Minister of Children Family Services and Searle Turton issued the following statement recognizing Child Abuse Prevention Month:


"No child should ever have experience



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


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Stony Plain Fire Department Kicks Off Fire Prevention Week: Emphasizing Smoke Alarm Safety

"This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign is a great way to remind everyone about these messages and to act on them."

Mayor William Choy added, "Fire Prevention Week is a perfect time to remind our community about the life-saving role of working smoke alarms. I encourage all residents to take a few moments to ensure their smoke alarms are working and to participate in the safety initiatives led by our dedicated Fire Department."

Smoke Alarm Safety Tips and Guidelines:

Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area (like a hallway), and on each level (including the basement) of the home.

Make sure smoke alarms meet the needs of all family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.

Test smoke alarms at least once a month by

pushing the test button.

Spring forward or fall back, don't let safety slack-change smoke alarm batteries when you adjust your clocks for time change.

Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.



ENHANCING EARLY DETECTION OF CERVICAL CANCER

Alberta's government is piloting a project that will allow Albertans to screen themselves for cervical cancer using a take-home kit

Early detection of cancer is crucial to saving lives, and Alberta's government continues to prioritize opportunities that make early detection more accessible and convenient. When it comes to cervical cancer, the majority of cases are preventable with routine screening and treatment.

As part of the Cervical Cancer Screening Program, Alberta's government, along with partners Alberta Health Services (AHS) and Alberta Precision Labs, has launched a pilot project to look at innovative ways to expand cancer screening opportunities for Albertans. The pilot project will invite eligible Albertans to participate, including Indigenous people and individuals living in rural and remote communities.

"We know cervical cancer is almost entirely preventable with routine immunization and regular screening, which is why this pilot project is so important. This represents a vital next step towards eliminating cervical cancer altogether."

The cervix self-screening test is a more predictive test than routine pap testing. It detects high-risk strains of human papillomavirus (HPV), identifying individuals at risk for developing abnormal cervical cells, allowing for early treatment to prevent cancer.

The test kits contain the supplies people need to test themselves safely at home or wherever they are most comfortable. After testing, the kits are sent to a lab and results are provided to patients and health care providers.

The first 300 kits are currently available for eligible participants at the first pilot project site in Edmonton. Expansion to

community partners and rural sites will follow.

"Self-sampling allows the person to collect their own sample in a location that feels safe and comfortable. HPV self-sampling looks for the virus that causes cervical cancer. If found early, it can be treated so cervical cancer does not develop."

This pilot project will help develop effective and sustainable HPV self-sampling strategies for under-screened populations and validate the necessary pathways and protocols for expanding cervical self-screening provincewide.

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ALBERTA RCMP COORDINATE WITH COMMUNITIES TO CURTAIL COPPER WIRE CROOKS

The Alberta RCMP is launching a community initiative in response to concerns about ongoing copper wire theft in eastern Alberta.

To reduce the amount of theft the RCMP's Eastern and Central District's Crime Reduction Units, along with K Division Criminal Analysis Section (K/DCAS), and Community Safety and Wellbeing Branch will be working with industry partners to determine areas that are being targeted and develop strategies to investigate, identify, and ultimately arrest the individuals who are causing the most harm related to copper wire and precious metal thefts.

Precious metals like copper are used in a variety of projects ranging from large scale industrial sites like power plants, cellphone towers, and pipelines, to smaller uses like the wiring in homes.

Copper wire and other precious metals can be difficult to track making them ideal targets for criminals to steal. The theft of copper wire can have a large impact on the public, whether it's having spare wire stolen from your personal property or damage caused to vital infrastructure across the province.

Last year in Alberta losses from copper wire theft including damages to property was in excess of 10 million dollars. There are a variety of things that the public and companies can do to help reduce the likelihood of copper wire theft in your communities:

• Consider installing an alarm system with remote monitoring of surveillance cameras.

- Ensure each entrance and exit of your commercial property has proper lighting and surveillance cameras clearly visible to deter criminal activity.
- Arrange to have your precious metals laser engraved, so they can be easier identified and returned if recovered.
- For metal purchasers, be cautious about purchasing material from unknown or suspicious sellers.
 - Always secure your

valuables in a secure area.

- Invest in fencing for extra protection and ensure it's well-maintained
- Always report suspicious persons you see at work sites, or on your property.

