### ALBERTA RCMP MAJOR CRIMES UNIT INVESTIGATE HOMICIDE NEAR LEDUC

The Alberta RCMP Major Crimes Unit has laid charges in connection with the March 14, 2026, shooting on the QE II south of Leduc. RCMP are confirm-

ing that the victim of the shooting is 22-year-old Birinder Singh.

As a result of the investigation, on March 21, 2026, RCMP arrested 18-year-old Lloydminster resident, Jimmy Gassner, in Canoe Lake Saskatchewan. Gassner

has been charged with second-degree-murder. He has been remanded into custody and is being transported to Alberta where a future court date will be determined.

### ALBERTA RCMP WELCOMES 21 NEW POLICE OFFICERS

The Alberta RCMP is welcoming 21 new police officers who will be deployed across the province. Each of them has recently graduated from the Cadet Training Program at Depot, the RCMP’s training academy,

in Regina, Sask., equipping them with the policing skills necessary to serve their new communities with excellence.

These new officers are a part of a positive shift in recruitment and retention for the Alberta RCMP. Since April 1, 2024, there have been over 5,700 applica-

tions received in the province. Additionally, the Alberta RCMP’s Experienced Police Officer Program has hired 25 EPOs since the start of April 2025, with 33 applications currently open and being processed.

new officers: Barrhead, Cardston, Chateh, Coronation, Drayton Valley, Fort Vermilion, High Prairie, Hinton, Lloydminster, McLennan, Piikani Nation, Provost, Redcliff, Red Earth Creek, Stettler, St. Paul, Valleyview, Vegreville, Wainwright, and Wood Buffalo.

“We recognize that police visibility and staffing levels remain key concerns for the communities we serve,” says Deputy Commissioner

Trevor Daroux, Commanding Officer of the Alberta RCMP. “These new police officers are an example of our focus to look inward at our hiring processes to remove barriers, find efficiencies, and ensure the most qualified applicants are chosen to serve your communities.”

Additional strategies to address vacancies and temporary absences include the Alberta RCMP’s Relief Team, located out of Co-

chrane and Leduc, which provides frontline support to communities facing vacancies, injuries or major events. In 2026, 65 deployments have already been planned across 16 detachments in Alberta. Alternate Service Delivery Models for remote and isolated locations are also being used, including an Implemented Fly-In Model in Fox Lake. Lastly, 34 active reservists are supporting frontline policing across the province,

with 11 more in the application process.

With municipal, provincial and federal mandates, the Alberta RCMP offers over 150 different types of career opportunities to choose from. ## IS IT TIME FOR YOUR MAMMOGRAM?

Screen Test is coming to Beaumont April 13 to 15, Drayton Valley April 20 to 25 and Breton April 27 & 28, 2026

Screen Test is a free service provided by Primary Care Alberta that offers screening mammograms. Our mobile screening units travel to 120 communities throughout Alberta to provide convenient access to breast cancer screening.

Having regular screening mammograms is the best way to find breast cancer early, before symptoms appear and when treatment may work better.

Who should have a screening mammogram?

If you’re 45 to 74, you don’t need a referral to have a mammogram. Make screening part of your regular health routine.

Plan to have a mammogram every 2 years or as decided by you and your healthcare provider.

If you’re 40 to 44 or over 75, discuss the risks and benefits of screening with your healthcare provider. You will need a referral if you’re 40 to 44 and it’s your first mammogram, or if you’re over 75.

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# ALBERTA MAKES HISTORIC INVESTMENT IN DOCTORS

The largest investment in physician funding will strengthen access to care and support the health system priorities of Albertans.

If passed, Budget 2026 will make a record investment of \$7.7 billion in 2026-27, \$1.4 billion or 22 per cent more than Budget 2025, in physician recruitment, training, compensation and development. Family physicians caring for patients with chronic conditions, surgeons performing life-saving procedures and specialist physicians play a critical role in caring for Albertans. This investment helps ensure the province

can meet that demand with timely, high-quality care in communities across Alberta.

