## WATER QUALITY ADVISORY LIFTED FOR ALLAN BEACH ON HUBBLES LAKE

Effective immediately, Alberta Health Services (AHS) has lifted the water quality advisory that was issued June 12, 2025, for the water of Allan Beach on Hubbles Lake, located within the Edmonton Zone of Alberta Health Services (AHS).

Water quality has returned to an acceptable level, and the health risk is low for usage of the beach for recreational purposes.

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any lake or reservoir, at any time.

Construction season has started, and there will be a number of projects undertaken throughout Whitecourt.

47 Street Sewer Line Replacement Project

This project involves replacing 160 metres of aging sewer pipe to restore proper gravity flow and improve the overall performance of the sewer collection system.

•The project is scheduled to take place Tuesday, July 1 through Friday, August 8. Work will take place 7:00am to 7:00pm.

•Eastbound traffic on 49 Avenue will be reduced to single lane near the intersection of 49 Avenue and 47Street. (See attached map.)

•Sidewalk access will remain open.

2025 Street Improvement

Project – Sunset Boulevard and 42 Avenue

As part of the 2025 Street Improvement Program, a portion of 42 Avenue and the hilltop traffic circle will be resurfaced.

•The project is scheduled to take place Tuesday, July 1 through Thursday, July 3. Work will take place 7:00amto 7:00pm.

•42 Avenue south of Highway 43 will be closed to all traffic until construction is complete. (See attached mapfor details.)

•Traffic along Sunset Boulevard at the intersection of 42 Avenue will be reduced to single lane, with a flagperson onsite to direct traffic flow. Drivers are asked to use alternate routes in the hilltop area. (Seeattached map for details.)

•Please drive with caution, and obey all posted signs and speed limits.

•Sidewalk access will remain open.

2025 Street Improvement Program Project – Dahl Drive between 52 Avenue and 55 Avenue

•The project is scheduled to take place Tuesday, July 1 through Friday, July 18.

•Traffic on Dahl Drive will be reduced to single lane, with a flag person controlling the intersections. (Seeattached map for details.)

•Milling and paving will be taking place during the night so traffic will be minimally impacted.

Festival Park Pathway Improvement Project – Pond Pathway and Access to 57 Avenue

•The project is scheduled to take place Friday, July 4 through Thursday, July 17.•Pedestrian access will be interrupted and may require alternate access. (See attached map for details.)•Access to river slides will be available. Miscellaneous Construction Projects


• Various construction projects will be occurring throughout town between Tuesday, July 1 to Sunday, July 6.

## CYANOBACTERIA (BLUE-GREEN ALGAE) ADVISORY ISSUED FOR LESSARD LAKE, NAKAMUN LAKE, AND ISLE LAKE

Submitted by Alberta Health Services

Cyanobacteria (bluegreen algae) has been identified in the waters of Lessard Lake, Nakamun Lake, and Isle Lake.

Visitors to this lake are advised to take the following precautions:

• Avoid all contact with cyanobacterial blooms. If contact occurs, wash with tap water as soon as possible.

• Do not swim or wade or allow your pets to swim or wade in any areas where cyanobacteria is visible.

• Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake to your pets.

• Consider limiting human consumption of whole fish and fish trimmings from this lake, as it is known that fish may store toxins in their liver. (People can safely consume fish fillets from this lake).

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body of water, including Lessard Lake, at any time. Boiling of this water will not remove the toxins produced by cyanobacteria. An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock while this advisory is active.

Cyanobacteria is naturally occurring and often becomes visible when weather conditions are calm. Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz or globs on the surface of water, cyanobacteria can be blue-green, greenish-brown, brown and/or pinkish-red, and often smell musty or grassy.

People who come in con-

tact with visible cyanobacteria or who ingest water containing cyanobacteria may experience skin irritation, rash, sore throat, sore red eyes, swollen lips, fever, nausea and vomiting and/or diarrhea. Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced; however, all humans are at risk of these symptoms. Exposure to the bacteria may be fatal to pets.

Weather and wind conditions can cause algae blooms to move from one location in the lake to another. As such, this advisory will remain in effect for Lessard Lake until further notice.

Please note waters of Lessard Lake in which the cyanobacterial bloom is NOT visible can still be used for recreational purposes, even while this Health Advisory is in place.

## ALBERTA UNCORKS NEW RULES FOR LIQUOR AND CANNABIS

Alberta's government is supporting liquor producers by enabling them to own, operate and sell their own products on large format bikes or "party bikes."

Albertans out for a spin on a party bike or tavern tour will soon be able to sip locally made beers and spirits. Alberta's government is updating the rules to give small liquor producers the green light to serve their own products on party bikes, removing an outdated barrier that had prevented local producers from advertising their own brands. This is one of several

red tape reduction changes to the Gaming, Liquor and Cannabis Regulation (GLCR) aimed at making life easier for small businesses and expanding responsible choices for consumers.

"We are proud that these amendments not only cut red tape in the retail segment of the liquor marketplace, but also directly open more opportunities for small manufacturers to grow their businesses."

More freedom to grow: Li-

quor and cannabis reforms In addition to the changes to party bikes, Alberta is making it easier for liquor retailers to set up shop in underused commercial space. Businesses that own or lease large buildings can now carve out a separate liquor store within their space, so long as it has its own entrance and full floorto-ceiling walls separating it from other retail operations

Alberta's government is also rolling out a long-awaited change for cannabis producers: federally licensed cultivators and processors will now be able to apply for a retail licence to sell their products directly from the same property, commonly known as "farmgate" sales. This move aligns Alberta with other provinces and gives consumers more access to homegrown cannabis products, while supporting licensed growers.

