

## PARKLAND RCMP RESPOND TO SERIOUS MOTOR VEHICLE COLLISION CONCLUSION

On Nov. 5, 2024, at 2:12 p.m., Parkland RCMP received a report of a serious collision on Highway 627 and Range Road 273. Upon arrival, emergency responders tended to multiple patients and STARS was contacted. The driver of an SUV, an 18-year-old female resident of Devon, was deceased on scene. The passenger of the SUV was taken by STARS to hospital where they remain in critical condition. The lone occupant of the other vehicle, a school bus, was taken to hospital with non serious injuries. Parkland RCMP are now clear of the collision.

Police remained on scene for several hours investigating the collision. Investigation has revealed that the SUV was Southbound on Range Road 273 and crossing Highway 627 when it was struck by the school bus travelling East on Highway 627.

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### JOINT STATEMENT FROM ASSEMBLY OF FIRST NATIONS (AFN) NATIONAL CHIEF **CINDY WOODHOUSE AND ALBERTA PREMIER** DANIELLE SMITH ON FIRST NATIONS POLICING

Today, Assembly of First Nations (AFN) National Chief Cindy Woodhouse and Alberta Premier Danielle Smith are united in our commitment to establish First Nations policing as an essential service in First Nations communities.

We call on the federal gov-ernment to move forward on their commitment to implement amendments to the First Nations and Inuit Policing Program that would commit sustainable and predictable funding for First Nations-led law enforcement.
First Nations and the Govern-

ment of Alberta have long advo-cated for police services that reflect community values, cultures, and needs. To achieve this, it is essential that First Nations have clear jurisdiction and authority over their own policing frameworks, underpinned by equitable funding from both federal and provincial governments. Such funding must be sustainable and sufficient, ensuring that First Nations-led police services have the resources they need to deliver a high standard of community policing.

This year, Alberta has allocated over \$22.5 million to support policing in First Nation communities, including \$12.2 million for three self-administered First Nation police services. Additionally, the Indigenous and Municipal Police Transition Study Grant has been provided to several Indigenous communities to explore policing options that best meet their unique needs, includ-ing the establishment of their self-administered police services. Alberta is currently working with Siksika First Nation and Enoch First Nation to develop their own First Nations police services.

Alberta's government continues to empower local communities to explore or deliver Indigenous-led policing. This year, Alberta has provided over \$22.5 million in funding to support policing for First Nation communities, including \$12.2 million for three First nation self-administered police services. The Indigenous and Municipal Police Transition Study Grant has also been provided to a number of Indigenous communities to explore policing options that will best meet their unique needs, including establishing their own self-administered police services. Alberta is currently working with Siksika First Nation and Enoch First Nation to create their own Indigenous police services.

The recent deaths of First Nations individuals during inter-actions with police highlight the urgent need to address capacity gaps in policing and justice systems. Reforms must address specific needs in governance, recruitment, and culturally-informed training. The necessity for these changes has been emphasized in the Auditor General of Canada's reports, the National Inquiry into Missing and Mur-

dered Indigenous Women and Girls Final Report and its Calls for Justice, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action, and other inquests and inquiries that underline the demand for Indigenous-led po-

We call on all levels of government to commit to equitable funding and legislative support, ensuring First Nations have the jurisdiction and autonomy to oversee their own police services. Together, we are committed to working with leaders across Canada to establish Indigenous-led police services that promote equity, justice, and improved community safety.

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# LARGER FINES FOR ILLEGAL SLAUGHTER, UNINSPECTED MEAT

In response to the increase of illegal slaughter and sale of uninspected meat, Alberta's government is increasing penalties to protect consumers.

The sale of uninspected meat is illegal in Alberta. Illegal slaughter and food safety non-compliance pose a risk to human and animal health and could harm Alberta's entire livestock and meat processing industry. If passed, the Meat Inspection Amendment Act would increase fines from a maximum of \$10,000 to \$100,000 for each offence.

Alberta's government is proposing to increase these fines to ensure there is a significant deterrent, so offenders are motivated to comply with the Meat Inspection Act. The proposed changes would support food safety for Albertans without increasing consumer costs for inspected meat or operating costs for industry. The changes propose increased fines for those who commit an offence under the Meat Inspection Act and would bring Alberta in line with other jurisdictions.

"We are taking action to maintain public confidence in our food system. I strongly encourage all Albertans to buy their meat from licensed operators and retailers, and while buying meat, ask your retailer where the meat comes from and if it's inspected."

