

at a Bitcoin Machine. Once the payment went through the officer would issue a new S.I.N card at the detachment. Suspects contact the victims by a phone number that appears to be legitimate and provide convincing information to enhance the scam including badge numbers and file numbers. Victims have reported that the phone number that shows up from the scammer is the Leduc RCMP detachment.

Leduc RCMP advise residents to use caution any time they are asked for money. Tips to protect yourself include:

•The RCMP will never ask for payment by Bitcoin.

•Verify the callers phone

number- scammers will often create numbers that are very similar to legitimate ones, or even appearing to be the same. Legitimate businesses- including the RCMP- do not mind you calling back to verify.

•Never feel pressured to make a quick decision – take time to verify.



All accused are being held in custody, and scheduled to appear in Wetaskiwin Provincial Court on February 20, 2025.



Farm Safety Week

Entanglements

° The average farm is full of machinery and device that can grab, cut, smash and entangle fingers, hands, toes, and feet causing injury to the extremities and even death. The sad truth is that most of these injuries can be avoided.

Some of the key entanglement prevention measures to implement when working with or near machinery are:

Before operating any machine or equipment, ensure that all guards are in place and in good condition.

-Wear tight fitting clothing, such as overalls. Avoid wearing any items that could become entangled, such as long coats or scarves.

-Never step over a PTO shaft or conveyer belt while it is still running.
°Ensure that anyone working with augers, PTOs, and other extremely hazardous machinery receives appropriate safety instruction and adequate supervision.
°Keep young children out of the farm or ranch work site, especially areas where there is moving machinery.



MASKWACIS RCMP INVESTIGATE A KIDNAPPING WITH A FIREARM

In the evening of Monday Feb. 24, 2025, Maskwacis RCMP responded to a call to assist Emergency Medical services in Samson Cree Nation with a male sustaining a gunshot wound. Officers arrived on scene and obtained information that the victim had been kidnapped and tied to a chair in the basement of a residence in Samson Cree Nation. The victim was beaten and received a gunshot wound. The Maskwacis RCMP with the assistance of the RCMP police helicopter and police dog services arrested 3 suspects.

3 search warrants were executed in the area. The suspected firearm used in the offence was recovered.

Clarence Northwest (36), a resident of Samson Cree Nation, has been charged with the following offences:

- •Kidnapping with a firearm;
- •Discharge firearm with intent;
- Aggravated assault;
- •Adult intimidation;
- •Pursuit involved Flight from Peace Officer & 13 Additional charges.

Silas Soosay (25) and Chevez Louis (18), both residents of Samson Cree Nation, have been charged with the following offences:

- •Kidnapping with a firearm:
- •Unauthorized possession of a firearm & 4 additional charges.

Northwest, Soosay and Louis were taken before a Justice of the Peace and were remanded into custody. They are scheduled to appear at the Alberta Court of Justice on Feb. 27 and Mar. 4 2025, in Wetaskiwin Alberta.

Police are actively investigating the firearm that was seized.



Preventing Crushes

• From rolling machinery to falling front-end loaders there are countless crush hazards on a farm. While farm operaters and workers can't prevent every hazard on a farm, they should prevent every hazard they can by taking simple preventative measures while working.

• Failure to block-up equipment safely can result in a fatal crushing injury. A jack may slip, a hose or overhead support may break, or the equipment may roll. Always take the precaution of placing support blocks under the equipment prior to working with raised machinery for any reason.





ALBERTA'S NEW HERITAGE FUND

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government is taking action to grow the Alberta Heritage Savings Trust Fund to at least \$250 billion by 2050.

In 1976, former premier Peter Lougheed had the foresight to create what is today commonly called the Alberta Heritage Fund. The initial purpose of this fund was to invest a portion of Alberta's non-renewable resource royalties each year so the investment interest earned in the fund would reduce the province's reliance on resource

revenues.

For decades, contributions to the Heritage Fund were limited and investment earnings were spent instead of being reinvested. Now, Alberta is adopting a bold, new plan to grow the Heritage Fund and achieve long-term growth and financial stability for the province. When the fund reaches its goal of \$250 billion, the province can use a portion of the annual interest accrued to offset any decreases in resource royalties, invest in key provincial infrastructure and grow and protect the Alberta tax advantage.

The roadmap details how the "Alberta Model" will use three components to grow the fund to \$250 billion and eventually fund public services and vital infrastructure:

- Strategic investments: There is a strong focus on opportunities that maximize growth while supporting areas that matter to Albertans, such as technology, energy and infrastructure.
- Global partnerships: The model benefits from working closely with like-minded organizations and investors around the world, to access

premier opportunities and bring new ideas and expertise back to the province.

• Strong governance: The model is structured to ensure transparent and responsible investment management, so that every decision is made with the long-term interests of Albertans in mind.

"Albertans deserve a Heritage Fund they can rely on one that is focused on creating long-term growth and financial stability. We owe it to future generations of Albertans. The new Heritage Fund will lessen our dependence on natural resource revenues, diversify our economy, and create both wealth and prosperity for generations to come."

This plan builds on the vision of former premier Peter Lougheed and builds on the recent investments into the fund. As of September 2024, the Heritage Fund is worth \$24.3 billion. With a \$2-billion commitment from Budget 2024, the fund is projected to increase to more than \$26 billion by the end of the 2024-25 fiscal year. If all of the Heritage Fund's investment income had been reinvested since inception instead of being transferred to the general revenue fund, the Heritage Fund would be upwards of \$250 billion today, generating about \$20 billion annually.

Now is the time to take decisive action. By saving and reinvesting today, Alberta will reduce its reliance on unpredictable non-renewable resource revenue. A renewed Heritage Fund that earns money year over year will secure a resilient and prosperous Alberta for generations to come.

"Our plan to grow the Heritage Fund is about securing Alberta's financial independence and providing stability for our children and grandchildren and build a lasting legacy for all Albertans."

ALBERTA RCMP REMINDS MOTORISTS OF THE DANGERS OF DISTRACTED DRIVING

Your Alberta RCMP reminds motorists of the importance of distraction-free driving. Operating a vehicle on Alberta's roads and highways requires a motorist's complete attention in order to be aware of other road users and reduce the risk of collision. During winter months, when road conditions can be challenging, this is especially important.

In 2024, the Alberta RCMP charged a total of 3,942 motorists with distracted driving. Remembering the

following points can ensure your commute is free of distractions:

•If it impairs your driving – it's a distraction. Distracted driving is not limited to texting or talking on a handheld device while operating a vehicle – it also includes personal grooming, reading, writing, adjusting GPS or audio devices, attending to passengers or pets, and any other activity that might impair your ability to operate a vehicle safely.

•Plan ahead. Before putting your vehicle in drive, prepare by pre-setting your hands-free device, GPS, radio or music.


•Pull over and put it in park. If you need to text, make a call, or engage in any distracting activity, pull over where it is safe and park your vehicle. Simply stopping at a red light is not safe and is still considered distracted driving.

•Distracted driving isn't worth it. The penalty for distracted driving in Alberta is a \$300 fine and three demerit points. The bigger price you pay is risking your own safety and the safety of others.

"It may seem harmless to check a text or switch a song while driving, but that second where your attention is diverted could have devastating consequences," says Sgt. Darrin Turnbull, Alberta RCMP Traffic. "Distractions behind the wheel are never worth putting yourself, or other motorists,