“Albertans expect to see a doctor when they need one. Access to care is a priority for families across this province. That is why we are making the largest investment in physicians in Alberta’s history, backing the doctors who care for our families and taking real action to improve care provincewide.”

As a result of these investments, more physicians are choosing to practise in the province than ever before. Currently, more than 13,000 physicians are registered in Alberta, a 34 per cent increase over the past decade, including an all-time high of 6,362 family physicians. Alberta’s government will continue working to ensure doctors are well supported and fairly compensated while building a sustainable, modern health system that delivers high-quality care for all Albertans.

# ADVANCING THE ALBERTA SHERIFFS POLICE SERVICE

New proposed legislation is a key step in a smooth transition from the Alberta Sheriffs to the Alberta Sheriffs Police Service (ASPS).

If passed, Bill 15, the Public Safety and Emergency Services Statutes Amendment Act, 2026 will ensure law enforcement operations are not disrupted and public safety is not compromised during the transition. It also creates a direct, streamlined path for eligible sheriffs to become ASPS police officers, supporting recruitment and accelerating the growth of the new police service.

“Criminals are becoming more sophisticated, and we’re meeting that threat head-on by transforming the Alberta Sheriffs into a modern police

service. We are putting more boots on the ground and giving our officers the high-tier training they need to combat the complex crime facing our province today. We aren’t just filling gaps; we are building a coordinated powerhouse that puts law-abiding Albertans first and sends a clear message: if you threaten our communities, we have the specialized frontline capacity to stop you. This is about a safer, stronger Alberta - full stop.”

As part of the transition, sheriff peace officers who currently perform police-like duties will be eligible to pursue careers as ASPS police officers, subject to training and qualification requirements. This ensures officers have the

appropriate training and authority under the Police Act to continue performing the same core policing functions they do today. Other sheriffs will remain in their existing peace officer roles to maintain full operational coverage across Alberta during the transition.

The Alberta Sheriffs are currently government employees, while the new ASPS will operate as an independent Crown corporation. Bill 15 enables a smooth transition of unionized and non-unionized staff from the existing structure into the new service, providing continuity for employees and ensuring policing and public safety operations continue without disruption as the ASPS is established.

“By welcoming experienced sheriffs into the ASPS, we are able to grow our capaci-

ty while maintaining the essential peace-officer duties Albertans rely on every day. Because sheriffs already perform many police-like functions, integrating them into the ASPS allows us to stand up the service faster and with a depth of experience that would take years to build through new hiring alone.”

The proposed legislation also protects Alberta Sheriffs branch staff employment stability. During and after the transition, employees will continue to work under their current employment terms. This builds on legislation passed last year to ensure ASPS police officers have the ability to form their own police association to negotiate future collective bargaining agreements.



