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CANADA SUMMER JOBS 2025

The Canada Summer Jobs (CSJ) program is a great resource for non-profits and small businesses seeking to hire students over the spring and summer. Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC) manages this federal wage subsidy program which will soon be open for applications. Importantly, an application's success is based on how well it satisfies the program criteria. Applications that are assessed as meeting the criteria more satisfactorily score more points; applications assessed as meeting the criteria less completely score fewer points. The higher your application scores, the higher it is ranked. The higher it is ranked, the more likely that it will be approved. Your application competes with others to be funded under the constituency's limited CSJ budget.

Members of Parliament have opportunity for input into CSJ. Each year I set local priorities for my constituency. These priorities will be made available on the CSJ 2025 webpage once the program opens. If the job you are seeking to hire for takes in one or more of these local priorities, make sure to indicate that on your application so that you can benefit from the additional points.

MPs can provide further recommendations during an MP review phase that follows ESDC's assessments. I make recommendations at this phase to increase the number of jobs being funded, to ensure the maximum budget allocation for the constituency and to make certain that local priorities are considered. That being said, I limit this input as I am not in the business of picking winners and losers.

If your business is considering applying to CSJ 2025, keep in mind the following important dates. The call for applications will open on November 19, 2024. It will close on December 19, 2024. ESDC will review all

applications from December 20, 2024, to March 4, 2025. MP's will be provided opportunity to make additional recommendations from March 4 to March 14, 2025. This will be followed by the ministerial approval and employer notification phases. Applicants can expect these phases to be completed by mid-April so that they can begin hiring. 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LARGER FINES FOR ILLEGAL SLAUGHTER, UNINSPECTED MEAT

Submitted by Government of Alberta

In response to the increase of illegal slaughter and sale of uninspected meat, Alberta's government is increasing penalties to protect consumers.

The sale of uninspected meat is illegal in Alber-

ta. Illegal slaughter and food safety non-compliance pose a risk to human and animal health and could harm Alberta's entire livestock and meat processing industry. If passed, the Meat Inspection Amendment Act would increase fines from a maximum of

each offence.

Alberta's government is proposing to increase these fines to ensure there is a significant deterrent, so offenders are motivated to comply with the Meat Inspection Act. The proposed changes would support food safety for Albertans without increasing

consumer costs for inspected meat or operating costs for industry. The changes propose increased fines for those who commit an offence under the Meat Inspection Act and would bring Alberta in line with other jurisdictions.


"We are taking action to maintain public confidence in our food system. I strongly encourage all Albertans to buy their meat from licensed operators and retailers, and while buying meat, ask your retailer where the meat comes from and if it's inspected."

addition to creasing fines, amendments would extend the amount of time to investigate and lay charges for the illegal slaughter and sale of uninspected meat. Currently, the act allows inspectors one year after the offence to investigate allegations of illegal slaughter or sale of uninspected meat. If passed, the investigation timeframe for a complex case would be extended to two years from the date the offence came to the attention of an inspector.

"Food safety is something that most Albertans take for granted because Alberta has some of the best people in our province and country looking out for our health. Both the federal and

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



offered in touring and passenger types. Touring will provide lower road noise and better handing, while passenger varieties offer a smooth ride and longevity.

Summer Tires

Summer tires are designed to offer traction and maneuverability in warm weather. Orbital grooves and complex treads maximize traction in hot, humid weather. If you live in an area where the temperature is consistently steamy, summer tires may be a good investment. Winter Tires

A safety precaution for many people who live where conditions often include snow, ice and cold weather, winter tires can be lifesavers. These tires are designed using several different types of rubber, and feature tread designs that maximize traction during inclement conditions. Winter tires also come in various subcategories. Studdable winter tires provide the extra security of added studs to enhance traction on ice. Performance winter tires offer better dry road handling, but traction on snow and ice may be compromised.

ADDRESS WINDSHIELD DAMAGE PROMPTLY

Windshields are designed to protect drivers and their vehicles from wind and other natural elements while the cars are in motion.

Windshields are made from tempered glass, which is processed by controlled thermal or chemical treatments to increase its strength compared to normal glass. While relatively strong for a pieces of glass, windshields are not impervious to damage. All it takes is a single rock or piece of road debris to be kicked up from the roadway and hit the windshield to cause a problem.

Every day, motorists encounter pebbles or other small missiles that bounce up from the road and come in contact with their windshields. Many deflect with no problem, but under high speeds, debris can cause chips, dings, and even cracks in the windshield.

Cracks easily spread

from road vibration and heat and can compromise the integrity of the windshield. If your car's windshield is cracked and it shatters during a collision, you and your passengers are at great risk of injury. In addition, police officers can write tickets if windshields appear to be unsafe. So it's in drivers' best interests to repair damaged windshields promptly.

Drivers may be able to repair small dings themselves with a doit-yourself windshield kit available at automotive retailers. If a crack is less than six to 12 inches long, it can probably be repaired as well. However, more significant damage will require that the entire windshield be replaced.



CUTTING WAIT TIMES FOR WATER PERMITS

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta has reduced wait times for Water Act licences by 57 per cent to help businesses, landowners and communities manage water and grow the economy.

Water is a precious resource and must be managed to meet the province's many growing needs. In recent years, many Albertans have expressed frustration about unnecessarily long delays in getting regulatory approvals and decisions under the Water Act. These wait times delay projects, reduce economic development and limit water users' ability to adapt to changing conditions on the ground.

Alberta's government has worked to cut the red tape, bureaucratic delays and outdated processes that slow down good work. As a result of that work, timelines for Water Act licences approvals have now declined by 57 per cent over the past four years, including a 25 per cent improvement since June 2023, and this government is just getting started.

"As environment minister, I've made improving our regulatory process a priority. We can protect the environment and make timely decisions at the same time. We are seeing real improvements that help

communities grow and businesses succeed, but this is just the start. We are going to keep finding ways to increase transparency, and speed up and improve all of our regulatory processes."

Reducing wait times by weeks and months

Since 2021, the average wait time for licences under the Water Act has fallen by 57 per cent. On average, approvals are now being delivered 253 days sooner.

At the same time, the average wait time for approvals under the Water Act has fallen by 31 per cent. On average, approvals are now being delivered 70 days sooner.

The backlog of Water Act applications that are open longer than six months has now declined by 68 per cent, helping industry, businesses and communities get decisions faster and keep projects moving.

Establishing targets and improving processes

In addition to reducing licence wait times, for the first time, Alberta Environment and Protected Areas has established mandatory service targets to speed up reviews and stop unnecessary delays.

Water Act decisions must now be made within a specific time frame, unless extenuating circumstances arise. Staff are now required to assess each application and make a decision based on its deemed risk:

- Low-risk decisions must be made within 60 days.
- Medium-risk decisions must be made within 90 days.
- High-risk decisions must be made within 120 days.

These targets include the time required for public consultation, where necessary. The department will work to continue lowering these targets in the future, where possible.

Other changes have also helped speed up the system. Previously, users would also have to submit information by paper or email. Now, a new digital system is in place that makes it quicker and easier to submit and review applications. The department also streamlined its internal processes, updated the guidelines on the 10 per cent holdback and fast-tracked applications related to drought this summer.

Just getting started

Progress is being made, but there is more work to do. Moving forward, Alberta Environment and Protected Areas will focus on speeding up Water Act decisions that have not yet seen as much improvement, including complex or high-risk requests such as wetlands.

The government has also instructed the department to find ways to similarly streamline regulatory decisions under the Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act, while looking at other ways to speed up all of Alberta's regulatory processes.
