


- Set up buddy systems for teens going out after dark.

- Before you reveal any personally identifying information, find out how it will be used and if it will be shared.
- Pay attention to your billing cycles.
 Follow up with creditors if your bills don't arrive on time.
- 3) Guard your mail. Deposit outgoing mail in post office collections boxes or at your local post office. Promptly remove mail from your mailbox after delivery. Ensure mail is forwarded or re-routed if you move or change your mailing address.
- 4) Utilize passwords on your credit card, bank and phone accounts. Avoid using easily available information like your mother's maiden name, your birth date, the last four digits of your SIN or your phone number.
- Minimize the identification information and number of cards you carry.
- 6) Do not give out personal information on the phone, through the mail or over the internet unless you have initiated the contract or know whom you're dealing with.
- 7) Keep items with personal information in a safe place. An identity thief will pick through your garbage or recycling bins. Be sure to tear or shed receipts, copies of credit applications, insurance forms, physician statements and credit offers you get in the mail.
- 8) Give your SIN only when absolutely necessary; ask you use other types of identifiers when possible.
- Don't carry your SIN card; leave it in a secure place.



RCMP OFFICERS CHARGED WITH DANGEROUS DRIVING

On March 5, 2020, the Alberta Serious Incident Response Team (ASIRT) was directed to investigate a possible dangerous driving offence while on duty by Parkland County RCMP officers on February 25, 2020.

The evidence gathered during ASIRT's investigation provided reasonable grounds to believe that an offence had been committed. As required by the Police Act, the investigation was forwarded to the Alberta Crown Prosecution Service (ACPS) to determine whether the evidence met the standard for prosecution.

Following a review of the investigation and having been advised that the ACPS was of the opinion that the evidence met their standard for prosecution, ASIRT Executive Director Michael Ewenson

determined that the involved officers should be charged. On April 7, 2025, Const. Debra-Ann Wash and Const. Dorian Tooze were charged with operating a conveyance in a manner that was dangerous to the public under Sec. 320.13(1) of the Criminal Code. They were released on an appearance notice and are scheduled for first appearance on May 21 in the Stony Plain Court of Justice.

As this matter is now before the

courts, no further information will be released.

ASIRT's mandate is to effectively, independently and objectively investigate incidents involving Alberta's police that have resulted in serious injury or death to any person, as well as serious or sensitive allegations of police misconduct.

MASKWACIS RCMP SEIZE WEAPONS AND DRUGS AFTER TRAFFIC STOP

Maskwacis, Alta. - On April 12, 2025, the Maskwacis RCMP attempted to conduct a traffic stop on a vehicle in the area of Louis Bull First Nations, Alta. The involved vehicle sped off and fled from police. The occupants of the vehicle were seen abandoning the vehicle and running into

a residence in the area. Suspected methamphetamines and drug paraphernalia were observed by police through the window of the abandoned vehicle.

A search warrant was obtained by officers for the vehicle and the nearby residence. During the search, multiple firearms, magazines and ammunition were located. Police also found military style

attack vests and a stolen vehicle. As a result of the investigation, the following individuals were arrested:

•Bryatt Threefingers (28), a resident of Louis Bull First Nations, was charged with:

oBreaching firearms prohibitions (x4);

oUnauthorized possession of a firearm;

oFlight from peace officer; and oDriving while unauthorized.

•Tracy Crier (19), a resident of Louis Bull First Nations, was charged with multiple firearms offences.

Threefingers and Crier were brought before a justice of the peace. Crier was released on conditions while

ALBERTA RCMP OFFICER INVOLVED **SHOOTING IN MASKWACIS**

On April 24, 2025, Maskwacis RCMP were asked to assist Edmonton Police Service with the investigation and subsequent arrest of occupants who fled from a stolen vehicle into a residence in Montana First Nation, Alta. Soon after, two suspects exited the house and were arrested. The third, who was believed to be in possession of a firearm, remained in the residence. The Alberta

RCMP Emergency Response Team (ERT) was called in to

Soon after 10:50 p.m., a confrontation occurred between RCMP and the suspect, resulting in at least one officer discharging their service weapon. No officers were injured during this confrontation. Soon after, the residence caught fire and no one was observed exiting. The Maskwacis Fire Department was called as soon as the fire started and are still dealing

with the property.

In compliance with legislative requirements, the Director of Law Enforcement was immediately notified causing the deployment of ASIRT to conduct an independent investigation. The RCMP believes in accountability and transparency and in so doing will provide full support to the ASIRT investigators. Events like this are difficult for everyone involved.

Independent of ASIRT's investigation, the RCMP's internal review process has been implemented to gather a full account of what took place during this incident. RCMP training, policy, police response, and the officer's duty status will be subject to review. The RCMP is, of course, fully cooperating with ASIRT. NEW FLAG AT UAH HONOURS ORGAN AND TISSUE DONORS

Give Life Alberta flag will fly during two awareness weeks every year

Alberta Health Services' organ and tissue donation program Give Life Alberta has raised a new flag at the University of Alberta Hospital, a tribute to the thousands of people in Alberta, both deceased and living, who have given the gift of life to others.

The Give Life Alberta flag will be raised at the 112 St. entrance for two weeks every year: National Organ and Tissue Donation Awareness Week (April 20-26, 2025) and Living Donation Week (Sept. 7-13, 2025). The flag's icon – a green heart filling the void of a dotted heart – symbolizes organ and tissue

donation. One organ donor can save up to eight lives, and a tissue donor can save or dramatically improve up to 75 lives.

While Alberta marked another record year in 2024 – with 317 deceased organ and tissue donors – there are more than 500 people waiting for life-saving transplants in the province.

"It's important to remember (donation) is not something to take for granted," says Give Life Alberta Medical Director Dr. Andreas Kramer. "Often we have to have these conversations at a difficult time in patients' lives, or their families' lives, and we're just really grateful that so many Albertans

are willing to make that decision."

One of those selfless donors in 2024 was 43-yearold Kathleen McGee of Edmonton. While she was dying of colorectal cancer, the stand-up comedian asked her husband Adam Lampman to make sure she donated anything she could.

"She had such a genuine care for people and wanted to be able to provide either life or a positive aspect of life to someone even when she wasn't here anymore," says Lampman.

Shortly after his wife died in the fall of 2024, Lampman completed the consent forms and questionnaire required for her to become a donor, McGee

was eligible to donate her eyes and her corneas have restored sight for one per-

Another donor's family helped raise the new Give Life Alberta flag. After 23-year-old Andy Polanski died in a motor vehicle crash in 2013, the Fort Saskatchewan man saved five lives and improved many more with his organ and tissue donations. His family continues to support fellow donor families through fundraising events.

"To be able to pay tribute to Andy and all the other amazing donors and their families is an honour for us," says Dawn Pinder, Andy's sister.


Join a neighborhood watch committee, and ask local law enforcement for assistance.

"We understand the rollercoaster of emotions involved in making a loved one's donation wishes come true and our hearts go out to all donor families."

Reaghan Manyluk sees the flag as a symbol of appreciation for her donor hero. She received a life-saving kidney and pancreas transplant at the University of

Alberta Hospital in 2014. Eleven years later, the elementary school teacher is healthy, active and grateful for every "bonus" moment of her life.

"I've been able to enjoy some incredible moments that I never thought I'd live to see, such as my grandmother's 97th birthday and the births of my niece and nephew," says Manyluk. "I think about my donor often and thank them for my life."

Albertans are encouraged to register their intent to donate online at GiveLife-Alberta.ca – or at a motor vehicle registry office – and to tell their loved ones about their donation decision.


