NO INSPECTION, NO LAUNCH

Starting June 1, all boats, jet skis, kayaks and other watercraft entering via Alberta's east or south borders must be inspected.

Invasive mussels threaten the

water systems that families, farmers and businesses rely on and can cause millions in damages. Alberta is currently 100 per cent free of the tiny invaders but the risk is growing across North America. From clogging irrigation pipes, damaging pumps and disrupting water

delivery, zebra and quagga mussels can put the food, farms and livelihoods that Albertans depend on at risk.

As of June 1, it is now mandatory for every boat, whether powered or paddled, entering the



province from the east and south to get inspected for invasive mussels or other invasive species. If an inspection station is not open, all watercrafts crossing these highrisk borders must be inspected before launch and within 7 days or face fines up to \$4,200.

"It just takes one invasive mussel to cause millions in damages to our waters and waterways -- that's why mandatory inspections are now required. Alberta's watercraft inspectors are trained to know where these deceptively small quagga and zebra mussels hide. If you're coming from the east or the south, you must get your boat inspected - no exceptions and no shortcuts."

Until Sept. 30, upon crossing into Alberta from the eastern or southern borders, anyone transporting a watercraft needs to stop at a station for inspection. If the nearest station is closed, inspections are still required within seven days and before launching into any Alberta waterbody.

Inspectors will provide a sticker for watercraft owners to display as proof of inspection. It remains mandatory for anyone travelling with a watercraft to stop when passing an open station, regardless of entry point.

Alberta's government has also invested in opening 11 watercraft inspection stations this year with increased staff and longer operating hours, more K-9 detection teams and additional mobile decontamination units.



city and region. Updated every seven years, the TMP supports offsite levy updates and ensures infrastructure planning aligns with projected growth.

"The Transportation Master Plan is about more than just roads – it's about fos-



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CONFIRMED CASE OF MEASLES PROMPTS PUBLIC ALERT TO POTENTIAL EXPOSURES

Submitted by Alberta Health Services

Alberta Health Services (AHS) has been notified of a person with confirmed measles in the Edmonton Zone who has been in a public setting while infectious. Additional locations may be released if necessary.

Individuals who were in the following location/s during the specified dates and times may have been exposed to measles:

Anyone who attended these locations at these times, who was born in or after 1970 and has less than two documented doses of measles-containing vaccine, may be at risk for developing measles. They should self-monitor for symptoms of measles and are strongly encouraged to review their immunization records.

Measles is an extremely contagious disease and

the virus spreads easily through the air. Symptoms of measles include:

- Fever of 38.3° C or higher; and
- Cough, runny nose and/or red eyes;
 and
- A rash that appears 3 to 7 days after fever starts, usually beginning behind the ears and on the face and spreading down to the body and then to the arms and legs. The rash appears red and blotchy on lighter skin colours. On darker skin colours, it can appear purple or darker than the skin around it, or it might be hard to see.

Complications of measles can include ear infections, pneumonia, inflammation of the brain, premature delivery, and rarely death. Persons who are pregnant, less than 5 years of age, or have weakened immune systems are at greatest risk of serious complications.

If symptoms of measles do develop, individuals are advised to stay home and call the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434 before visiting any healthcare facility or provider, including a family physician clinic or pharmacy.

Measles vaccine is highly effective at preventing infection and complications. In Alberta, measles vaccine is offered, free of charge, through Alberta's publicly funded immu-

nization program. The recommended schedule for measles vaccination is two doses, the first at one year of age and the second at 18 months.

If you think you have been exposed, and you are not protected against measles you may be able to receive immunization to reduce the risk of infection. A dose of vaccine needs to be given within 72 hours of exposure to prevent measles. Babies under 1 year of age, people with severely weakened immune systems, and those who are pregnant may be able to receive immunoglobulin within 6 days of exposure to prevent disease. Call the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434 for more information if these situations apply to you or your family.

Albertans uncertain of their immunization history, or their child's immunization history, can check eligibility and/or book an appointment by calling the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434.

Individuals who are 14 years of age and older can check their My Health Record.

The measles hotline connects you to a professional who can assist with accessing your immunization records or offer general information; provide advice for those experiencing measles symptoms and are feeling unwell; and assist

with booking measles immunization appointments or locating a public health clinic offering immunization in your area.

You can also text 'Measles' to 88111 to get measles health information texted to your mobile device.

ALBERTA RCMP COMMUNITY RESPONSE TEAM AND THE DRAYTON VALLEY GENERAL INVESTIGATION SECTION SEIZE DRUGS AND STOLEN VEHICLE

Your Alberta RCMP's Community Response Team (CRT) and Drayton Valley General Investigations Section (GIS), with the assistance of the Drayton Valley RCMP, executed two search warrants in relation to proactively targeting drug traffickers in Drayton Valley, Alta.

On June 3, 2025, the Alberta RCMP CRT, Drayton Valley GIS, and Drayton Valley RCMP, arrested Tyler McKerry (36), a resident of Drayton Valley, and Ashley Berger (32), also a resident of Drayton Valley, in front of the Drayton Valley Town Office.

As a result of the investigation and subsequent search warrant on a residence in Poplar Ridge Trailer Court in Drayton Valley, the following was seized:

60 Grams of Metham-

phetamine;

·Brass knuckles; and,

•\$840 CDN.