In addition to increasing fines, amendments would extend the amount of time to investigate and lay charges for the illegal slaughter and sale of uninspected meat. Currently, the act allows inspectors one year after the offence to investigate allegations of illegal slaughter or sale of uninspected meat. If passed, the inves-

tigation timeframe for a complex case would be extended to two years from the date the offence came to the attention of an inspector.

"Food safety is something that most Albertans take for granted because Alberta has some of the best people in our province and country looking out for our health. Both the federal and provincial regulatory bodies truly have the best interests of all Albertans in mind when they go out each day to do their jobs. That is the reason why changes are needed and made, to improve overall food safety and strengthen our provincial acts and regulations, to protect the health and safety of all Albertans."

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# NEW SHERIFFS UNIT TO ENHANCE PUBLIC SAFETY

A new team of Alberta Sheriffs will work alongside police to keep crime out of central Alberta communities by targeting problem properties.

Since 2023, Alberta's government has invested more than \$27 million to help fight crime throughout the province. Building on these efforts, the government is now expanding the Alberta Sheriffs' Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods (SCAN) unit with the creation of a new team of investigators in Red Deer. The creation of the Red Deer SCAN team is the latest in a series of measures aimed at enhancing public safety and increasing the Alberta Sheriffs' ability to support police throughout the province.

The move puts more resources on the ground with a team of qualified experts who will investigate properties where illegal activity has been reported and shut them down through court orders when needed. The Red Deer SCAN team - made up of four Alberta Sheriffs - joins existing SCAN teams in Calgary, Edmonton, and Lethbridge, which have proven immensely effective working alongside local police to shutter problem properties throughout the province.

"Alberta's government will always maintain a zero-tolerance stance toward crime of any kind, and the expansion of the Alberta Sheriffs' SCAN unit reflects that. With the creation of a new SCAN team in Red Deer, we're expanding the unit's coverage even further and putting more boots on the ground where they're needed. Let this be a message to all criminals: vou are not welcome here. Communities in the Red Deer area have a right not to be plagued by drug and other criminal activity that create dangerous environments, and Alberta's government will do whatever it takes to keep people safe."

The Sheriffs' SCAN unit operates under the Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods Act, which uses legal sanctions and court orders to hold owners accountable for illegal activity happening on their property, such as drug trafficking, human trafficking and child exploitation. SCAN augments and supports local police to both investigate and close properties where evidence of criminal activity has been confirmed.

"Ensuring safety for law-abiding Albertans is of utmost importance for Alberta's government and requires a comprehensive approach to effectively combat and prevent criminal activity. This involves enhancing law-enforcement resources, fostering community engagement, implementing crime prevention programs, promoting collaboration between Alberta Sheriffs and local police. This SCAN team is a game-changer in central Alberta and puts criminals on notice that they are not welcome here."

"The Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods Act holds property owners accountable for activities on their property that threaten public safety. Alberta's SCAN teams support policing efforts by addressing illegal activities on these properties. This additional team will enhance RCMP community safety programs."

When community а member reports a problem property to SCAN, the unit begins an investigation. Once the investigation confirms the activity, investigators contact the property owner to try and resolve the issue informally. If informal efforts are unsuccessful, SCAN can apply to the courts for a community safety order to impose restrictions and conditions on the property and its owner, which could include closing the property for up to 90 days. Any criminal activity uncovered when dealing with these properties is turned over to the police to investigate.

"Over the years, SCAN's impact on community safety has been profound. More often than not, we see individuals in these problem properties carrying out drug operations and other criminal activities beside homes, schools, playgrounds and other places where Albertans' safety should never be in

question. Crime has no place in any Alberta neighbourhood, and we look forward to working with our policing partners in the Red Deer area to help keep central Alberta communities safe."



SCAN continues to see tremendous success, having closed problem properties in Lethbridge, Calgary, Spruce Grove and Medicine Hat in the last six months alone. Since May 2024, Alberta's government has publicly announced the closure of seven problem properties by SCAN, including three in Calgary, two in Lethbridge, and one each in Spruce Grove and Medicine Hat.

"Creating a safer environment for our citizens improves the overall quality of our community in Red Deer. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Alberta's government, SCAN and all our law enforcement partners who work tirelessly every day to keep our communities safe. 

safety of drivers and their passengers.

Why replace bulbs two at a time?

