LAC STE. ANNE COUNTY AND REGIONAL PARTNERS ENDORSE DEVELOPMENT OF LAKE MANAGEMENT PLAN

Sangudo, Alberta — Thursday, September 4, 2025

A region-wide coalition of municipalities and summer villages has officially endorsed the development of a comprehensive Lake Management Plan to address pressing environmental concerns facing Lac Ste. Anne, Lake Isle, Matchayaw/Devil's Lake, Big Lake, and surrounding watersheds.

The plan will be developed by the Lake Isle Lac Ste. Anne Stewardship Society (LILSA), a regional non-profit with a strong track record in lake protection and scientific stewardship. The work will be conducted in full alignment with Alberta's regulatory framework and with a clear call for provincial and federal support.

"We know these challenges don't stop at municipal boundaries—and neither can our solutions," said Reeve Joe Blakeman, Lac Ste. Anne County. "This work is grounded in science, driven by local leadership, and done in a way that opens the door to provincial and federal support."

The region's lakes are under increasing stress due to agricultural and urban runoff, invasive species, and growing weather variability that has resulted in extended dry periods and shifting water levels. The Sturgeon River, which connects many of these lakes, has been named one of the most endangered rivers in Canada.

The Lake Management Plan will serve as the first step in evaluating potential long-term solutions, including—but not limited to—water control structures, improvements to riparian zones, and enhanced monitoring efforts.

LILSA has worked closely with Indigenous partners, including the Alexis Nakota Sioux Nation (ANSN) and local Métis communities, on several environmental initiatives, including the control of flowering rush, an invasive aquatic species that continues to threaten regional water bodies.

"All levels of government have a responsibility to help protect Alberta's lakes," said Bernie Poulin, Chair of LILSA. "We're doing our part. This plan is how we lay the groundwork—credibly, responsibly, and in line with the Province's own expectations."

The motion passed by each council outlines that the Lake Management Plan will:

- Develop strategies to protect and improve water quality and quantity;
- Conduct an assessment of historical and current lake levels;
- Investigate the potential need for water control infrastructure, and its implications for communities and ecosystems;
- · Be undertaken in accordance with provincial regulatory standards.

Work will begin in the coming months, with updates shared publicly as data collection, community engagement, and regional coordination progress.

aim to conserve energy can save homeowners substantial amounts of money. Such projects don't often require considerable effort or even sizable financial investments, which can make homeowners skeptical as to just how much they can save after completing the project. But the scale of a project may have little to do with how much homeowners will save. For example, the U.S. Department of Energy notes that a relatively effortless task like turning back a thermostat between 7° and 10° F for eight hours per day can save homeowners as much

as \$83 per year. A more labor-intensive task like planting shade trees saves homeowners an average of between \$35 and \$119 per year.

When looking for ways to conserve energy around the house and save money, homeowners need not necessarily commit to expensive projects. The DOE notes that the following are some energy-saving projects and details what homeowners can expect to save after completing them. While each individual project may not result in jaw-dropping savings, homeowners who follow

many of these recommendations may end up saving more than \$1,000 per year.

Project: Install exterior low-e storm windows.

What is it? Low-e windows reflect infrared heat back into a home. Such windows are coated with an ultra-thin layer of metal that improves the window's insulation ability.

How much can I save? Homeowners who install low-e windows can save between 12 and 33 percent on their annual heating and cooling costs.

Project: Seal uncontrolled air leaks.

What is it? Air leaks let cool air in during winter and warm air in during summer. Caulking, sealing and weather stripping all cracks and large openings can cut back on air leaks that are costing you money. The DOE recommends hiring a contractor to seal any leaks on heating and cooling ducts.

How much can I save? Homeowners who seal uncontrolled air leaks can save between 10 and 20 percent on their annual heating and cooling bills.

Project: Plant shade trees.

What is it? If you plant a deciduous tree between six and eight feel tall near your home, it will begin to shade your windows within a year of being planted. Depending on the species of the tree and the home, the shade tree will begin shading the roof within five to 10 years. The DOE notes that shading is the most cost-effective way to reduce air conditioning costs.

How much can I save? Properly planted shade trees can reduce air conditioning costs by anywhere from 15 to 50 percent.

Project: Insulate the water heater tank

What is it? New water tanks are likely already insulated. But homeowners with older hot water tanks can insulate their tanks with a water heater insulating blanket kit.

How much can I save? Insulating a water heater tank can save homeowners as much as 16 percent on their annual water heating hills

nesting areas for insects or critters. Always stand on a ladder when cleaning gutters, wearing gloves to remove items by hand and dropping leaves and debris into a trash can below. Standing on the roof and leaning over gutters greatly increases your risk of injury. If the gutters are clear when you first examine them in early fall, you can wait until later in the season to give them a complete and thorough cleaning. Window and doorway inspection





REMEMBER THE ALAMO?

Like many, I've heard that phrase "Remember the Alamo" many times. I had seen a few movies, and thought I had an appreciation for that part of history. I had an opportunity this summer to travel to Texas, took the time to spend at the museum, and I can tell you I came away with a deeper appreciation of the significance of what the Alamo was, not only for the fine folks of Texas, but to me on a personal level. It was our "Modern" version of Thermopolis, the famous battle where 300 Spartans stood their ground against thousands of the Persian empire.