"The reality of the situation is, because copper wire is so common and can be almost impossible to identify if it isn't laser engraved, catching and charging copper wire thieves can be very difficult," said Staff Sergeant John Pike Dis-

trict Advisory non-commissioned officer of the RCMP Eastern Alberta District. "There are thousands of sites using copper wire, and we can't be at all of them. That's why it's so important for everyone do their part whether its securing your property, reporting suspicious activity, or questioning sellers."

AGRICULTURAL SERVICES APPEAL BOARD [4 positions, 1-year term]

This committee adjudicates property owner appeals of orders and penalties issued by the County's Agricultural Services pursuant to the provincial acts the County enforces. This committee will meet as required. Training required, costs for training will be covered. Term will be January 1, 2025 - December 31, 2025.

AGRICULTURAL SERVICES BOARD [3 positions, 3-year terms]

This five member advisory board provides advice to council on the agricultural programs and services provided within the county. The Board advises on policy issues under the Agricultural Services Board Act, the Weed Control Act, the Pest Control Act, and other provincial

statutes. This Board meets 7-8 times per year on the 4th Thursday of the month at 9:30 AM in the Wildwood office.

FCSS BOARD

[5 positions + 1 Parkland County position, 3-year term]

This seven member advisory board provides advice to Council and administration for the provision of preventive social services under the Family & Community Support Services Act & Regulation. The Board reviews programs for the volunteer community, seniors, adults, youth and children and reviews and approves grants to community organizations from funds budgeted by Council for preventive services. This board meets 6-8 times per year on a weekday morning in Wildwood County office.

HERITAGE BOARD [4 positions, 3-year term]

This five member board provides advice to Council with respect to the development and maintenance of a heritage program. The board will advise Council on the development of policy, budget, short and long term strategic planning and guidelines for funding projects, museums, community groups, businesses and individuals. This Board meets at the Wildwood County office at 9:30 AM on the 3rd Wednesday of the month, 4 times a year.

LIBRARY BOARD

[1 position, 3-year term]

This five member management board is responsible for the provision of library services to county residents. The board provides for the library services in the three rural libraries of Evansburg, Wildwood, and Green Grove (Niton) as well as providing funding to the libraries in Edson October 31, 2025. Training required. All SDAB and Hinton. Board members develop the annual training costs covered. budget, develop library policies and

ensure provision of library services as per the Libraries Act of Alberta. The Board meets on the 1st Tuesday of the month at 9:30 AM at the Wildwood Library.

RECREATION BOARD [7 positions, 3-year term]

This nine member advisory board provides advice to council regarding the provision of recreation and parks services. The board reviews grant applications from community groups and determines funding within certain limits. It provides recommendations to council and administration regarding recreation facilities, programs and support to groups providing recreational activities. Board meetings will occur quarterly on Mondays at 9:30 AM at the Edson county office

SUBDIVISION & DEVELOPMENT APPEAL BOARD

[1 position, 1-year term]

This board hears appeals of decisions from the Subdivision and Development Authority of Yellowhead County, pursuant to the Municipal Government Act. This board meets at the Edson office as required. This is a one-year term, ending

important conversations as #everychildmatters.





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SCHOOL LEADERS USE RESULTS TO DIRECT CONSTANT IMPROVEMENT PLAN

Grande Yellowhead School Division's leaders met in September to review last year's Assurance Measure results, student achievement data from June Diploma exams, and June literacy and numeracy screens assigned to at-risk students in Grades 1, 2, and 3.

Every fall, school principals and their admin colleagues analyze the Assurance Measure Survey

Results report based on responses from the teachers, students in selected grades, and parents at their school. Questions in the survey create a range of data points - focusing on Student Growth and Achievement, Teaching and Leading, Learning Supports, and Governance. School leadership reviews the survey responses to identify areas to celebrate, and areas where further investigation is needed. Principals then include their teaching staff in a deeper review: teachers look at individual student and whole class achievement in the specific curriculum or course they teach including the Provincial Achievement Test (PAT) results from June which are

released in late October.

The Results Review process of data analysis and exploring the root causes for the results is critical to informing the current school improvement plan which identifies the actions the school will implement to meet student learning and achievement goals informed by the results review process. Principals share the plan with their School Councils for support and additional insights.

In the primary elementary grades, teachers in Grade 1 – 3 will soon be reviewing literacy and numeracy data from screens applied to all students in September.