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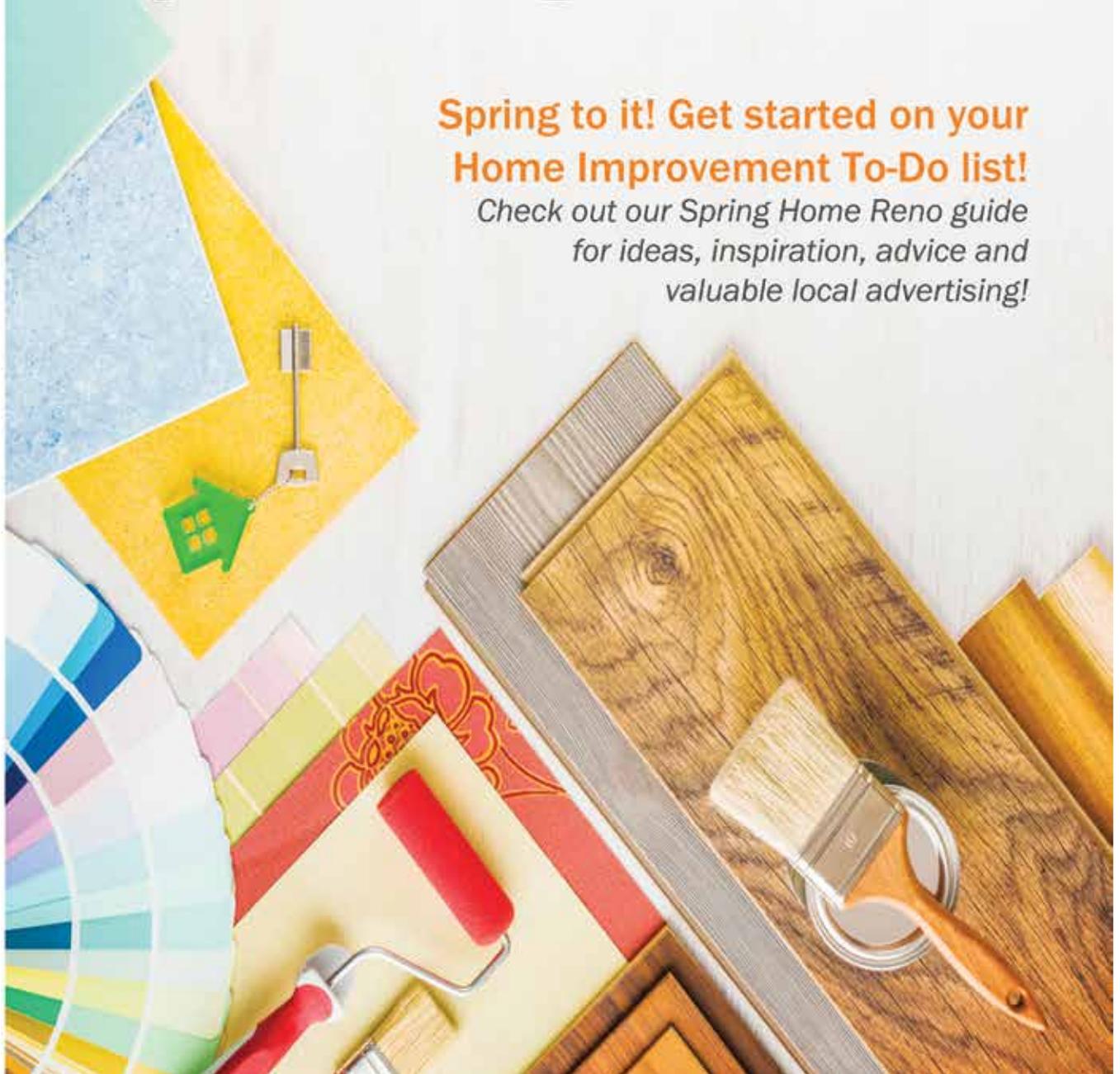

## ROOMS CAN SERVE DOUBLE DUTY

Many homes do not have space for guest rooms, kids' play areas and home theater lounges that are possible in homes with substantial square footage. But they may not be missing out at all.

While large homes remain popular, many people are embracing the benefits of smaller residences. Small homes help homeowners save money, require less maintenance, have smaller environmental impact, and reduce the temptation to accumulate "stuff."

Owners of small homes or apartments can still enjoy the benefits of larger spaces, they just need to equip rooms to perform double duty.

Living room/guest room

Entertaining guests is easier when there's a dedicated space where visitors can feel at home. When furnishing a living room, keep the guest room in mind. A sofa that opens up to a bed or a convertible sectional can be a comfortable place for guests to lay their heads. Side tables provide guests with places to store their belongings, and an empty storage chest can house bed linens or guests' clothing.

Den/playroom

Children tend to accumulate toys and games. And as kids grow from children to young adults, their list of must-have items - from video gaming systems to other electron-

ics - grows along with them. Storage can make a room functional for both adults and children. Devote an entire wall to a closet or drawer system where toys can be stored out of sight when necessary. Storage ottomans can be used for extra seating while also providing somewhere for homeowners to stash stuffed animals or games for easy access. When choosing furniture, look for fabrics that are resistant to stains and modular pieces that can be moved around as necessary to create room for playing or entertaining.