For the history buffs out there, please give me a little latitude as I'm going to distill the events down at very high level, and on a more personal "How it made me feel" context. 1000 words or less, can hardly do it justice, but here goes.

The basics that came about was the president of Mexico. fancied himself the north American version of Napolean. He was about empire building and strayed far away from the agreement made in 1824 constitution, and Texan's were not much inclined to have their rights being taken lightly (sound familiar?). When diplomacy failed, they simply dug in their heels and said they would still be a province of Mexico if the constitution was respected, if not, they were going to go it alone, without Mexico.

Santa Ana wasn't going to go back to 1824, he's going to put an end to these rebels, hangs up his presidential hat, takes up the mantle of general and heads out as a general to snuff out this rebellion. On the other team, General Houston puts out the call to friends and patriots alike to come to his aid, and muster at the Alamo. He's going to have to build an army out of nothing and needs some hands with experience to keep Santa Ana busy.

Now believe it or not, many answered the call from all over the place, not just from Texas, but those who wanted to stand up for what they thought was right, they were average folks for the most part, a vast majority of volunteers were at the Alamo, not regular forces.

Heck, in the Alamo itself they have hung in the rafters not only the flags of the other states, but countries the likes of Germany, England, Scotland, Ireland, just to name a few. When General Sam Houston and others put out the call to friends it was personal relationships, not military might that brought these folks together.

In the museum, they had the flags of the "Texans" and the regiments, as well as the stories behind them. A Mexican tri color flag with 1824 in the middle, again, stating they were ok to be governed by Mexico, just stick to the terms that were signed. Another white flag with a cannon in black, with the statement written "Come Take Them" a direct nod to the Spartan kings reply to the Persian King when he was asked to disarm. A blue flag, with a White Star and white lettering with a simple statement, "Independence". The flag most recognizable however was the early version of the Texan flag we know today, tri colored, red, white, blue, with a White Star.

There were only 137 people that were at the Alamo to stand against 5000, they

held them off for 13 days. The Mexican general did not spare a single combatant, nor any wounded, he ordered them all to be killed, all in the infirmary, and only spared the women and children.

It was rather profound to be at the same site where that battle took place, where men stood, the large majority volunteers, not regular soldiers, together facing the odds, and knowing that they would not make it out alive if they failed. That they believed in something greater than themselves, in their friends, their country, and how they wanted to live, and wanted their children to live. Jim Bowie. David (Congressman) Crockett, are just a couple of the famous names that chose this place as their last stand.

There were some famous sayings that came out of the Alamo as well, "Victory or Death" (William Barret Travis), and one I'm sure that was used as a parting word when trying to round up support for the cause back in Tennessee as Davy Crockett answered the call to help his friends when they reached out "You may all go to Hell, and I will go to Texas".

So, remembering the Alamo is not only remembering the events of that place, or the people who stood there. For me it was remembering the kind of people who lived during that period of time.

With that self-reflection, on what matters to me, and in a time of need how many people would rise to the occasion. Is independence, self-determination, freedom, and fairness that important to our modern day countrymen? I know we say it is...but when push came to shove, and if we needed to dig in to defend it,

vould we?

The folks I met from Texas were great, very welcoming, they had a bit of an edge as my wife put it, nice but were in a hurry to get things done, and you could tell they were proud of who they were and where they were from. It reminded me Albertan's during the boom times, and the best part is I never had to tell them once where Alberta was, such is our connection through common industries.

I was in Houston, San Antonio, Autin, Fredericksburg, Fort Worth, Dalas, Athens, Lufkin, Diboll and Galveston to name a few of the places. 1600 miles driven, lots of sun, smiles, and conversations along the way. As I drove, I thought of what a different place it would have been if General Houston hadn't defeated Santa Ana, after all, when it was said and done many joined up to fight Mexico after the defeat at the Alamo, what if there was a Napoleon an Emperor in in the west. Ultimately the USA Picked up Texas, New Mexico, California and Arizona after the dust settled.

Personally, in reflection, I'd like to think that we all have 5 good people we could count on when it mattered most. I'd like to think that the basic items that mattered back in the day still matter today. I would like to think that giving away freedoms for convenience will only go so far, and that we remember how we all got our freedoms in the first place. Freedom was never Free, and remembering the Alamo is more than what matters to Texas, it should be a reminder that when good folks stand together, they can change history. I hope that matters to you as well.

TRANSFORMING DISABILITY INCOME SUPPORT IN ALBERTA

In January 2025, Alberta's government announced plans for the new Alberta Disability Assistance Program (ADAP), which will be offered in addition to AISH and will empower Albertans with disabilities to pursue fulfilling job opportu-

nities while continuing to receive the supports they need.

ADAP will allow for the highest income while receiving benefits, meaning Albertans on ADAP can earn more from working while continuing to receive their financial benefits. In addition, Albertans on ADAP will also be able to receive the health benefits they need, regardless of their employment income. Through ADAP, Albertans with disabilities will not only receive the financial and health benefits they rely on, they will also have access to the employment resources they need to gain new skills and work to their full potential.

"People with disabilities shouldn't have to choose between getting the support they need and having the opportunity to pursue a meaningful career. That's why we're introducing the new Alberta Disability Assistance Program – so Albertans with disabili-

ties aren't punished for getting a job. We've heard loud and clear that this is an important step, and we're grateful for the engagement from Albertans to help us get this right."


