



COUNCIL REQUESTS FEDERAL DROUGHT RELIEF FOR LOCAL PRODUCERS

County Council has approved a letter to the Honourable Heath MacDonald, Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food, requesting that Lac Ste. Anne County should be included in the 2025 Federal Livestock Tax Deferral Program.

This request follows prolonged drought conditions that have severely impacted forage, pasture, crop yields, and water supplies in areas of the County. Many producers are facing reduced feed availability, higher costs, and herd reduction

decisions. Inclusion in the federal program would allow eligible livestock producers to defer a portion of income from herd sales to the following tax year, to ease cash flow pressures and support recovery efforts.

COUNTY TO FUND WATER DISTRIBUTION LINE INTO HAMLET OF DARWELL

County Council has approved contributing \$360,000 toward the WILD Water Commission's new water distribution line into the Hamlet of Darwell. The project will connect the Darwell Public Works Facility and the Darwell School, with potential access for residents and community groups.

WILD Water will cover the County's share upfront, to be repaid over three years at 3% interest, funded through the Community Aggregate Fund. Northern Gateway Public Schools will contribute \$50,000, and WILD Water will contribute \$250,000 toward the project's total cost of \$660,000.

AGGREGATE RESOURCE REDISTRICTING BYLAW MOVES TO NEXT STAGE

Council has given second reading to Bylaw 22-2017-04-2025, which proposes changing the land use designation for three parcels — NW 33-53-03 W5M, NE 33-53-03 W5M, and SW 34-53-03 W5M from Agricultural '1' (AG1) District to Aggregate Resource Extraction & Processing (AR) District.

If approved, this change would allow the lands to be used for aggregate extraction and related processing activities. Before the bylaw can proceed to third and final reading, Council has directed Administration to obtain additional studies to ensure potential impacts, such as environmental considerations, traffic, noise, and dust, are properly assessed.

This staged approach allows County Council to review detailed information before making a final decision on whether to approve the redistricting.

HOW TO IMPROVE INDOOR AIR OUALITY IN WINTER

Plants can improve indoor air quality by helping to remove harmful irritants from the air.

Homes tend to be stuffier in autumn and winter. As temperatures outside dip, windows are closed and air quality inside homes can suffer.

Poor indoor air quality can not only be uncomfortable, causing residents to experience headaches, dry eyes and nasal congestion, but also can be unhealthy. According to the American Lung Association, poor indoor air quality can cause or contribute to the development of infections, lung cancer and chronic lung diseases, such as asthma.

Though it's not feasible or healthy to open windows when temperatures outside dip to near or below freezing, there are steps everyone can take to improve the indoor air quality in their homes.

· Add to your décor with plants. Plants provide both aesthetic and practical appeal to a home's interior. Houseplants can clean and purify the air in a home, helping to remove formaldehyde, benzene and other toxins that can make indoor air unhealthy to breathe. Benzene is an irritant that can cause dizziness, headache, nausea. and blurred vision, among other side effects. Formaldehyde, which is often found in homes thanks to its widespread use in a range of products, can cause watery eyes, nausea and wheezing.

· Watch what you are lighting up. Many homeowners know that smoking indoors drastically reduces indoor air quality, putting even nonsmokers at heightened risk of developing various respiratory ailments. Homeowners concerned about the indoor air quality in their homes should ban smoking inside, no matter how low temperatures dip outside. In addition, homeowners with wood-burning stoves and fireplaces should be especially diligent maintaining these features, as they can release harmful soot and smoke if they are not taken

care of. Some people may also be allergic to incense and scented candles, so keep a watchful eye on residents and guests whenever you light candles or sticks of incense. If any symptoms of allergies appear, avoid lighting any more candles or incense, waiting until you can open the windows if you want to light any again.

· Purchase an air purifier. Air purifiers are beneficial yearround, helping to remove allergens and particles from a home. High-efficiency particulate air filters, known as HEPA filters, are extremely effective at removing airborne particulates from the air inside your home.

· Pay attention to pets. Like their owners, pets tend to spend more time indoors during the winter. That means more fur and pet dander, the skin flakes in an animal's fur or hair that can trigger allergic reactions, is likely in your home during the winter than in the summer. To combat this, bathe your pets regularly in the winter, making sure to wash the animal's bedding in hot water on a weekly basis as well.

· Open the windows when possible. Winter does not typically provide many opportunities to open the windows, but you might get a few chances to let some fresh air in through the windows during winter. Make the most of these opportunities, and when possible crack the windows when you're cleaning so dust and other particles that kick up have a path outside of your home.

Clean interior air should be a year-round priority, but homeowners may have to go the extra mile to keep their homes' interior air clean when winter arrives.


