However, lavish projects can cost more than \$50,000. Protecting such investments is important and requires that homeowners understand how to properly maintain kitchen features so they have the longest life possible. This includes the new countertops that make the kitchen look complete.

Countertops come in various materials, not all of which should be treated the same way. Quartz, granite, marble, laminate, and tile countertops require different types of maintenance.

Quartz

Engineered quartz countertops are popular. Quartz countertops are nearly maintenance-free and resistant to stains, scratches and even heat. Quartz will not need to be sealed like natural stone and can be cleaned using just a damp cloth with a mild, nonabrasive soap.

Granite

Polished or honed granite countertops offer a high-end look that adds instant value to a kitchen. Natural variations in granite give each kitchen a custom look. To keep granite countertops clean, avoid abrasive cleansers that can scratch, and opt for warm, soapy water instead.

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Stains are possible, but can be remedied with a baking soda paste left to sit for a couple of hours, advises Angie's List. Wipe up oils, acids and soda promptly to avoid stains, and follow advised sealing routines. Marble

Marble is a natural stone that is porous and will need to be resealed periodically. Because marble has high levels of the mineral calcite, it can be reactive when acids come in contact with it, and etch marks may appear. Promptly wipe away tomato juice, lemon juice, perfume, or toothpaste. Marble is softer than granite and will wear at a faster rate. Avoid scratching and exercise caution when using knives or sharp objects around marble.

Laminate One of the more budget-friendly materials, laminate countertops can be fabricated to

can be fabricated to mimic the look of natural stone, wood or even quartz. Laminate is less resistant to damage than other materials and will need a gentle touch. Formica® says to never use abrasive cleansers, scouring pads or steel wool when cleaning laminate countertops. For tough stains, an all-purpose cleaner should suffice when applied with a nylon-bristled brush. Test any cleanser in a discreet area first.

Tile Cleaning tile countertops requires getting into crevices along the grout lines. A toothbrush and a mildew-fighting cleaner or bleach diluted with water is advised. Also, unglazed tiles need to be sealed yearly. Some soap may leave residue, which can be removed with a solution of vinegar and water.

Check with the manufacturer or installer of the countertops to learn more about the ways to clean and maintain new counters.

necessitate quick cleanup. Because they are not damaged by constant contact with water, tiled floors and



walls are often found in bathrooms, kitchens, laundry rooms, and entryways.

Although tile is resilient, it is not impervious to the microorganisms that tend to proliferate in areas where moisture and humidity are commonplace. Microbes can grow rapidly in warm areas, especially if food is present. Mold or mildew issues also can become problematic seemingly overnight. But certain modifications can help homeowners alleviate the proliferation of microorganisms.

Various manufacturers have developed their own

innovative tile that contributes to cleaner, and sometimes more eco-friendly, home environments. The application of certain treatments can make ceramic tiles even more impervious to water and moisture. Some tile may help reduce the spread of certain strains of bacteria, such as E. coli and staph, without requiring the application of potentially harsh chemical detergents. Others treatments may protect against yeast, molds and fungi that can cause stains and odors and result in the degradation of tile.

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products Antimicrobial inhibit the growth of microorganisms and suppress their reproduction. For example, tiles with Microban protection employ an antimicrobial agent built into the product during the manufacturing process. When microbes touch the product surface, the agent penetrates the cell wall of the microorganism. Other tiles are treated with micrometric particles of titanium dioxide (TiO2), which is activated by sunlight or artificial light. This causes a photocatalysis process, which is responsible for the

product's antipollution and bactericidal properties. Examples of TiO2-treated tiles include Active Clean Air & Antibacterial Ceramic.

Antimicrobial ceramic tile can be advantageous in rooms where sanitation and hygiene are an utmost priority. This includes not only public places, but private residences. Worktops and floors where microbes can be transferred are particularly beneficial areas to install antimicrobial tile.

A potential side effect of antimicrobial tile is a reduction in reliance on harsh cleaning products. Although regular washing is recommended, residents may not need to use odoriferous or strong chemical cleaners to sanitize their homes. This helps improve indoor air quality and reduce the potential contamination of the environment from chemical runoff.

Homeowners thinking of installing antimicrobial tile in their homes should discuss their options with a tile retailer or contractor during the planning stages.




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ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL 8 BALL TOURNAMENT AT SPRUCE GROVE PIONEER CENTER

I wasn't sure if I wanted to broach this topic, but given the amount of questions I've been receiving in the constituency, out on the road, and when I'm speaking with folks that are visiting I felt compelled this morning. The federal election is on the 28th of April, advance polls had record numbers which is a good sign because people care. The frustration I have is how much of the lead up to the election, and much of the early discussion was all about what President Trump was doing, not what we have been doing as a country for the last 10 years.

I think there was one thing that became abundantly clear, the liberal leadership under Justin Trudeau was heading us toward a cliff that no one could tolerate. Again, I'm sure when Time Life magazine had old Adolf on their front cover as man of the year, we sure didn't think so either. Our fate as Canadians will be much different, it will be more civilized, more economical pain, more of a separation of the classes, and an erosion of the middle class to be sure, and unbearable taxation, debt, with a dependance on the government.

