

State of the County

This message is our way of giving folks an update on our happenings throughout the last year and into the year ahead. It's an opportunity to provide context behind important Council decisions, regional matters and events.

Looking back, 2024 has been a year of notable accomplishments and resilience. Rural Alberta continues to flourish, embodying the values of hard work, innovation, and collaboration. Our community has shown tremendous adaptability and momentum, and it is a privilege to celebrate the efforts of our dedicated team and residents.

One of the highlights of this past year has been our focus on local infrastructure improvement. Public works was a major area of investment, and our team has worked tirelessly to preserve and upgrade the services that keep our community functioning efficiently. With the dedication of employees and contractors, we travelled over 218,000 km maintaining local roads, spread 78,000 tonnes of gravel, and completed 100 km of dust suppression. These efforts keep our rural roadways in great condition, providing safe and dependable transportation for both residents, industry, and the travelling public.

Our community continues to expand, and we remain dedicated to directing resources to priority Infrastructure projects. This includes concentrating on crucial transportation routes like Range Road 33 and Range Road 13 just to name a couple. Our plan prioritizes road maintenance while addressing the need for upgrades on busier corridors. In some cases, we work with local gravel companies, whose contributions play an important role in supporting these efforts. We are committed to planning with the long term in mind, preserving sustainability and preparing for future demands.

The County has also benefitted from Alberta's Water for Life program, which provides municipalities with funding for water and wastewater projects through its "90 cent dollar" model. This initiative enables us to access grants covering up to 90% of eligible project costs, easing the financial burden on our community. This funding has allowed us to improve regional water and wastewater systems, optimizing operations and laying a strong foundation for years to come. Programs like these are necessary for rural communities to access reliable and safe water services while accommodating ongoing growth.

Solid waste management remains a cornerstone of our regional services, creating local employment while ensuring environmental responsibility. The County operates eight (8) transfer station sites that residents depend on for waste disposal and recycling. Last year, the County transported approximately 10,000 tonnes of solid waste to the Regional Landfill. This complex operation, governed by provincial regulations, involves substantial hauling expenses and staffing at each site for compliance and efficiency.

Although solid waste utility fees are often misunderstood, they are necessary for funding the systems, personnel, and logistics needed to manage waste effectively. By providing a clearer understanding of the scale of these operations and their costs, we hope residents can appreciate why these fees are in place.

Our social programs also continued to deliver meaningful assistance to individuals and families. This year, we provided income tax preparation services for seniors and low-income residents, home support programs, out-of-school care, preschool initiatives, and library funding. These services remain central to our commitment to meeting the diverse needs of our residents while creating local job opportunities.

As we plan for 2025, we remain focused on balancing community needs with financial sustainability while addressing several key priorities. The Administration Building property insurance claim process is ongoing, requiring time and coordination for a fair resolution. The cold storage fire at the Lisburn yard has impacted operations, but we are committed to a swift recovery and maintaining service continuity. Meanwhile, inflation continues to strain our budget, driving up costs for materials, services, and operations, making prudent financial management more important than ever. To improve efficiency, we are streamlining our fleet by removing underutilized vehicles and optimizing internal structures by aligning our workforce with operational needs.

On behalf of Council, I extend my gratitude to the staff and administration across every department for their dedication and commitment. It is an honour to work alongside individuals who consistently prioritize the needs of the County and its residents.

Looking ahead, we remain focused on building a thriving and adaptable community. The collective efforts of our residents, employees, and partners have made this year a success, and I am confident that we will continue to overcome challenges and embrace new opportunities while preserving fiscal responsibility. Thank you for your trust and support as we look forward to another year of achievement and prosperity.

INTRODUCING \$15 A DAY CHILD CARE FOR FAMILIES

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta is introducing a flat monthly parent fee of \$326.25 for full-time licensed child care, or roughly \$15 a day.

As part of the \$3.8-billion Canada-Alberta Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement, Alberta is supporting families to access affordable child care across the province with their choice in provider.

Starting Apr. 1, parents with children zero to kindergarten age attending full-time licensed daycare facilities and family day home programs across the province will be eligible for a flat parent fee of \$326.25 per month, or roughly \$15 a day. Parents requiring part-time care will pay \$230 per month.

To support these changes and high-quality child care, about 85 per cent of licensed daycare providers will receive a funding increase once the new fee structure is in place on Apr. 1.