These targeted reforms are part of Alberta's broader push to cut red tape, reduce regulatory burden, and promote a more competitive marketplace across the province.



Whitecourt has launched the AGENT Program designed to enhance community safety while supporting local businesses. The Authorized General Enforcement for Nuisances and Trespassing (AGENT) Program enables RCMP and Whitecourt Municipal Enforcement Services to act as agents for participating local businesses. Trespassing is a common issue faced by property owners, which can result in property damage and other unlawful activities. This program allows officers and peace officers to act on behalf of participating businesses under Alberta legislation, and leverage the Trespass to Premises Act and the Petty Trespass Act to lawfully remove individuals. Information on how to apply to the AGENT Program is available on our website. www.whitecourt.ca/live/public-safety/rcmp-crime-prevention-programs

The Economic Development Committee presented a semi-annual report to Council on current initiatives and updates on projects undertaken in 2025. The report is available to view on www.whitecourt.ca/business.

Whitecourt Manual Osteopathy Ltd. has been awarded \$10,000 through the Whitecourt Launch Grant Program to expand its services and supports with the addition of a cryotherapy machine. Whitecourt Launch provides additional financial support for business development projects that stimulate business retention, growth and expansion. Thank you to all the businesses that applied and shared their ideas!

Kaon Infrastructure Ltd. has been awarded the contract to complete the 47 Street Sewer Line Replacement Project at a contract price of \$378,862.10, plus GST. The project involves replacing 160 metres of aging sewer pipe to restore proper gravity flow and improve the overall performance of the sewer collection system.

Whitecourt is purchasing a new tandem truck, per the fleet replacement plan, from Commercial Truck and Velocity Co. at a cost of \$312,829 plus GST.

Whitecourt is purchasing a new Zamboni from Industrial Machine for \$171,925, plus GST.

The annual review of Off -Site Levies is complete and, based on the study, rates will be changing as of January 1, 2026. Off -Site Levies are a cost recovery tool that to help pay for infrastructure projects that allow the community to grow, including roads, and water and sewage treatment.

Franchise fees are paid in exchange for giving FortisAlberta and ATCO Gas Pipelines Ltd. exclusive right to supply power and gas distribution and Whitecourt, and compensates the municipality for the companies' use of municipal right of ways. In an eff ort to better align the rates, Council has adopted a 5% five-year plan for

the power franchise fee.

The 2025 20-Year Capital and Major Maintenance Plan has been adopted. The Plan, which includes 150 projects, provides a vision for the long-term development of Whitecourt's infrastructure; land development; parks and trails; and, building and recreational/cultural facilities to meet the needs of our growing community. The Plan incorporates projects and timelines identified through engineering studies, planning sessions, workshops, budget deliberations, and public engagement activities. The Plan is available to view at www. whitecourt.ca/your-town.

Records Retention and Destruction Bylaw 1492 has been amended to include legislative updates.

Fees, Rates and Charges Bylaw 1551 has been updated to include updated rates for Off -Site Levies, arena bookings, and cat trap rentals.

Town Council has adopted a new Electronic Signature Policy; and, approved edits to the Audit Services policy to match industry standards.



## ADDRESSING CLASSROOM AGGRESSION AND COMPLEXITY

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government is launching an action team to address classroom complexity and aggression to make schools safer for students and staff.

Alberta's classrooms have become increasingly complex, with more incidents of aggression occurring, paired with increased challenges with behaviour and the special learning needs of students. To address these issues head on, Alberta's government is creating an action team composed of teachers and education partners that will provide recommendations to help guide new policy and address complex classrooms.

"We have heard loud and clear from teachers and parents that we need to do something about aggression in classrooms, and that is exactly what we are doing. Every student and staff member deserves to feel safe, supported and respected at school, and the action team will help reach that goal. Creating this action team is one of several concrete steps we are taking to improve school safety and better support students' diverse needs."

The team, named the Aggression and Complexity in Schools Action Team, will make recommendations to Alberta's government on short- and longterm actions that will support students and educators. The action team will consist of 20 education system leaders including representatives from school boards in Edmonton and Calgary and the Alberta Teachers' Association. To ensure their work is informed by front-line experience, the action team will also work closely with teachers, education support workers, school resource officers and representatives from student and family advocacy groups. The list of action team members will be published online once finalized.

"Alberta School Boards Association (ASBA) appreciates government's commitment to address classroom complexities. ASBA looks forward to this collaborative effort, including local school board perspectives, to help shape meaningful, long-term solutions that support students and educators."

The action team will deliver a report with advice and recommendations to Alberta Education and Childcare to inform a combination of practical solutions and policy by fall 2025. Some recommendations could begin rolling out as soon as the 2025-26 school year. The action team may also continue to be engaged to provide advice to Alberta Education and Childcare on implementation of policy or program changes that result from its recommendations.

"The College of Alberta School Superintendents recognizes the growing complexity within today's classrooms and the impact it has on learning, safety and well-being. We welcome the creation of the Aggression and Complexity in Schools Action Team as an important step in addressing these challenges. By working collaboratively with government, educators and community partners, we can help ensure classrooms remain safe, supportive spaces where every student has the opportunity to thrive."