The other path, well, its going to be painful for some, uncomfortable for the short term, but also I believe inspiring. Let's unleash the potential of Canada again, lest work as a country, better than before, less east / west divides. More collaboration, more access to foreign markets, more responsible development, more empowerment of the individual and family. More self reliance, less government dependance and interference, less taxation, more choice, more freedom.

This is the vision I share with folks abroad, this is what I see not only for Alberta, North Western Canada, but for all of Canada. I see economic corridors that are not only recognized but protected, that help build our nation, like the railroad did back in the day. I see us not just hovering around the 49th parallel, but expanding northward, being a real northern nation with a thriving arctic presence. I see so much opportunity due to the resources we have, the innovations, and quite frankly the doors that open up to us when we present ourselves as "that place, the True North, Strong, and Free".

How do I know? I shared this vision with the Ambassadors of Norway, and Finland recently. They believed the same, they want to be part of a group I'm putting together to collaborate on the Arctic / Nordic nations. I was engaged with three separate delegation from Germany, same story. I met with the Ambassador of Albania, same response. I went on a personal trip to India, had meetings with the secretary of Energy, numerous executives and managers in energy companies, engineering companies, paper companies, aviation companies, property developers, and even film studios. Same story. Numerous USA capital visits, and having US delegations as recent as last week visit us here, same story.

I honestly believe as a country we have been led down a garden path chasing butterflies, and fairly tales by the groups tapping into our conscientious and caring Canadian values. The whole time, they were literally robbing the treasury, where is all of our gold reserve today... gone. Who holds or debts? Where did all the money go? Did it really change the weather? What underpins the value of our currency?

I want to remain optimistic, I want to believe in my fellow Canadians and our system, I want to believe that it hasn't been hijacked, and its not too late. I want to believe that folks will be bold enough to break away from the empty promises, accept reality, that its going to take some real honest to goodness teamwork and efforts to turn this thing around, and be that strong independent well respected nation again. To be that place of preference to make a good life, where hard work pays off. In short, I'd sure like the Alberta Spirit to spread to the other parts of the country. I want this country to realize its full potential, and I want you, your kids, and your grandkids to remember that time, we turned it around. We learned our lesson, and that flirting with all that "Sunny Ways, free stuff" was not what the country needed. So regardless of what happens on the 28th, I'll keep gathering a coalition of the willing, across the country, and beyond our shores to build those relationships, and those economic corridors. It's something that spans electoral cycles, it's a nation builder, and its something that is intergenerational, and it's a path for what can be.

Give Life Alberta flag will fly during two awareness weeks every year

Alberta Health Services' organ and tissue donation program Give Life Alberta has raised a new flag at the University of Alberta Hospital, a tribute to the thousands of people in Alberta, both deceased and living, who have given the gift of life to others.

The Give Life Alberta flag will be raised at the 112 St. entrance for two weeks every year: National Organ and Tissue Donation Awareness Week (April 20-26, 2025) and Living Donation Week (Sept. 7-13, 2025). The flag's icon – a green heart filling the void of a dotted heart – symbolizes organ and tissue donation. One organ donor can save up to eight lives, and a tissue donor can save or dramatically improve up to 75 lives.

While Alberta marked another record year in 2024 – with 317 deceased organ and tissue donors – there are more than 500 people waiting for life-saving transplants in the province.

"It's important to remember (donation) is not something to take for granted," says Give Life Alberta Medical Director Dr. Andreas Kramer. "Often we have to have these conversations at a difficult time in patients' lives, or their families' lives, and we're just really grateful that so many Albertans are willing to make that decision."

One of those selfless donors in 2024 was 43-year-old Kathleen McGee of Edmonton. While she was dying of colorectal cancer, the standup comedian asked her husband Adam Lampman to make sure she donated anything she could.

"She had such a genuine care for people and wanted to be able to provide either life or a positive aspect of life to someone even when she wasn't here anymore," says Lampman.

Shortly after his wife died in the fall of 2024, Lampman completed the consent forms and questionnaire required for her to become a donor. McGee was eligible to donate her eyes and her corneas have restored sight for one person.

Another donor's family helped raise the new Give Life Alberta flag. After 23-year-old Andy Polanski died in a motor vehicle crash in 2013, the Fort Saskatchewan man saved five lives and improved many more with his organ and tissue donations. His family continues to support fellow donor families through fundraising events.

"To be able to pay tribute to Andy and all the other amazing donors and their families is an honour for us," says Dawn Pinder, Andy's sister. "We understand the rollercoaster of emotions involved in making a loved one's donation wishes come true and our hearts go out to all donor families."

Reaghan Manyluk sees the flag as a symbol of appreciation for her donor hero. She received a life-saving kidney and pancreas transplant at the University of Alberta Hospital in 2014. Eleven years later, the elementary school teacher is healthy, active and grateful for every "bonus" moment of her life.

"I've been able to enjoy some incredible moments that I never thought I'd live to see, such as my grandmother's 97th birthday and the births of my niece and nephew," says Manyluk. "I think about my donor often and thank them for my life."

Albertans are encouraged to register their intent to donate online at GiveLifeAlberta.ca – or at a motor vehicle registry office – and to tell their loved ones about their donation decision.

When asked about her reaction, Bauer simply said: "WTF!"


Bauer has plans to invest her winnings and is planning a vacation as well– she's not sure where she'll go yet.