Bedroom/home office

In 2015, 24 percent of employed people in the Unit-

ed States did some or all of their work at home, says the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Bringing work home means men and women will need a space to work. In tight quarters, bedrooms may be the only available area. An armoire-style desk will blend in with the decor and can hide paperwork and electronics behind doors. Otherwise, a makeup vanity can serve the dual purpose of providing a place to get ready for a night out and a ready space to house a laptop during the day.

In smaller homes, homeowners may be forced to turn rooms into dual purpose areas.

## STEPS TO A MORE ORGANIZED, FUNCTIONAL GARAGE

Organization can help homeowners transform their homes into less cramped, more spacious oases without forcing them to finance potentially expensive expansion projects.

Homeowners who park in their driveways may find that their garages have become crowded, cluttered spaces in which searching for tools can feel like scouring a haystack in search of a needle. Organizing a garage

can create extra room in a home while affording homeowners the chance to protect their vehicles from the elements. Homeowners who want to turn their garages into something more than cluttered storage units can employ the following strategies to transform these largely overlooked areas into more valuable spaces.

- Choose the right day. Garages tend to be separate from the rest of

the homes they're a part of, meaning the only way to organize a garage is to first remove all items from the garage and into the driveway. Because items removed from the garage will be exposed to the elements, homeowners should choose a day that's temperate and sunny to clean their garages. If possible, homeowners should opt to organize their garages in late spring, summer or early fall when there are addi-

tional hours of daylight. This protects homeowners from having to work in the dark should the job take longer than they initially anticipated.

- Discard or donate duplicate items. Duplicate items are some of the main culprits behind cluttered garages. As garages gradually become more cluttered, homeowners may buy tools they already have simply because they cannot

find their original tools. When organizing the garage, create separate piles for duplicate tools, placing still-useful items in a pile that can be donated to neighbors, local charities or organizations and another pile for old tools that are no longer useful.

- Host a garage sale. Homeowners who want to organize their garages and make a buck at the same time can host

garage sales. Make only those items that are still functional available for purchase, and let neighbors and bargain hunters do the bulk of your organization work for you.

- Designate areas of the garage for certain items. Once the items that won't be going back into the garage have been sold, donated or discarded, organize the garage by designating areas for certain items, making sure to separate items

that can pose safety risks. For example, store kids' bicycles and outdoor toys in a corner of the garage that is opposite the corner where potentially dangerous items such as power tools and gas cans will be stored. Keep the center of the garage open for vehicles.

- Periodically park cars in the garage. Homeowners who are comfortable parking their vehicles in their driveways can improve

their chances of maintaining organized garages over the long haul by periodically parking in the garage. Doing so not only prevents the gradual buildup of clutter that can slowly take over a garage, but also protects homeowners' automotive investments.

Maintaining an organized garage can help homeowners make more practical use of the space in their homes.

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# LEGISLATION TARGETS TOURISM FEE TRANSPARENCY

Proposed legislation takes steps to protect consumers from hidden and misleading fees while ensuring visitors pay their fair share to help grow Alberta's economy.

Alberta's government is proposing legislation to introduce the new Traveller Protection and Destination Development Act and amend the Consumer Protection Act to prevent tourism businesses from charging hidden or misleading fees while ensuring that visitors continue to pay their fair share to help maintain Alberta's reputation as a premier travel destination. The proposed legislation will require full price transparency at booking and create clear rules for the voluntary collection and reinvestment of destination marketing fees.

"Alberta's tourism industry is a powerful driver of jobs, investment and economic growth. This legislation makes sure people who are paying these fees know where their dollars are going, creating the transparency and accountability that both businesses and their customers need. By introducing this legislation, our government is ensuring that Alberta continues to be the best place to stay and play."

If passed, amendments to the Consumer Protection Act will require accommodation providers to disclose the full price of overnight accommodations to consumers at the time of booking, including all mandatory fees and charges. If requested by a customer, they must

also explain the purpose of each mandatory fee and how the funds will be used. Not only will this protect consumers from bearing unexpected costs, but it will also build public trust and give travelers greater confidence when planning their trips.