Every day, parents and families across Alberta rely on licensed child-care providers to support their children's growth and development while going to work or school. Licensed child-care providers and early childhood educators play a crucial role in helping children build the skills they need to support their growth and overall health. As Alberta's population grows, the need for high-quality, affordable and accessible licensed and regulated child care is increasing

ing.
While Alberta already reduced parent fees to an average of \$15 a day in January 2024, many families are still paying much more depending on where they live, the age of their child and the child-care provider they choose, which has led to inconsistency and confusion. Many families find it difficult to estimate their child-care fees if they move or switch providers, and providers have expressed concerns about the fairness and complexity of the current funding framework.

A flat monthly fee will provide transparency and predictability for families in every part of the province while also improving fairness to providers and increasing overall system efficiency. On behalf of families, Alberta's government will cover about 80 per cent of childcare fees through grants to daycare facilities and family day homes.

This means a family using full-time daycare could save, on average, \$11,000 per child per year. A flat monthly parent fee will ensure child care is affordable for everyone and that providers are compensated for the important services they offer.

As opposed to a flat monthly parent fee, Alberta's government will reimburse preschools up to \$100 per month per child on parents' behalf, up from \$75.

"Albertans deserve affordable child-care options, no matter where they are or which type of care works best for them. We are bringing in flat parent fees for families so they can all access high-quality child care for the same affordable, predictable fee."

To make Alberta's child-care system affordable for all families, the flat monthly parent fee is replacing the Child Care Subsidy Program for children zero to kindergarten age attending child care during regular school hours. The subsidy for children attending out-of-

school care is not changing.

As the province transitions to the new flat parent fee, child-care providers will have flexibility to offer optional services for an additional supplemental parent fee. These optional services must be over and above the services that are provided to all children in individual child-care programs. Clear requirements will be in place for providers to prevent preferential child-care access for families choosing to pay for optional services.

Cutting red tape and supporting child-care providers

By moving to a flat monthly parent fee, Alberta's government is continuing the transition to a primarily publicly funded child care system. To support high-quality child care, approximately 85 per cent of licensed daycare providers will receive a funding increase once the new structure is in place on Apr. 1.

The province is enhancing the system to streamline the child-care claims process used to reimburse licensed child-care providers on behalf of Alberta parents. Alberta's government is also putting technological solutions in place to reduce administrative burden and red tape.

Looking ahead

Over the final year of the federal agreement, Alberta's government is working to support the child-care system while preparing to negotiate the next term of the agreement, reflective of the needs of Albertans and providers. Alberta joins its provincial and territorial partners across the country in calling for a sustainable, adequately funded system that works for parents and providers long term.





WHITECOURT TOWN COUNCIL UPDATE

The 2024 Municipal Enforcement Annual Report has been accepted as information by Whitecourt Town Council.

The report is prepared annually for the Alberta Solicitor General, and outlines activities conducted by Municipal Enforcement Services. Over the course of the year, 2,163 activities were logged by Whitecourt Peace Officers.

Whitecourt awarded \$18,604

Submitted by Town of in funding to community organizations as part of the 2025 Family & Community Support Services Grant Program. The program provides assistance to community groups that plan to provide social programs that are preventative in nature to the community. 2025 recipients include:

> · McLeod River Primary Care Network - \$2,544 to provide workshops with a focus on mental health, physical wellness, and social engage-

• Wellspring Family Resource & Crisis Centre -\$2,200 to update/reprint the Whitecourt Community Resource Guide.

· Community Lunch Box -\$14,500 for volunteer coordination and support.

The Town of Whitecourt has been awarded grant funding for a 29-month term from the United Way, through Health Aging Alberta, to provide non-medical home support for seniors in Whitecourt and area. As many seniors in

Whitecourt are choosing to live independently in their current homes, this will help to increase seniors' capacity to age safely in place and improve the wellbeing of older adults in our community. Services include in-home non-medical supports, including housekeeping, meal preparation, grocery shopping and yard maintenance. This program will complement Whitecourt's Social Prescribing Program that that is already in place that helps to bridge the gap between medical and social care services to seniors in Whitecourt. To access both programs, clients will need a referral from a health care provider. For more information on the programs please contact the FCSS Program Coordinator at 780-778-3637 ext. 417.


November and December Report