Kindergarten students also complete screens beginning in January.











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MORE ALBERTA, THAT'S WHAT THEY ARE ASKING FOR

The last time I had an article in the paper it was August 25. I had touched on our "Alberta Culture" and that I was the legislator selected by CSG Midwest to take their legislative leadership training course held by the Bowhay Institute at the University of Wisconsin located in Madison. Time Flies it appears, so I'll give you an overview of what I learned, which other engagements I had south of the Border representing Alberta, and who came to visit. I'll also touch on some local items, and some of the items regarding our Alberta Bill of

"Legislative Boot Camp" this is how a colleague from North Dakota described the training he was receiving from his local radio station in an interview. Considering he was an army officer graduate from Westpoint I considered his description very accurate! The training was intense, lots of self-reflection, self-discovery, group exercises, and quite frankly made to tear down some of the preconceived notions we may have had coming in so that we could grow not only as legislators, but as people. The group was a fairly well represented balance between republicans, and democrats. The Canadian provinces represented were Ontario, Manitoba, and me from Alberta. We had minimum 15-hour days, a few a little longer when you consider the evening hour networking up to midnight on a couple occasions. It was a mental workout to be sure.

It gave us opportunities to not only discover what our personalities were, how we tick, but to be able to assess how others work, and think. To allow us to re-evaluate our approaches, communicate, and to be able to share ideas, collaborate, and compromise as well. To work across the isle as it were in a safe environment where the cameras were not rolling or the papers waiting to catch a "Scoop". It allowed me to make new contacts, friends, colleagues that I can reach out to, to be able to bounce ideas off, and to reciprocate the favor.

I can tell you, I went from being known as "The guy from Canada", within a few days to being known as "Shane from Alberta". The group knew full well where I was from, what we do within our nation, but moreover how important we really are to the USA. I had a grin as big as the great outdoors when our Canadian consulate wanted to make sure I met the Senator from Ohio. because he had heard him talking about a great concept which included Canada in a big way regarding USA being called "Fortress North America. When the Consulate went to introduce us, he suggested we should talk about the concept, the senator laughed and said, "Where in the heck do you think I got it from, it was from this Albertan, I love the idea, Fortress North America, let's make it happen!" We have some great new friends carrying our message now down south, so when they are passing legislation, we will have folks who know who we are, and how it may impact us.

The next trip I was on was a speaking engagement being held in Dickinson North Dakota, it was the Ports to Plains Alliance AGM. Ports to Plains is a group based out of Texas, and they are looking to connect Mexico through Texas, the Midwest, up to the norther border through North Dakota, and Montana. For us, that means our Wild Horse crossing, up to the Veterans Highway, all the way up to Fort Mc-Murray. I was asked by their president to speak about our work on the economic corridors, and the concept of Fortress North America. It was extremely well received and had led to a number of follow up discussions with a number of the state representatives as well as with folks from Mexico.

From North Dakota I was then off to Tulsa Oklahoma to represent Alberta at the Energy Council. This group comprises of energy producing states, as well as the provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan. We are affiliate members due to the organizational structure, and when the council was formed to mitigate any foreign entities (Canada) from directly influencing USA energy / environmental policy. I can tell you full well however, we are greatly respected and welcomed for full participation in the meetings and the votes that take place. There was even a "Canadian Panel" in one of the afternoon sessions, chaired by our Canadian Consulate General based out of Texas, the Energy Ministers DM from Ontario, and our own Washington Based Representative who heads up our USA relations team. In addition, our Minister of Affordability was included on a panel discussion about hydrogen. We were well represented! Outcomes include a special project with several states and us to work some common challenges and share information between our universities, and

industry. I was happy to be approached by several senators to see if I was interested and to be able to help them on this.

Last October I was asked to attend a 9-day exchange in Germany, funded and hosted by the German government to view their energy transition. I was very engaged, and vocal on a number of items and approaches that they were taking that would not work here. In addition, I shared some of the approaches we were taking, and looking for opportunities to share ideas, and have them come to Alberta and see firsthand what we are working on, what path we are taking, and looking to help them as well. A small delegation took us up on that offer and came over to meet prior to Christmas last year. This summer a second delegation, through the same project that had several USA senators, a fellow MLA, and myself meet with them in Germany, took me up on my invitations to come here.