"We thank the Government of Alberta for listening to our members and introducing destination marketing fee legislation built on transparency, accountability and good governance. Legislation that keeps participation voluntary, ensures the system remains industry-driven rather than government-administered or destination marketing organization set, and drives local economic growth for Alberta's tourism sector."

Destination marketing fees (DMFs) are fees that many tourism businesses already voluntarily charge their customers to help support local destination marketing and development. While most businesses operate in good-faith, some businesses have retained DMF proceeds for profit – misleading consumers and undermining local destination promotion and development efforts.

If passed, the Traveller Protection and Destination Development Act would create a fair, consistent, and transparent framework for the voluntary collection and reinvestment of DMFs. When tourism businesses voluntarily charge their customers a DMF, if passed, this legislation would require 100 per cent of fee to be used to explicitly support local destination mar-

keting and development. DMFs will continue to be voluntary and industry-led, giving tourism businesses the ability to choose whether to charge these fees to their customers.

"We're so pleased to see this legislation moving ahead. When visitors understand where their dollars are going locally, it supports our triple bottom line: people, planet and profit."

If passed, the Traveller Protection and Destination Development Act will create the transparency and accountability needed to encourage a coordinated approach to local destination marketing and development. The new framework will establish clear requirements for the designation, operations and governance of one local trustee, destination marketing organizations, and, if applicable, accommodation association per region. This includes setting parameters for the use of DMFs to provide proven, measurable local economic benefits for participating businesses. To ensure this framework meets the unique needs of each region, the legislation would also enable regions to set local DMF rates, define the destination's geographic boundaries locally, and use fees to best support local growth.

"The visitor economy is one of Alberta's fastest-growing sectors, driving billions in economic activity and supporting more than ten per cent of our region's jobs. In Edmonton, hotel partners are already investing in our destination through a local destination marketing fee. That collaboration has

helped build a strong and transparent local model and is driving great results. A provincial framework will strengthen accountability across Alberta and ensure visitor dollars are reinvested into our global competitiveness – creating jobs, attracting major events, and driving economic impact in Edmonton and across Alberta."

# MASKWACIS RCMP CHARGE FEMALE FOR ERMINESKIN FIRST NATION HOMICIDE

Ermineskin Cree Nation, Alta. – On March 19, 2026, at 6:51 a.m., Maskwacis RCMP was dispatched to a residence on the Ermineskin First Nation for a report of a shooting. Upon arrival, RCMP located Shane

Buffalo (29), deceased inside the residence from an apparent gunshot wound.

Investigation identified a possible suspect who had fled the scene with a firearm. Resources were called in to assist in the search, including officers from RCMP Traffic Services, Wetaskiwin RCMP, Maskwacis RCMP,

Central Alberta District Crime Reduction Unit, RCMP Police Dog Services and the Emergency Response Team. RCMP Major Crimes Unit took carriage of the investigation. The suspect was located in the area and was taken into custody.

On March 20, 2026, Shaunelle Okeymow (32), a female res-

ident of Louis Bull Tribe, was charged with the Second-Degree Murder of Shane Buffalo. She was remanded into custody and will appear in Alberta Court of Justice in Wetaskiwin on March 26, 2026.

# ONE CLICK CLOSER TO CONTINUING CARE

Alberta's government is launching a portal to help Albertans and their families find and access assisted living and continuing care options across the province.

Alberta's government is launching the new Assisted Living Navigation Portal – a one-stop shop for Albertans to see the assisted living supports in the province and make informed decisions with their families about what options best suit their unique needs and preferences.

The Assisted Living Navigation Portal makes it easy to locate, learn about and access the care accommodations and services available across the province. With plain language guides, frequently asked questions, and a step-by-step guide for how to begin the intake process, the portal makes the assisted living system easier to navigate than ever before. To use the tool, Albertans can simply fill out a short

questionnaire to see suggestions based on their needs or browse continuing care homes and supportive living accommodations in their area on an interactive map.

