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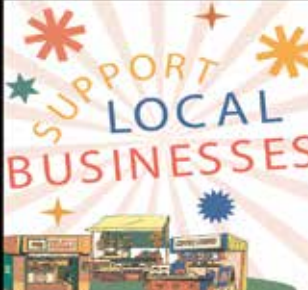

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WHITECOURT RCMP INVESTIGATE AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

On Aug. 9, 2026, Whitecourt RCMP responded to an assault complaint where a male was found with serious injuries. He was transported by EMS to an Edmonton hospital due to his injuries. A subsequent investigation identified three suspects along with information about a series of unreported firearm discharges in the Whitecourt area. On Sept. 4, 2026, a search

warrant was executed with the assistance of the Whitecourt GIS, Emergency Response Team, and Police Dog Services at a location in Whitecourt.

As a result of the investigation, two suspects have been arrested and charged.

Whitecourt's newest facility is nearing completion, and will be opening to the public next month. After two years of construction and lots of anticipation, residents and visitors will soon be able to access and enjoy the new Canfor Culture & Events Centre.

PARKLAND RCMP WARN PUBLIC OF BAIL SCAM

Parkland RCMP are investigating a fraud in which an individual was deceived into depositing \$3,000 into a cryptocurrency machine. On Sept. 10, 2026, the victim received a phone call from a male claiming to be police, stating that their sister was being charged and required bail money. The suspect gave the victim the

location of the machine in Edmonton and instructed her to make the deposit.

It is important for the public to recognize the red flags in these phone calls:

- The caller asks you to pay some kind of bail, fine, or fee through a gift card, money transfer, cryptocurrency, or offers to send someone to pick it up from you in person,
- The RCMP will not

deny anyone medical care while waiting for bail,

- The RCMP will not offer to drop charges in exchange for bail or fines being paid,

- The bail system never solicits money from people, nor do they use couriers to help in any such process.

Fraudsters can make a call appear as though it is coming from a legitimate source, in-

cluding police, and advances in technology can even allow them to mimic a person's voice. If you receive a call claiming a loved one has been arrested or requires emergency funds, do not send money. End the call and independently verify the information by contacting the family member or another trusted contact.

Solar electricity is generated through a process known as the photovoltaic effect. Sunlight shines on solar panels, which are mounted

on the roof of the home or in another prominent location. Each panel typically has between 60 to 72 solar cells strung together. These photovoltaic cells use the irradiation in sunlight to stimulate the flow of electrons in the semiconductor material, which creates direct current, or DC, electricity. Systems that directly convert the DC to alternating current, or AC, the type of power volt-

age used in a house, do so by way of an inverter. The inverter feeds power to the circuit board.

Demand and excess When the demand from a home or business is equal to the amount of solar power being generated, the system is working optimally. When solar power falls a bit short, grid power will make up the deficit. There's also the possibility that excess electricity will be produced.

In a grid connect system, certain areas may

operate with a 1:1 net metering policy, states Solar Reviews, which offers consumer reviews of solar products. This means that the utility company will credit a homeowner 1 to 1 for every kilowatt hour produced in excess because the excess energy goes back into the grid system. This is called "back-feeding" the grid. It's handy for powering homes at night with standard electricity at no additional cost. If the production of kwhs exceeds what is purchased

from the utility each year, some utility companies will continue to credit for the excess.

Solar electricity systems are changing the way people think about energy. With the financial motivation to do so, consumers who embrace solar energy are helping the environment while also saving money.



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DEADLINE TO APPLY FOR SPECIAL BALLOTS CHANGED TO SEPTEMBER 25, 2026

After consulting with service providers, Elections Alberta is moving the last day to apply for a special ballot forward to September 25, 2026.

This step is being taken to ensure electors can receive and return their special ballots to Elections Alberta's Edmonton offices by mail by the legislated deadline, 5:00pm on October 16, 2026.

"Elections Alberta wants to ensure that every elector who applies for a special ballot and returns their package by mail can do so successfully in the time allotted. After assessing current special ballot

application volumes and considering the Thanksgiving holiday on Monday, October 12, we are making this change to ensure electors have enough time to cast their votes by mail," says Gordon McClure, Chief Electoral Officer, Elections Alberta.

The original deadline to apply for a special ballot was October 9, 2026. The new deadline is September 25, 2026.

Completing special ballot packages

Declarations

Special ballot packages include a declaration that electors using this voting method are required to sign and return in their special ballot package. It contains a line "I declare

that I am unable to vote at an advance voting place or a voting place on Election Day" that is causing concern and confusion for electors. We recognize this is carryover language from a previous version of the Election Act which required reasons to apply for a special ballot.

Electors may cross out the statement "I declare that I am unable to vote at an advance voting place or a voting place on Election Day" and complete the rest of the declaration, and Elections Alberta will accept it.

The declaration will be modified to remove that line for special ballots packages that have not yet been sent out.

Ballot folding

Several electors have expressed concerns about how to fold their ballots in their special ballot package. Elections Alberta will accept all ballots returned in completed special ballot packages, regardless of the way they are folded.

