JOINT STATEMENT FROM ASSEMBLY OF FIRST NATIONS (AFN) NATIONAL CHIEF CINDY WOODHOUSE AND ALBERTA PREMIER DANIELLE SMITH ON FIRST NATIONS POLICING

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Today, Assembly of First Nations (AFN) National Chief Cindy Woodhouse and Alberta Premier Danielle Smith are united in our commitment to establish First Nations policing as an essential service in First Nations communities.

We call on the federal government to move forward on their commitment to implement amendments to the First Nations and Inuit Policing Program that would commit sustainable and predictable funding for First Nations-led law enforcement.

First Nations and the Government of Alberta have long advocated for police services that reflect community values, cultures, and needs. To achieve this, it is essential that First Nations have clear jurisdiction and authority over their own policing frameworks, underpinned by equitable funding from both federal and provincial governments. Such funding must be sustainable and sufficient, ensuring that First Nations-led police services have the resources they need to deliver a high standard of community policing.

This year, Alberta has allocated over \$22.5 million to support policing in First Nation communities, including \$12.2 million for three self-administered First Nation police services. Additionally, the Indigenous and Municipal Police Transition Study Grant has been provided to several Indigenous communities to explore policing options that best meet their unique needs, including the establishment of their self-administered police services. Alberta is currently working with Siksika First Nation and Enoch First Nation to develop their own First Nations police services.

Alberta's government con-

tinues to empower local communities to explore or deliver Indigenous-led policing. This year, Alberta has provided over \$22.5 million in funding to support policing for First Nation communities, including \$12.2 million for three First nation self-administered police services. The Indigenous and Municipal Police Transition Study Grant has also been provided to a number of Indigenous communities to explore policing options that will best meet their unique needs, including establishing their own self-administered police services. Alberta is currently working with Siksika First Nation and Enoch First Nation to create their own Indigenous police services.

The recent deaths of First Nations individuals during interactions with police highlight the urgent need to address capacity gaps in policing and justice systems. Reforms must address specific needs in governance, recruitment, and culturally-informed training. The necessity for these changes has been emphasized in the Auditor General of Canada's reports, the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls Final Report and its Calls for Justice, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action, and other inquests and inquiries that underline the demand for Indigenous-led policing.

We call on all levels of gov-

ernment to commit to equitable funding and legislative support, ensuring First Nations have the jurisdiction and autonomy to oversee their own police services. Together, we are committed to working with leaders across Canada to establish Indigenous-led police services that promote equity, justice, and improved community safety.


Alberta's government is working with the Town of Coaldale and other interested municipalities across the province to pilot the use of golf carts on select municipal roads.

"Transportation not stand still, and Alberta must be ready with forward-thinking ideas on how to test new transportation-related solutions or activities. Off-highway vehicles (OHVs) and e-bikes have been popular with Albertans for years, and pilot projects like this one hold the key to unlocking new modes of transportation for everyone."

Coaldale is one of the first towns to pilot the limited use of golf carts, after the Legislature passed legislation that makes innovative projects like this possible, and the town's pilot will last five years.

Pilot projects like this allow new and innovative uses of existing or new modes of transportation and expands on municipalities already having the ability to allow registered off-highway vehicles to operate on their roads.

"We think it's great that Alberta Municipalities' advocacy on golf carts has paid off. Many communities have been asking for this for a few years and I'm happy that Coaldale is able to pilot this initiative for the province."

STANDING UP FOR ALBERTA'S LIVESTOCK INDUSTRY

Proposed federal legislation would damage Alberta's livestock industry, potentially placing arbitrary restrictions on producers, processors and consumers in a pandemic.

The federal government's Bill C-293, An Act respecting pandemic prevention and preparedness, is currently moving through the Senate, despite the risks it brings to the agriculture and food industry. Alberta's government is stand-

ing with industry members against this highly intrusive legislation that unfairly singles out the agriculture and food industry and encroaches on Section 95 of the Constitution, which sets agriculture within the exclusive jurisdiction of the province.

Under the proposed legislation, public health officials would have the authority during a pandemic to close facilities they consider "high risk," such as livestock operations and meat processing plants, and even "mandate" the consump-


tion of vegetable proteins by Canadians. Not only would this threaten global food security and the role Alberta and Canada play in feeding the world, but it would also open the door for the federal government to tell Canadians what they can eat.

"Farming is woven into the fabric of our national identity, with modern livestock agriculture playing a vital role. Bill C-293, however, goes so far as to pick winners and losers within the agriculture sector, with potentially wide-reaching, catastrophically damaging regulations and restriction of commercial freedoms for agricultural producers and processors."