Tyler McKerry was charged with charged with:

•Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking Methamphetamine.

•Breach of Release Order (x4);

•Possession of a Weapon Dangerous to the Public;

•Possession of a Prohibited Weapon; and

•Breach of a Weapon Prohibition Order

McKerry was held for a bail hearing and remanded into custody. He is to appear in the Alberta Court of Justice in Drayton Valley on June 17, 2025.

and Ashley Berger was charged with:

•Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking Methamphetamine

•Breach of Probation.

Berger was taken before a Justice of the Peace and released with

conditions and is to appear in the Alberta Court of Justice in Drayton Valley on July 15, 2025.

On June 5, 2025, as a result of an ongoing drug trafficking investigation the Alberta RCMP's CRT, Drayton Valley GIS, and Drayton Valley RCMP, arrested Matthew McKay (39), a resident of Drayton Valley.

Police executed a search warrant on a residence and the following was seized:

•Quantity of Methamphetamine;

·Quantity of Fentanyl;

•\$985 CDN; and

·Brass knuckles.

McKay was charged with:

Trafficking Fentanyl;

•Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking Fentanyl; and

•Possession of Proceeds of Crime.

McKay was held for a bail hearing and was released with conditions. He is to appear in the Alberta Court of Justice in Drayton Valley on July 15, 2025.

On June 6, 2025, Drayton Valley RCMP was advised of a stolen 2023 Polaris Ranger. The Alberta RCMP's CRT and detachment officers responded and located the vehicle at the Esso in Alberta Beach, Alta. Jasen Pappin (46), resident of Stony Plain, was arrested.

As a result of the investigation, Pappin was charged with Possession of Stolen Property.

Pappin was held for a bail hearing and remanded into custody. He is to appear in the Alberta Court of Justice in Stony Plain on June 25, 2025.

Alberta RCMP's CRT focuses outreach strategies combined with targeted enforcement and engagement with police partners and community to improve community safety and wellness, reduce victimization, and address the social determinants contributing to the root cause of crime.

BALANCING DRUG COVERAGE FOR THE LONG-TERM

To offset the rising cost of government drug coverage, the maximum prescription drug co-payment for Albertans with Coverage for Seniors and Non-Group Coverage will increase for the first time since 1994.

Alberta's government is committed to making sure Albertans have world-class health care coverage that provides affordable access to esmedications. sential However, the cost of providing coverage for Seniors and Non-Group Coverage to Albertans is increasing by nearly seven per cent annually. In 2023-24, the cost of administering these two programs was approximately \$1.3 billion.

By 2026-27, the cost of providing coverage to Albertans will increase by approximately \$194 million.

To address rising costs and ensure coverage can continue to be provided in the years to come, the maximum co-payment for a prescription will increase by a total of \$10 over a 10-month period. Beginning July 1, 2025, the maximum co-payment will increase by \$1 each month until it reaches \$35 on April 1, 2026. If co-payments had increased in line with inflation, seniors would now be paying approximately \$48.

"Providing Albertans with coverage for their prescription drugs ensures they have access to necessary medications. But drug coverage costs

are rising, and we need to take steps to address the cost. This change will help keep those costs in check, maintain a fair and balanced cost sharing approach, and allow the government to continue offering this important coverage."

When the new maximum co-payment comes into effect, the majority of Alberta seniors will still pay less than seniors in most other provinces. For example, an Alberta senior needing a drug that costs \$900 annually will pay \$270 and the government will pay the remaining cost. In B.C., the same senior would pay \$900.

Public drug coverage in

Alberta covers about 40.1 per cent of all expenditures toward prescribed drugs in the province. This is the second highest among all provinces (Ontario is 40.8 per cent), which on average accounts for 30 per cent of prescription drug expenditures.

Eligible low-income seniors can apply for financial assistance with their co-payments—through the Special Needs Assistance for Seniors program. All Albertans are encouraged to consult with their pharmacist about ways to reduce their costs, such as obtaining—prescription quantities of up to 100 days, when possible.

ALBERTA RCMP WARN OF ORGANIZED SWARMING-STYLE JEWELLERY SCAMS

Your Alberta RCMP has received a number of reports related to gold and jewellery scams targeting people in parking lots across Alberta.

The scam follows a similar pattern or process as follows:

- Victim is approached, often in a parking lot or flagged down by a seemingly stranded motorist.
- Scammer claim

they need money for food, gas, or airfare to get home, and offer fake gold or jewellery for exchange.

- Victims are sometimes accompanied by the scammer to a bank ATM to withdraw cash or to a store to purchase gift cards.
- In some cases, its been reported that the scammers use distraction techniques to remove real jewellery from a victim, and replace it with fake jewellery.
- Scammers also utilize a distraction technique in businesses in order to steal higher-value items.
- The scammer often cites hardship, such as the recent death of a family member, or referencing sad-looking children in their vehicles in order to solicit a sympathetic response from victims. This can include reference to religion or prayer.
- In most cases, the scammers are driv-

ing rental vehicles with out-of-province licence plates from Quebec, Ontario, or British Columbia

It is important to be aware while you are out in public. Always secure your valuables, and only purchase gold or jewellery from a reputable dealer. If someone approaches you in this manner, walk away.



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