COUNCIL DECLARES MUNICIPAL AGRICULTURAL DISASTER

At the August 20 Council Meeting, Lac Ste. Anne County Council declared a Municipal Agricultural Disaster in response to the significant impacts of excessive moisture and prolonged wet weather throughout the 2026 growing season.

Persistent rainfall, saturated soils, and limited opportunities for field access have created challenging conditions for producers across the County. Farmers have reported standing water, drowned-out acres, delayed crop development, increased disease pressure, and concerns about reduced crop yields and quality.

Hay and forage production has been particularly affected. Although abundant moisture contributed to strong forage growth in some areas, ongoing rainfall and limited drying periods prevented many producers from harvesting hay at the optimal time. As a result, forage quality has declined in some locations, raising concerns about winter feed supplies for livestock operations.

"Agriculture is always weather-dependent, but the prolonged wet conditions we've experienced this season have created challenges well beyond the

norm," said Reeve Jurgen Preugschas. "Across the County we're seeing drowned-out acres, delayed crop development, and forage quality issues that could have lasting impacts on producers and livestock operations."

Council noted that regional pasture and hay growth statistics do not always reflect producers' ability to access fields or harvest quality feed. For livestock operations, standing forage alone is not a substitute for properly harvested and stored winter feed.

Crop production has also been affected, with excessive soil moisture delaying crop development and normal field operations throughout the region.

While acknowledging that weather-related challenges are an ongoing reality for agricultural producers and that provincial programs exist to help manage production risk, Council emphasized that the declaration is intended to raise awareness of the severity of local conditions and ensure Lac Ste. Anne County producers are considered as the Province evaluates the impacts of the 2026 growing season.

The County has requested that Alberta Agriculture and Irrigation continue assessing conditions within Lac Ste. Anne County and across the Northwest Region and consider all available support options for affected producers. Council has also expressed interest in discussing potential gaps in existing programs, particularly regarding crop quality losses, forage quality, and winter feed availability.

Council will continue working with provincial and industry partners to advocate for local producers facing what has been described as an extraordinary agricultural challenge.

BEAVER MITIGATION SEASON UNDERWAY: During the spring and summer months, the County's beaver-mitigation program is in full swing. Crews use a range of methods to manage beaver activity—such as dam removal and, when required, trapping—to address flooding in ditches and plugged culverts.

Residents are strongly encouraged to keep pets leashed at all times when walking along County roadways or in ditches. If you come across a beaver trap, do not touch or approach it. Traps can be dangerous, and it is unlawful to tamper with or remove them.

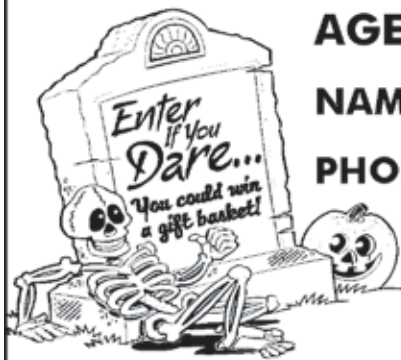

STRENGTHENING PRIMARY CARE IN RURAL ALBERTA

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's \$9-million additional investment in rural primary care is delivering results, helping clinics recruit providers and expand local services.

Alberta has invested an additional \$9 million in rural primary care, including almost \$8 million through the Rural Team Recruitment Grant to help rural clinics grow their care teams. Through the latest grant intake, \$3.4 million was awarded to 23 clinics across Alberta, supporting 53 new full-time health care positions in rural and remote communities across the province.

"These grants are about making sure rural Albertans can get the care they need in their own communities. By helping clinics hire more health professionals and grow their teams, we're making it easier for families to get timely, reliable care closer to home."

Team Recruitment Grant, increased the number of patients served by almost 30 per cent after recruiting patient care coordinators. The Crowsnest Medical Clinic, another previous grant recipient, reported that the social worker hired through this grant has served 98 patients with advocacy care coordination and connections to community resources that improve their care.

"These grants have helped us build much-needed capacity within the Consort Medical Clinic, strengthening our primary care team and expanding the care

we can provide locally. This investment is helping create more sustainable access to primary care for our rural community."

An additional \$1 million has been awarded to seven municipalities through the Municipality Supported Clinics Grant program to strengthen local care clinics. The funding is supporting new staff, including medical office assistants, managers, navigators and virtual clinic coordinators, as well as medical equipment, staff training and technology.

Funding was provid-

ed to the towns of Picture Butte, Bruderheim and Bow Island, as well as to clinics in Lac La Biche County, Bashaw, Delburne and Consort, helping strengthen access to primary care in these communities. This funding has helped Bruderheim extend clinic hours, Bashaw expand from two to five clinic days a week and achieve same-day appointments, and Consort serve 36 per cent more patients.

"Communities across Alberta are benefiting from these investments as clinics bring on additional team members and enhance the high-quality, team-based care that rural families rely on."