The proposed legislation also introduces several public health mitigation strategies that may not align with local health data and do not adequately reflect specific regional needs. Provinces and territories have exclusive jurisdiction over the



RIDE SHARING TAKES TO TWO WHEELS

Many people who pine for the thrill of the open road feel that nothing beats traversing scenic roadways while riding a motorcycle. The wind in your hair and the vibration of the powerful engine can make for an unforgettable experience.

But not every person has the time and resources to devote to owning and maintaining a motorcycle. For people who want the thrills of motorcycles without the work that comes with them, some new services that cater to part-time adventurers may be just the thing they need

Peer-to-peer rental has in-

filtrated marketplaces for everything from cars to condos to beach houses . and now motorcycles. Companies like Riders Share and Twisted Road enable willing motorcycle owners to rent out their rides to interested parties who want to ride but can't afford to do it all the time.

Interested motorcycle owners list their bikes for rental, entering photos, descriptions and other basic information. Riders search listings based on location, price or bike manufacturer. The rider will need to have a valid motorcycle rider's license and insurance - which is verified by the bike share site - in

order to rent. The company may have additional insurance protection plans for purchase. Bike owners maintain the right to approve or deny renters.

Depending on the service, owners and riders choose pick-up locations and arrange meet-and-greets to go over the specifics of the rental and to exchange the keys.

When the rental period is over, the rider returns the bike to the approved location and the owner inspects the returned bike. Payment may occur before or after the rental period is over, depending on how the rental company works.

According to Riders Share, the average motorcycle travels less than 3,000 miles per year, compared to an average of 12,000 miles for cars. In addition, there are about 30 million licensed riders but just nine million motorcycles in the United States. Such statistics indicate that the potential for motorcycle sharing services is vast if owners and riders can connect.

Motorcycle sharing services are the next wave of peer-to-peer rentals, making it possible for those who don't own their own bikes to enjoy the unique thrill of riding a motorcycle.

planning, organization and management of their health care systems, including response to public health emergencies, and the federal bill would once again enable the federal government to overreach their constitutional jurisdiction.

"Local governing bodies are in the best position to create emergency preparedness plans that suit the unique needs of their province and territory. The federal government should be engaging meaningfully with each jurisdiction on any Pandemic Prevention and Preparedness Plan related to Bill C-293 before being implemented."

One of the bill's most alarming aspects is the discretionary power it would grant to officials to shut down agricultural facilities without clear, objective criteria. Such uninformed actions could disrupt not only meat supply chains, but also the wider agricultural operations linked to them, including feed production. This threatens to destabilize related sectors and could trigger cascading effects throughout the entire food system.

bill Additionally, the seeks to regulate and possibly phase out certain farming practices considered high-risk for pandemic propagation. This could abruptly alter farm and ranch operations, significantly affect producers and processors livelihoods, and negatively impact our economic stability.

Key Canadian agricultural organizations representing the province's agriculture sectors are echoing Alberta's concerns about this bill.

"Our Alberta family farms are committed to producing safe, high-quality chicken while maintaining the highest standards of biosecurity. We support pandemic preparedness, but Bill C-293 unfairly targets animal agriculture and could threaten the livelihoods of our farm families. We are

asking the federal government to ensure this bill is amended so farmers can continue to feed Canadians without facing unnecessary restrictions."

"Alberta Beef Producers supports the overall objective of pandemic preparedness. However, we are disappointed in the current wording of Bill C-293, as it unfairly singles out animal agriculture, despite the industry's critical role in food security and rural economies. We urge policymakers to amend the bill to reflect a balanced and fair approach that supports emergency preparedness without unfairly targeting a single sector."

The legislation purports to examine pandemic preparedness and apply learnings from COVID-19, but it has dangerously imprecise language that is open to drastic interpretations.

For example, the bill provides for measures to "regulate commercial activities that can help reduce pandemic risk, including industrial animal agriculture." The bill also suggests phasing out "commercial activities that disproportionately contribute to pandemic risk," which puts Alberta's agriculture industry at risk, in addition to others.

Alberta has sent a letter to Alberta senators and the ministers of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada and Health Canada to relay concerns with the bill's content. Minister Sigurdson requested that the bill be amended with more flexible language to avoid unintended consequences.

Canada already has legislation, animal disease surveillance and action plans to ensure farm food safety and biosecurity programs reduce risks associated with zoonotic disease. This new legislation is therefore unnecessary, especially in its current form.



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




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
