The male was caught attempting to steal another vehicle by the owner, who was subsequently threatened with the use of a knife. Due to assistance from the general public, the outstanding stolen Dodge Dakota was located and a male was taken into custody.

PARKLAND RCMP CHARGE MALE AFTER A BREAK AND ENTER AND ARSON

Investigation by the Parkland RCMP Detachment have resulted in a male being charged with break and enter, arson and mischief related offences.

On Dec. 3, 2024, at approximately 4:00 A.M., a male suspect contacted the Parkland RCMP Detachment and advised police that he had broken into a store and was bleeding. Patrols of Spruce Grove and Stony Plain led to the police locating the male in the Sobey's in Spruce Grove. The male was located next to a series of boxes that were actively on fire and suffering from lacerations on his feet from broken glass. Police were able to arrest the male without incident and put out the fire before turning him over to Emergency Medical Services for treatment and transportation to a local hospital. While at the hospital, the male engaged in behaviour that led to further charges being laid.

ALBERTA RCMP MAJOR CRIMES UNIT INVESTIGATE HOMICIDE IN WHITECOURT

On Dec. 7, 2024, at 3:21 p.m., Whitecourt RCMP received a report of a shooting near the Whitecourt Airport. As the report came in, RCMP were given the location of the suspect who was driving on Highway 43. Officers located and stopped the vehicle detaining a suspect and locating a firearm. Upon arrival at the airport, EMS and police located the victim deceased. The victim has been identified as 44-yearold Whitecourt resident David Beauchesne. Whitecourt RCMP contacted the Alberta RCMP Major Crimes Unit who took carriage of the investigation.

As a result of the investigation, RCMP have charged Whitecourt resident, 43-yearold Mathew Charles Jackson with, Second-Degree-Murder.

December 1-7 is National Safe Driving week, and this year focuses on driving under the influence of cannabis. According to MADD Canada, in 2022 nearly a third of Canadians reported using cannabis in the past 30 days, of which 12% of users drove while believing they were impaired.

Last December, Alberta RCMP officers removed 537 drivers from roadways as a result of being impaired. Of those removed, 49 of them were under the influence of drugs or a combination of drugs and alcohol. This December, as part of National Safe Driving Week, we're reminding all Albertans to keep their head out of the clouds. If you have consumed drugs or alcohol, do not get behind the wheel. Find a sober ride home or a safe place to spend the

Alberta night.

Your Alberta RCMP would like to remind everyone, this December, and always:

• Driving while impaired by alcohol or drugs is never okay. Impaired driving is criminal and dangerous.


• Impaired driving is always preventable and can always be avoided. Call a taxi or rideshare service, use a designated driver, or stay the night.

• Party hosts aren't off the hook. If you're guests have been drinking or using drugs, make sure they have a safe place to stay, or a sober ride home.

• Individuals with a Graduated Driver's Licence must abide by the zero-tolerance law (Government of Alberta, 2023).

• Call 911 immediately if you witness or suspect impaired driving.

"Alberta RCMP officers will be focusing on Impaired Driving enforcement this month," says Sgt. Darin Turnbull, Alberta RCMP Traffic. "With all the festivities that December brings, we have planned checkstops all month long and specifically this Saturday, December 7, for National Impaired Driving Enforcement Day. This December, and always, look out for one another. If you suspect an impaired driver, call 911 immediately. You never know whose life you could be saving."

- Motor Vehicle Collisions and Vehicle Fires on Parkland County roads.
- Structure Fires
- Outdoor Fires
- Public Assist
- False Alarms
- Large complex fires and preventable responses increase our costs to operate.

For most scenarios, the costs will be recouped from insurance policies that already cover these incidents. That means we can fund the response without having to pass the costs on to all residents through higher tax rates.

This is a cost recovery system, meaning the County doesn't profit from emergency responses and similar policies are in place in municipalities across Alberta.

Does your insurance policy cover fire department response costs? It's important to check your policy to see if you have appropriate coverage.

Submitted by Government of Alberta's water supply, reduce Alberta

Alberta's government is undertaking a provincewide review of potential sites for dams and other infrastructure to help meet future water needs.

population As Alberta's and economy grow, demand for water from communities and industry increases at the same time. Due to the province's prairie geography and climate, the amount of precipitation received varies a lot from season-to-season and year-to-year. Creating more dams, reservoirs and other infrastructure is one way to potentially help capture and store more water.

Alberta's government has now begun a provincewide study looking at more than 100 locations across the province. This study will be used to help the government plan long-term ways to maximize

the risk of future droughts and floods, and support thriving communities.

"We are making sure that Alberta has the water it needs to support our growing communities and a thriving economy for generations to come. This study will take a hard look at sites across the province to help us identify the most effective places to build future water storage projects."

Rebecca Schulz, Minister of Environment and Protected Areas

Dams, reservoirs and other water storage infrastructure play a vital role in irrigation, drought management, water security, flood protection, and supporting a healthy environment. At the same time, they can be costly to build and affect local ecosystems and environments.

The provincial study will identify, review and assess potential locations where water storage infrastructure could be most effectively developed to help meet the province's longterm water needs. Various sites will be assessed based on new and existing information regarding hydrology, dam design, environmental, social and cultural impacts, and the potential costs, benefits and risks or uncertainties for each site.

"Water is a precious resource and one that is essential for agriculture. Our government is always prepared to help ensure our producers and processors have the water they need to help put food on the tables of Albertans and others around the world. Now, more than ever, we need to do more with the water we have. Identifying potential opportunities for new reservoirs will help continue to grow our province and ensure our agriculture industry has the water it needs."

riculture and Irrigation

The Water Storage Opportunities Study is expected to be completed in 2025. Alberta's government will use the results to help identify the most effective options to improve water storage in a responsible and cost-effective way. Some of the top-ranked sites may be selected to undergo a full feasibility study in the future.

This study is part of the Alberta government's work to modernize the province's water system and make every drop count. Along with this study, the province has feasibility studies in progress for the Ardley reservoir and Eyremore dams, launched the \$125 million Drought and Flood Protection Program, and is currently engaging on potential ways to increase water availability and improve the water management system in Alberta.
