EXPANDING ACCESS TO FAMILY JUSTICE

Alberta's government is launching a public survey to gather feedback from Albertans on how to improve family justice services.

Alberta's government is committed to supporting Alberta families, improving access to justice and investing in the family justice system. This includes expanding services that help Albertans resolve their family law issues in a manner that promotes family well-being while reducing pressure

on the courts. An online survey is open until Dec. 20 for Albertans to share their views and experiences on how family justice services could better support their needs.

"Accessing family justice services can be challenging during difficult times, which is why it's so important to have a streamlined and consistent process. Alberta's government is committed to improving the family justice system, and we want to hear directly from Albertans about what's working and what needs improvement. If you've used family justice

services, we encourage you to share your feedback by taking this survey."

Family justice services include services like mediation and family court counsellors as a first step to seeking a divorce or resolving spousal support, parenting or child support issues. "Family justice services, such as mediation, play a vital role in helping families resolve conflicts and find better solutions collaboratively. Mediation fosters constructive communication and reduces conflict, making it an essential resource for families navigating challenging situations. Hearing directly from those who use these services is critical for driving meaningful improvements. I encourage all Albertans to share their insights by participating in the survey."

"The perspectives of Albertans on their experiences within the family justice system are incredibly important. Just as resolving family conflict necessitates dialogue and col-

laboration, the family justice system operates as a partner-ship among the government, family justice service providers, and the families who use the services. We commend the government's efforts to engage with both service providers and families and we hope as many Albertans as possible will make their voices heard."

Recent investments in family justice include a \$5-million investment in Budget 2023 to expand pre-court services in Edmonton and Calgary. This focus on pre-court services, called the Family Justice Strategy, will be expanded to Red Deer in early 2025, following an additional \$3-million investment in Budget 2024.

In addition to these invest-

ments, Alberta's government launched the Alberta Family Resolution Hub in December 2023. This is an online tool available across the province to help Albertans explore their options and next steps for addressing a family law matter.

Alberta's government held roundtable discussions in October with a diverse group of legal, clinical, academic and community experts to gather their input on the Family Justice Strategy. Together, the public survey and roundtable discussions will help government gain a better understanding of how the family justice system is working, evaluate the success of the Family Justice Strategy in Edmonton and Calgary so far and plan for the implementation of the strategy in Red Deer in early 2025.

REVIEWING ASSISTED SUICIDE POLICIES IN ALBERTA

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government is launching a public engagement to gather input about legislation and policies around assisted suicide, also referred to as medical assistance in dying (MAID).

Medical assistance in dying is a process that allows an eligible person to receive assistance from a medical practitioner in ending their life. To be found eligible, a person must be suffering from a serious and permanent medical condition.

Alberta's government is reviewing how MAID is regulated to ensure there is a consistent process as well as oversight that protects vulnerable Albertans, specifically those living with disabilities or suffering from mental health challenges. An online survey is now open for Albertans to share their views and experiences with MAID until Dec. 20.

"We recognize that medical assistance in dying is a very complex and often personal issue and is an important, sensitive and emotional matter for patients and their families. It is important to ensure this process has the necessary supports to protect the most vulnerable. I encourage Albertans who have experience with and opinions on MAID to take this survey."

Mickey Amery, Minister of Justice and Attorney General In addition to the online survey, Alberta's government will also be engaging directly with academics, medical associations, public bodies, religious organizations, regulatory bodies, advocacy groups and others that have an interest in and/or working relationship to the MAID process, health care, disabilities and mental health care.

Feedback gathered through this process will help inform the Alberta government's planning and policy decision making, including potential legislative changes regarding MAID in Alberta.

"Our government has been clear that we do not support the provision of medically assisted suicide for vulnerable Albertans facing mental illness as their primary purpose for seeking their own death. Instead, our goal is to build a continuum of care where vulnerable Albertans can live in long-term health and fulfilment. We look forward to the feedback of Albertans as we proceed with this important issue."

"As MAID is a federally legislated and regulated program that touches the lives of many Albertans, our priority is to ensure we have robust safeguards to protect vulnerable individuals. Albertans' insights will be essential in developing thoughtful policies on this complex issue."

The federal Criminal Code sets out the MAID eligibility criteria, procedural safeguards and reporting obligations. The federal government has paused MAID eligibility for individuals with a mental illness as their sole underlying medical condition until March 2027 to ensure the provincial health care systems have processes and supports in place. Alberta's government does not support expanding MAID eligibility to include those facing depression or mental illness and continues to call on the federal government to end this policy altogether.

On November 12, Shane Getson, MLA for Lac Ste. Anne- Parkland and parliamentary secretary for Economic Corridor Development, travelled to Anchorage, Alaska to attend the PNWER Economic Leadership Forum to discuss Alberta's economic trade corridors and supply chains with United States officials.

This trip helped strengthen relationships from previous meetings in Whistler, British Columbia in July when Getson, de Jonge, and Petrovic attended the 33rd PNWER Annual Summit with more than 600 officials from the U.S. and Canada.

The three United Conservative MLAs also participated in the Resource Development Council's 45th

Annual Alaska Resources Conference from Nov. 13 to 14 that showcased the importance of economic ties between Canada and the United States and discussed ways to reduce emissions while advocating for responsible energy.

BETTER, FASTER, MORE AFFORDABLE AUTO INSURANCE

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government is introducing a new auto insurance system that will provide better and faster services to Albertans while reducing auto insurance premiums.

