Changes will protect ratepayers from rising costs by ensuring only those who receive hydrogen-blended natural gas in their homes and businesses will pay for any additional system costs. Utility providers will also be required to ensure community support on hydrogen blending projects.

Strengthening the grid, protecting ratepayers

Albertans increasingly rely on electricity to power their homes, businesses and lives. The Energy and Utilities Statutes Amendment Act, 2025, if passed, will put Albertans first by advancing the modernization of the electricity market to ensure it can meet their growing needs, at a price they can afford.

Proposed amendments support the move to a day-ahead reliability market, ensure there is enough power available and reduce the risk of grid alerts in the future. Much-needed updates will also be made to Alberta's transmission policies to protect ratepayers from rising transmission costs on their utility bills. This includes encouraging more efficient use of existing infrastructure by maximizing the use of existing lines and ensuring new power projects are built in optimal locations. Changes will also see costs assigned on a cost-causation basis, ensuring that Albertans are

not burdened with the full cost of any new transmission lines that need to be built.

Additional legislative changes

The Energy and Utilities Statutes Amendment Act, 2025 also includes an amendment to the Petroleum Marketing Act to increase the number of directors on the Alberta Petroleum Marketing

Commission board from seven to 13 to increase the range of expertise and allow for more robust governance. This will also increase support for new initiatives such as the bitumen royalty inkind and a proposed gas royalty in-kind, ensuring Albertans receive the maximum value for our resources.

- 8. If you are even a little bit suspicious, talk to your parents.


# SELF DEFENCE




# BULLYING Tips for Dealing With Bullying

- 6) Teach your child to be assertive. Your child should be able to express feelings and needs clearly, without shouting or other aggressive behavior.



# ALBERTA RCMP MARKS NATIONAL PUBLIC SAFETY TELECOMMUNICATORS WEEK AND LAUNCHES PROVINCE-WIDE NON-EMERGENCY LINE

Your Alberta RCMP is recognizing the hard work of its Operational Communications Centres (OCC) and their operators during National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week, running April 13-19. OCC operators are the first point of contact for the public when seeking assistance from the police, in both emergencies and non-emergencies. They work day and night, 365 days a year, and are essential for ensuring public safety.

As a part of National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week, the Alberta RCMP is happy to announce that individuals in Alberta will now be able make non-emergency police reports by calling 310-RCMP, or 310-7267. The new function is designed to streamline the reporting process, optimize early stages of investigations, and reduce unnecessary calls to 911.

"310-RCMP was created to help eliminate confusion about which detachment someone should call if they experience a non-emergency that doesn't require police attendance," says Chris Spence, director of the Operational Communications Centre in Alberta. "We encourage people to report non-emergencies as this helps us focus frontline efforts on high-priority calls and deploy resources in areas that need it most."

RCMP Police Dispatchers determine when a non-emergency call should be dispatched to a detachment directly or to the Alberta RCMP's Call Back Unit (CBU). The CBU is a unit made up of police

officers whose primary duty is to respond to and investigate files that do not require scene attendance by police officers. CBU officers will contact complainants and investigate the occurrence. If, during the investigation, there is need for further investigation they will contact detachments or specialized units.

Long-distance charges do not apply, and no area code prefix required. The number is accessible to all Albertans within the province with a phone line or an active

# COUNTY MOVES TO FIRE RESTRICTION

#### LSAC.ca/fire-services

Due to an EXTREME fire hazard rating for Lac Ste. Anne County, a FIRE RESTRICTION has been issued until further notice. Fire hazard conditions in light and medium fuels are at a level where fires can start and grow quickly. With a significant warming trend in the weather forecast, hazards will also increase.