Though replacing both headlight bulbs when only one is dimming may seem unwarranted, maintaining a consistent light output from both headlights makes the road safer for drivers, their passengers and oncoming motorists. When only one bulb is replaced, the result-

ing light output can both unbalanced be unpredictable. providing inadequate lighting that can compromise driver visibility. In addition, when one bulb burns out or starts dimming, the other bulb will likely follow, forcing drivers to deal with the expense and inconvenience of getting it replaced all over again.

How else can drivers improve visibility?

mprove visibility? In addition to properly maintaining their headlights, drivers can take the following proactive measures to make nighttime driving safer.

- · Replace worn out wiper blades each season or in threemonth intervals to ensure adequate visibility during rain or snow.
- Clean interior glass and mirrors to remove any film-like buildup that reduces vision and creates hazy reflections from the

sun. This is especially important for smokers who smoke while driving.

Don't hang accessories on rearview mirrors. This includes fuzzy dice, photos and other items that can be distracting and block your vision.







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# ACCOUNTABILITY FOR OTTAWA'S CARBON TAX DOUBLE STANDARD

Alberta's government has filed an application at the federal court challenging the constitutionality and legality of Canada's heating oil carbon tax exemption.

Alberta's government is standing up against

the federal government's carbon tax exemption for heating oil to protect Albertans from the double standard Ottawa has created with the carbon tax, which means Albertans continue to pay carbon taxes to stay warm in winter.

Last fall, after years of insisting that the carbon

tax is applied equally across Canada, the federal government exempted the carbon tax for heating oils, which are used predominantly in Atlantic Canada and Quebec. Over the last year, the federal government has refused multiple requests to grant a similar carve-out on

other heating methods from Alberta and others across the country who are also facing rising costs of living.

Alberta's government will now take this fight to the courts. Alberta filed an application seeking judicial review of the exemption with the Federal Court on Oct. 29, asking the court to declare that the exemption is both unconstitutional and unlawful. The application argues that Ottawa's carbon tax exemption for heating oil is unconstitutional and inconsistent with the Government of Canada's stated purpose for enacting the Greenhouse Gas Pollution Pricing Act.

"Last year, Ottawa decided Canadians in the East deserved a threeyear break from paying the carbon tax on their heating costs. home While we're happy for these Canadians, Alberta, Saskatchewan and other provinces who heat their homes with natural gas have been deliberately excluded from these savings. Albertans simply cannot stand by for another winter while the federal government picks and chooses who their carbon tax applies to. Since they won't play fair, we're going to take the federal government back to court."

previously found the Greenhouse Gas Pollution Pricing Act was constitutional, it found that Canada's jurisdiction to regulate greenhouse gas emissions was limited to the ability to create minimum national standards for carbon pricing for the purpose of reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

Alberta strongly oppos-

es the federal carbon tax exemption on heating oil, as the federal government is no longer creating minimum national standards that apply evenly across the country, and is instead creating a regime that favours one region and fuel type over others.

"This exemption is not only unfair to the vast majority of Canadians, but it is also unlawful as the federal government does not have the authority to make special exemptions for certain parts of the country under the Greenhouse Gas Pollution Pricing Act. The federal government isn't even following its own laws now. Someone needs to hold them accountable, and Alberta is stepping up to do just that."

By 2030, it will cost Canadians \$25 billion every year, in addition to lowering the gross domestic product (GDP) by \$9 billion. In addition, the Bank of Canada has estimated that the federal carbon tax increases inflation by 0.15 per cent year over year.

Expanding community health supports

To provide more integrated care, Alberta's government is investing \$30 million over two years to expand services at four community health centres: The Alex Community Health Centre, CUPS Calgary Society, the Jasper Place Wellness Centre, and Radius Community Health & Healing.

These funds will support a wide range of expanded services, including primary health care for Indigenous and marginalized groups, mental health services, a walk-in clinic, outreach services and team-based care. The centres will also expand support services such as housing navigation, recovery support and food access programs.

The Rural Team Recruitment Grant and the Municipality Supported Clinics Grant will each provide \$6 million over two years.

The Rural Team Recruitment Grant will support community organizations and clinics in hiring additional non-physician team members to increase capacity and improve access within their clinics. In addition, the Municipality Supported Clinics Grant will assist rural municipalities or regions in enhancing teambased care, allowing them to take over ownership or support the operations of existing primary care clinics within their communities.