After hearing from more than 16,000 Albertans through an online survey about their priorities for auto insurance policies, Alberta's government is introducing a new privately delivered, care-focused auto insurance system.

Right now, insurance in the province is not affordable or care focused. Despite high premiums, Albertans injured in collisions do not get the timely medical care and income support they need in a system that is complex to navigate. When fully implemented, Alberta's new auto insurance system will deliver better and faster care for those involved in collisions, and Albertans will see cost savings up to \$400 per year.

"Albertans have been clear they need an auto insurance system that provides better, faster care and is more affordable. When it's implemented, our new privately delivered, care-centred insurance system will put the focus on Albertans' recovery, providing more effective support and will deliver lower rates."

Albertans who suffer injuries due to a collision currently wait months for a simple claim to be resolved and can wait years for claims related to more serious and life-changing injuries to addressed. Additionally, the medical and financial benefits they receive often expire before they're fully recovered.

Under the new system. Albertans who suffer catastrophic injuries will receive treatment and care for the rest of their lives. Those who sustain serious injuries will receive treatment until they are fully recovered. These changes mirror and build upon the Saskatchewan insurance model, where at-fault drivers can be sued for pain and suffering damages if they are convicted of a criminal offence, such as impaired driving or dangerous driving, or conviction of certain offenses

under the Traffic Safety Act.

Work on this new auto insurance system will require legislation in the spring of 2025. In order to reconfigure auto insurance policies for 3.4 million Albertans, auto insurance companies need time to create and implement the new system. Alberta's government expects the new system to be fully implemented by January 2027.

In the interim, starting in January 2025, the good driver rate cap will be adjusted to a 7.5% increase due to high legal costs, increasing vehicle damage repair costs and natural disaster costs. This protects good drivers from significant rate increases while ensuring that auto insurance providers remain financially viable in Alberta.

Albertans have been clear that they still want premiums to be based on risk. Bad drivers will continue to pay higher premiums than good drivers.

By providing significantly enhanced medical, rehabilitation and income support benefits, this system supports Albertans injured in collisions while reducing the impact of litigation costs on the amount that Albertans pay for their insurance.

"Keeping more money in

Albertans' pockets is one of the best ways to address the rising cost of living. This shift to a care-first automobile insurance system will do just that by helping lower premiums for people across the province."

CNA in the hair lets us identify bears and understand how the population in the area is changing. We also extract hormones for indications of the bear's health and reproductive status.

The scent lunes contain no food reward, so after investigating the eite, beers move on and generally do not return once the fure is removed. The scents travel a few hundred meters at most, only drawing bears that are already nearby.

A site can yield hair samples from just 1 or 2 grizzly bears over the entire summer. While many sites don't yield any grizzly bear hair, this is also important information.

NEW CAMPAIGN PROMOTES ALBERTA'S SKILLED TRADES

Alberta's government is launching a new campaign to highlight the important role of apprenticeship education and skilled trades in the province to encourage more students to begin in-demand careers

From homes to highways, skilled tradespeople build Alberta's landscape and play a pivotal role in upholding and advancing industry standards. They are highly valued individuals that go on to become leaders, innovators, business owners and educators in various industries

Alberta's government is launching an advertising campaign and website to champion apprenticeship education and emphasize the value skilled tradespeople bring to our province. Apprenticeship education is post-secondary education and any effort an individual takes to build skills, whether through an apprenticeship or a university education, will set them up for economic success and career satisfaction.

"With the world around us consistently changing, Alberta's government is committed to helping our post-secondary students get the skills they need to succeed in the economy of tomorrow. By championing apprenticeship education and careers in the skilled trades, we can inspire future apprentices and attract more skilled tradespeople to our province."

In 2024-25, Alberta is investing more than \$117 million in apprenticeship programming. This

includes \$78 million for seats in apprenticeship programs in 11 post-secondary institutions around the province, an increase of \$24 million over last year.

When considering apprenticeship education, students are considering a high-impact, low-cost investment in their future with a wide range of opportunities to contribute to Alberta's growing economy. From carpentry to hair styling, Alberta currently offers 47 different apprenticeship programs to choose from.

Alberta's government is committed to ensuring all underrepresented groups, such as women, newcomers and people with disabilities have the opportunity to pursue a career in the skilled trades.

Promoting skilled trades and apprenticeships

Alberta's commitment to advancing apprenticeship education and the skilled trades has been supported by investments in institutions such as the NAIT Advanced Skills Centre and the Apprenticeship Learning Grant, and partnerships like BLUprint (TELUS Spark Science Centre) and Crane and Hoisting Equipment Operator training (International Union of Operating Engineers).

Alberta is committed to reaching students in various ways, including physical outreach opportunities. This summer, Apprenticeship and Industry Training (AIT) hosted information booths at two of Alberta's most popular summertime events: the Calgary Stampede and K-days. Advanced Education will also be visiting high schools in the fall to reach potential apprentices and ensure information is available for those hoping to learn

more about apprenticeship opportunities.

Alberta is amplifying the voices of young adults in the skilled trades through the Skilled Trades Youth Ambassador advisory council and the Youth Skills Network, and has also partnered with Ontario's Ministry of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skill Development, signing a memorandum of understanding to define a framework for

international credential recognition and post-journeyperson certification.

By making targeted investments that increase apprenticeship seats and programs in high-demand sectors, Alberta's government is connecting students to fulfilling career paths that are key to boosting the province's economy.