This FIRE RESTRICTION includes:

- No open burning fires or major burn operations are allowed, and no fireworks.
- SAFE fires in acceptable fire pits, burn barrels/incinerators with screens, pellet smokers or other
  enclosed outdoor wood-fired appliances as well as gas/propane stoves, and barbeques are allowed
  with conditions.
- A SAFE fire under this restriction is a CONTINUOUSLY monitored fire of LIMITED size for cooking, warming, or recreation, burning within an ACCEPTABLY constructed fire pit or appliance, with a spark-arresting screen, no more than 1 meter in diameter and 60 cm (24 inches) in height, built on a non-combustible surface. No burning of any kind for any reason with winds above 15km/hr. No burning without an acceptable extinguishing method immediately at hand.
- No further fire permits for any open fire under the bylaw will be issued.
- Current permits issued may be suspended or cancelled at any time.

Report any wildfire to 9-1-1 with the exact location to assist Lac Ste. Anne County fire personnel in locating and promptly extinguishing them.

The MUNICIPAL GENERAL ELECTION will be held on Monday, October 20, 2025. Nominations for Councillors will be accepted until noon on Nomination Day— Monday, September 22, 2025.

# Tips to Protect your Real Estate Investment Dollars

- \* Consult public real estate websites to review property listings in the community where the property is located. Compare features, size & locations to establish if the asking price seems reasonable.
- Get independent representation for your purchase. If the selfer objects, consider it a red flag.
- \* Check to make sure your representative is a licensed real estate agent. Contact your local Real Estate Board or the Real Estate Council of Alberta. Using a licensed real estate agent does not cost anything from a purchaser's standpoint. Usually all commissions are paid by the seller.
- \*Beware of a real estate agent or mortgage broker who has a financial interest in the transaction.
- \* Ask your independent representative to provide you with a comparative market analysis of the property.
- \* Ask for a copy of the land title or go to a Registry office and ask them to do a historical title search.
- Insist on a home inspection to guard against buying a home that has been cosmetically renovated.
- \* When you make a deposit, ensure your money is protected by being held "in trust"



# Red Flags to Watch for Mortgage Fraud

- \* Someone offers you a fee to use your name and credit information to obtain a mortgage
- \*You are encouraged to include false information to a loan application
- You are asked to leave signature lines or other important areas on a loan application blank
- \* The loan amount on the mortgage is significantly higher than the value of the property
- \* The mortgage has been refinanced several times and each instance, the amount of the mortgage has increased
- \* The seller or investment advisor discourages you from seeing or inspecting the property you are offering to purchase





Drivers who are impaired by fatigue, drugs, alcohol or other distractions such as cell phones, are a danger not only to themselves, but also to the innocent drivers around them. If you witness any of the behaviors below, call 911 and tell the operator that you are calling to report an impaired driver. Protect machinery from theft by leaving valuables locked in a shed or storage facility and by marking equipment with your drivers licence and province of issue (an engraver can be borrowed free of charge from most local police detachments).

Protect livestock by checking herds regularly and keeping accurate records of livestock born, sold or purchased.

"Grain Fette" or "Grain Guard" is a unique approach to identifying your crops. Small bits of paper, each one imprinted with your special code number, are mixed with grain as grain is being augered into the storage shed. This is approved by the Canadian Grain Commission. The paper used is also digestable in animal feed.

Utilize the Report-A-Poacher Program. Their toll free number is 1-800-642-3800.Rural Crime Watch Members are concerned citizens who are watchful for unusual activity in their community. They record information on suspicious people and vehicles and pass it along to local police. Join together with your neighbours to install a crime watch program in your area.Do not approach suspicious individuals on your own.

mobile phone with a cellular signal.

Non-emergencies:

- Do not pose an immediate or potential threat to life or public safety.
- Include crimes that have already taken place prior to being discovered.
  - Often do not re-

quire police attendance, but do require police response.

Examples include but are not limited to:

- Minor motor vehicle collisions.
- Break and enters that already took place.
- Scams in which money or personal information was not transferred or provided.
  - Lost property.

- Property damage under \$5,000.
- Theft under \$5,000.

While these types of reports are important, they are not an emergency.

"Alberta's government continues to support survivors by providing more than \$88 million through Budget 2025 to prevent family and sexual violence – including an additional \$1.5 million to sexual assault centres across the province and the Association of Alberta Sexual Assault Services.
