonary disease and lung cancer. Across Canada, these services are predominantly available in urban centres, leaving rural and remote communities without access close to home.

Alberta's government will work with health care partners and local leadership to help determine areas of need for mobile visits. A website will be developed where the location and schedule of the units will be available.

The pulmonary function testing van is expected to be operational and on the road in spring 2025, with the CT truck following in late summer. Once operational, these mobile units will be able to complete more than 4,000 PFTs and up to 6,000 CT scans per year.

Alberta's government is committed to improving outcomes for Albertans diagnosed with cancer and will continue to engage in partnerships to leverage the growing life sciences sector.
