transported to the hospital with non-life-threatening injuries. Investigation revealed that the collision was due to a "road rage" incident, resulting in the arrest of the driver of the other vehicle. No other individuals were involved in the incident. The highway was partially closed, resulting in slow moving traffic, while RCMP collision analysts attended and conducted their

investigation.

As a result of the investigation, Kevin Hornle (55), a resident of Drayton Valley, was charged with Dangerous operation causing bodily harm and Aggravated assault. He was brought before a justice of the peace and released on conditions. He is to appear before the Alberta Court of Justice in Drayton Valley on June 17, 2025.


The implementation plan that will guide revitalization outlines three phased, strategic, and sustainable priority levels for work to come:

• Tier 1 Foundational Actions: Lay the groundwork for downtown revitalization, focusing on major infra-

structure improvements, zoning updates, and business activation.

- Tier 2 Supportive Measures: Reinforce and expand upon Tier 1 by enhancing public spaces, exploring funding mechanisms, and preserving heritage.
- Tier 3 Enhancements and Long-term Growth: Ensure sustainability and long-term vibrancy by improving public spaces, environmental sustainability, and cultural programming.

Community feedback helped shape the plan over its two-year development through engagement sessions held during each phase of the project.

A new pilot program will help keep Albertans safe this summer by removing impaired boaters from lakes and rivers.

Operating a boat while under the influence of alcohol or drugs places everyone at risk and is one of the leading factors in recreational boating deaths in Alberta. To help tackle this issue, Alberta Fish and Wildlife Enforcement Services (FWES) has launched a pilot program this summer to enhance safety on lakes and rivers by targeting potential impaired boaters in key areas.

Between May 16 and Sept. 1, fish and wildlife officers will enhance their patrols on lakes and rivers in and around Spruce Grove, Wetaskiwin, Ponoka, Camrose and Red Deer with the ability to determine

the sobriety of boat operators by using Approved Screening Devices (ASDs) - commonly known as breathalyzers. If there is reasonable suspicion that the boat operator has consumed alcohol, fish and wildlife officers will administer breath tests. If the officer determines the operator is impaired, they will be arrested for further processing and could face criminal charges.

"Alberta families have a right to enjoy our beautiful summers safely. The pilot program we've announced today sends a clear message: impaired boating has no place on Alberta's waterways. Full stop. Operating a boat while impaired is just as dangerous and illegal as driving a car impaired. I want to commend our fish and wildlife officers for taking concrete steps to prevent accidents and keep Albertans safe."

This initiative supports the ongoing work and responsibilities of FWES to promote safety on Alberta's waterways through education and enforcement. During routine patrols where fish and wildlife officers monitor for compliance with fishing regulations, they will also check for valid boating licences and compliance with safety equipment requirements, monitor speed and wake zones, and educate Albertans on responsible boating practices.

"Fish and Wildlife Enforcement Services is committed to ensuring the safety of Albertans – both on land and on our waterways. This new pilot program provides officers with an essential tool to better detect those suspected of boating while impaired and enhances our ability to ensure a safe and enjoyable boating season for everyone."



SUPPORTING ALBERTA'S WILDFIRE EVACUEES

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government provides emergency evacuation payments to assist those who have been forced from their homes for an extended period of time.

Emergency evacuations due to the threat of a wildfire or other natural disaster can cause incredible emotional and financial stress for those affected. To help ease the costs of evacuating and provide some peace of mind, Alberta's government provides emergency evacuation payments to assist those who have been forced from their homes for an extended period of time.

"Being forced from your home is one of the most difficult things a family can face. Our government is here to support Albertans every step of the way – helping cover urgent costs and providing reassurance during an incredibly stressful time. We're committed to ensuring families have the help they need, when they need it most."

Each adult resident of an affected community who has been evacuated for seven days or more is eligible to receive a one-time payment of \$1,250 and \$500 for each dependent child under the age of 18. These evacuation payments help pay for temporary accommodations, food and other necessities while evacuees are away from their homes. Most insurance policies will also provide coverage for additional living expenses if the insured are forced to leave due to a disaster.

"Whether flood or fire, evacuations due to natural disasters can be incredibly stressful. As always, our government is working hard to ensure help is there for those who need it and do everything we can to support Albertans through this wildfire season."

Evacuees can apply for the payments online and will have

up to 60 days to apply following the start of an evacuation order for their respective community. Payments will be made by e-transfer within 24 hours of application, which is the fastest and most efficient way to receive these payments. Evacuees unable to apply online or receive e-transfer can call the Alberta Supports Contact Centre at 1-877-644-9992 for assistance and to make alternate payment arrangements.

"In the face of floods and fires, Alberta's government remains committed to providing essential support and resources to protect and assist Albertans during this wildfire season, ensuring that help is always within reach for those affected."

CONFIRMED CASE OF MEASLES PROMPTS PUBLIC ALERT TO POTENTIAL EXPOSURES

Submitted by Alberta Health Services

Alberta Health Services (AHS) has been notified of a person with confirmed measles in the Edmonton Zone who has been in a public setting while infectious. Additional locations may be released if necessary.

Individuals who were in the following location during the specified dates and times may have been exposed to measles:

Location:

Connect Care Medical Clinic, Spruce Grove (20 Westwind Drive, #215)

Exposure time period:

May 16: Exposure time: Approx. 8:45 a.m. - 1 p.m. (MDT)

Anyone who attended this location at these times, who was born in or after 1970 and has less than two documented doses of measles-containing vaccine, may be at risk for developing measles. They should self-monitor for symptoms of measles and

are strongly encouraged to review their immunization records.

Measles is an extremely contagious disease and the virus spreads easily through the air. Symptoms of measles include:

•Fever of 38.3° C or higher;

•Cough, runny nose and/or red eyes; and

•A rash that appears 3 to 7 days after fever starts, usually beginning behind the ears and on the face and spreading down to the body and then to the arms and legs. The rash appears red and blotchy on lighter skin colours. On darker skin colours, it can appear purple or darker than the skin around it, or it might be hard to see

Complications of measles can include ear infections, pneumonia, inflammation of the brain, premature delivery, and rarely death. Persons who are pregnant, less than 5 years of age, or have weakened immune systems are at greatest

risk

If symptoms of measles do develop, individuals are advised to stay home and call the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434 before visiting any healthcare facility or provider, including a family physician clinic or pharmacy.

Measles vaccine is highly effective at preventing infection and complications. In Alberta, measles vaccine is offered, free of charge, through Alberta's publicly funded immunization program. The recommended schedule for measles vaccination is two doses, the first at one year of age and the second at 18 months.

If you think you have been exposed, and you are not protected against measles you may be able to receive immunization to reduce the risk of infection. A dose of vaccine needs to be given within 72 hours of exposure to prevent measles. Babies under 1 year of age, people with severely weakened immune systems, and those who are pregnant

may be able to receive immunoglobulin within 6 days of exposure to prevent disease. Call the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434 for more information if these situations apply to you or your family.

Albertans uncertain of their immunization history, or their child's immunization history, can check eligibility and/ or book an appointment by calling the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434.

Individuals who are 14 years of age and older can check their My Health Record.