“As more seniors need continuing care, we are taking action to make the system clearer and easier to access. This portal is an important tool to provide detailed information on all the available assisted living sites in Alberta to help families find the support they need. We are focused on building a system that puts seniors first and gives families confidence in the care their loved ones receive.”

The portal includes information such as available services, out of pocket costs, number of supportive living spaces, vacancy rates and contact information. When a person is ready to begin the intake process, they will be directed to contact 811 or their area's Continuing Care Access Centre to speak to a nurse or case manager for an assessment.

The Assisted Living Navigation Portal will roll out in several phases, adding information and capabilities over time to offer Albertans a responsive, dynamic portal for assisted living in the province. Future updates will add home and community care to the portal so Albertans can see the assisted living options available to them and make the decision that works best for themselves and their families.

# BUILT IN ALBERTA TO PROTECT ALBERTANS

Alberta's government has secured a contract with De Havilland Canada for five new, locally built waterbombers to keep Albertans and their communities safe from wildfires.

The contract includes the purchase of five De Havilland Canada DHC-515 waterbombers, marking a major step forward in strengthening the protection of communities and infrastructure during wildfire season. This \$400-million investment will not only significantly enhance Alberta's wildfire response capacity but also support the creation of good local jobs. The first aircraft is expected to arrive by spring 2031.

The current airtanker fleet is strategically positioned among 13 bases across the province during wildfire season to ensure rapid response to new wildfires and reduce the spread of larger fires. These firefighting aircraft work by skimming water from lakes and dropping it on nearby fires, complementing the contracted planes that drop fire retardant to suppress the spread of wildfire.