We acted as host, and I was very happy to chair a stakeholder round table discussion for several hours to talk about what we are doing here in Alberta. The conversations were straight forward, and I found that when the German delegates had a chance to meet with us directly, in our own backyard, they had a different perspective. It really opened doors, conversations, and led to an appreciation that although we have differing approaches, we are looking to solve common problems. It was also very encouraging to hear firsthand from a number of German corporations who also are wanting to make large



long-term investments in our province, because they too see the advantages we have to offer. The outcomes will be an annual visit from the German delegation, and we will have quarterly working meetings to ensure we are engaged and look for opportunities for sub national agreements between Alberta and German States.

I know I have said it before, but it never can be understated that when we tell our own story firsthand, that the results are simply amazing. People can see for themselves, that we are the real deal. We have been vilified on several files for years, wrongly. When we are open and honest, discussing some of our failings, our solutions, and our aspirations, it is ex-

tremely well received. You can't fake authenticity, and it shows, because people genuinely want to work with us, they want to trade with us, they want closer ties with us. When I have USA senators sending me pictures of them wearing my ballcap out in their constituencies, it's not staged, its out of friendship and respect. When we have foreign dignitaries hang-

ing local artists paintings on their wall of their offices back home, it's because they genuinely want a little piece of Alberta with them, and a view to remember us by. My ask of you is to be you, to be genuine, and to be an ambassador for our province in your own right. There are far too many that want to take a run at us for who we are and what we stand for, but I can tell you full well, the folks I've met, they want more Alberta in their lives, not less.

With that in mind, we are going to be modernizing, or updating the Alberta Bill of Rights. Over the summer, consultations took place, and a task force led by our MLA out of Red Deer heard from many Albertans directly and stakeholders as to what they thought should be included in our Bill of Rights. If you have not seen the Premier's update on this subject, I highly recommend it. It is timely and topical, covering people's freedoms of choice, property rights, and as well, firearms ownership. bill will be introduced in the house this fall, and we can't go into any fulsome details until that happens, but I can tell you full well from what I've been able to see so far in regard to a policy, I am very proud of the work to date, and will be very happy to support this in the house.

I hope that you have a great week, sorry again for the gap in articles, and I hope to see you out and about before we head back into session. I want to hear what matters to you, so that when I am in there, giving speeches, debating, and voting on laws that I can be as effective as possible as your MLA.

SMOKE ALARMS CHECKLIST

- 1. Have you installed smoke alarms on every level of your home and near every sleeping area?
- 2. Are smoke alarms located well away from the path of steam from bathrooms and cooking vapors from the kitchen, which can result in false or nuisance alarms?
- 3. Are smoke alarms mounted high on walls or ceilings away from

- windows, doors and ducts where drafts won't interfere with their operation?
- 4. Have you considered installing hard-wired, interconnected smoke alarms with battery back-up so that if one alarm operates, they all signal together?
- 5. Do you replace your smoke alarms when they are 10 years or older?

- 6. Do you test your smoke alarms once a month to make sure they are working, and replace the batteries every year?
- 7. Have you pushed the "test button" on smoke alarms to ensure everyone will recognize the sound of the alarm?

Follow these 9 tips to help protect yourself, your family and your property against fire hazards.

- Install a fire alarm in every sleeping area and on every level of your home, and be sure to test alarms every month. Working smoke alarms reduce the risk of death in a home fire in half.
- 2. Check the manufacture date on the back of your home's smoke alarms. Smoke alarms should be replaced at least every 10 years! Batteries should be replaced every year.
- 3. Never leave burning candles unattended, and always keep matches and lighters out of reach from children.
- Make a fire action plan, so every member of your household knows how to escape and where to meet outdoors.
- 5. Over half of home heating fire deaths are caused by equipment being placed too close to things that can burn. Make sure furniture, clothing, mattresses and bedding are at least three feet from heating sources.
- 6. Always turn off space heaters when you leave the room or go to sleep. Space heaters are the cause of about 79 percent of fatal home heating fires.
- Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food.
 Turn off the stove whenever you leave the kitchen, and never leave home while food is cooking.
- 8. Inspect electrical cords regularly, and replace cords that are cracked or damaged or have broken plugs or loose connections.
- 9. In the event of a fire, crawl to safety. Use the back of your hand to see if a door is hot before opening it. If it feels hot, try to use another exit.