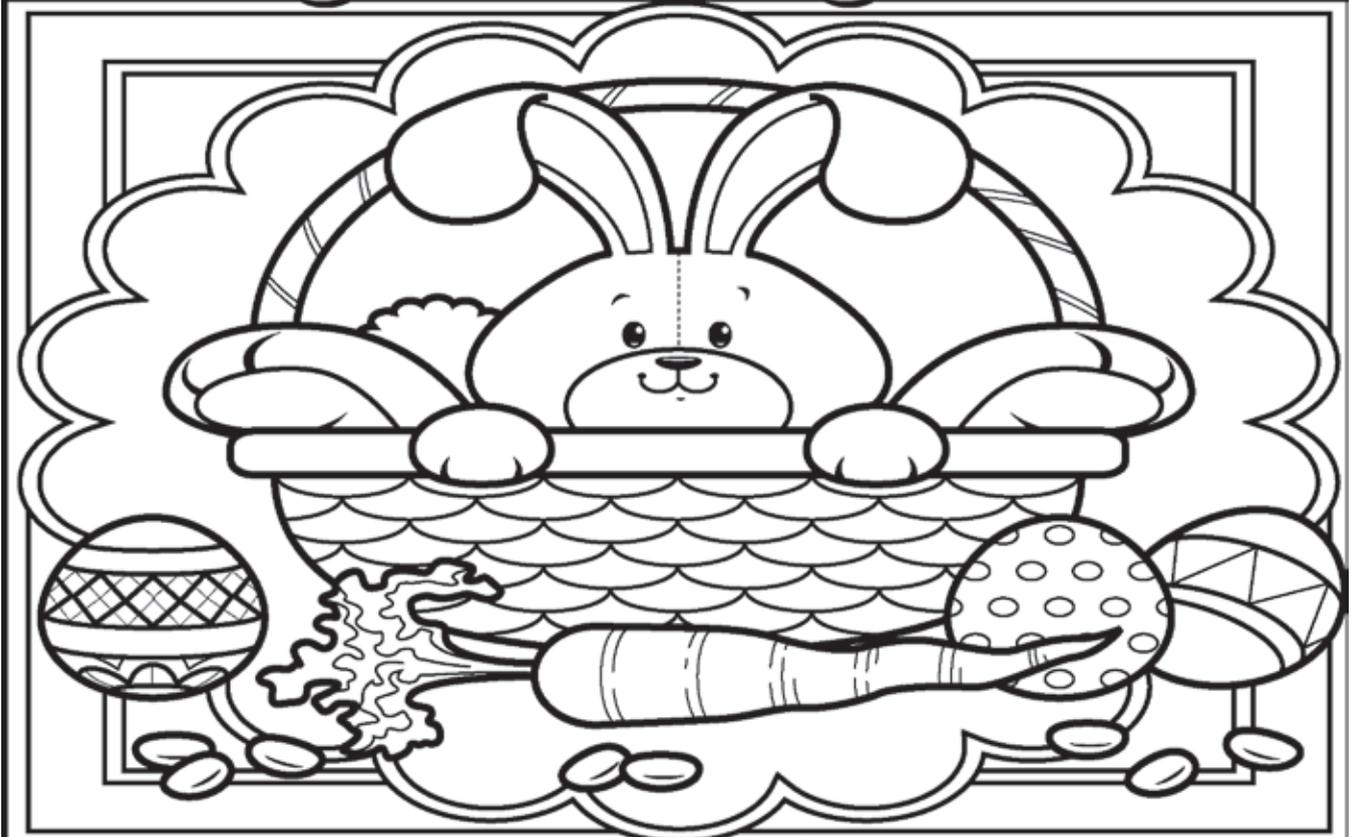

# INVESTING IN SCHOOLS AND STUDENT SUCCESS

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Budget 2026 makes a record \$10.8-billion investment to put more teachers and EAs in classrooms, support complex learning needs and ease pressure on schools.

Budget 2026, if passed, provides \$10.8 billion in operational funding for education, or about \$54 million for every school day. The funding also represents an increase of \$722 million over Budget 2025.

In February 2026, Alberta's government rolled out the first steps and resources to address classroom complexity and classroom sizes. This commitment builds on that work and reflects what Albertans have made clear is a high priority.

"Strong classrooms matter to families across Alberta. Our government has been taking action to respond to record enrolment growth, rising classroom complexity and the challenges teachers are facing. Budget 2026 builds on that momentum with the largest investment in education in Alberta's history. We will con-

tinue strengthening our education system to ensure every student has the opportunity to succeed."

Budget 2026, if passed, provides funding to hire more than 1,600 teachers and 800 support staff in the 2026-27 school year. This investment builds on \$143 million announced earlier this month to address class size and complexity, with complexity teams made up of 476 teachers and 952 education assistants.

Over the next three years, education funding will grow by almost \$1.5 billion, reaching \$11.5 billion by 2028-29. This increased funding is expected to support hiring more than 5,000 teachers, education assistants and support staff.

"I am confident these investments will help address classroom complexity and better support Alberta's students. Every child deserves the strongest possible start in life, and that means ensuring our education system keeps pace with growth and rising demands."

To help support more students and complex classrooms Budget 2026, if passed, is investing \$1.8 billion to support students with specialized learning needs. This represents an increase of \$86.5 million.

The budget also provides almost \$560 million for enrolment funding over the next three years, helping school boards hire the teachers and support staff needed to keep pace with growing student enrolment. Budget 2026, if passed, would also invest \$355 million next year to address class sizes and classroom complexity.

"Operational funding supports the day-to-day work of teaching and learning. It pays for the people, resources and services students rely on. Recognizing real costs helps schools remain stable, plan responsibly, and focus on classrooms and student success."

Alberta's government is supporting the province's youngest students as they build strong education foundations, investing \$20 million in 2026-

27 into reading and math supports. This is an increase of more than 60 per cent from last budget.

Student transportation is a key part of the education system. Budget 2026 invests \$458 million to support safe and reliable transportation for more than 348,000 students across the province.

Budget 2026, if passed, also includes \$41 million to continue renewing Alberta's curriculum. This funding supports teacher professional learning and the development of classroom resources as new subjects continue to be introduced.
